Coastal Receives Largest Federal Grant in its History

Coastal has received the largest federal grant in the school's history, a three-year grant totaling \$585,000 from the U. S. Department of Education's Strengthening Institutions Program under Title III of the Higher Education Act.

"As Coastal Carolina College develops and becomes more diverse," Chancellor Eaglin said, "it proves itself by being able to apply for and be successful in receiving major federal grants such as this. It is a natural step in the college's growth."

The funds will be used to establish an Academic Center on campus. Designed for faculty and student use, the facility will enhance traditional classroom learning experiences by incorporating the lastest technological innovations such as computeraided and audio-visual instruction. With an emphasis on individualized instruction, the complex will include a listening center for foreigh language students, facilities for placement testing, programs for theatre and speech students, and additional stations to augment existing mathematics and writing laboratories which are used for developmental instruction. A portion of the funds will be used to purchase computers, computeraided instructional (CAI) software, and audio-visual equipment.

The coordinator of the program is Dr. Richard Moore, assistant vice chancellor for grants and sponsored research, who wrote the grant along with Peter Lecoras, lecturer in the English department, and Dr. Richard Koesterer, coordinator of interdisciplinary studies.

Dr. Moore says, "We have identified centain academic areas that will be prime users of the center; however, the program has been designed to serve all disciplines and all levels of students. We will provide opportunites to academically advanced students as well as those in need of remediation."

Lewis Grizzard to Speak on Campus

Popular author and award-winning journalist Lewis Grizzard will speak on campus Tuesday, October 20 at 8 p.m. in Kimbel Gymnasium. Sponsored by the Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series, the program is free and open to the public. Seats will filled on a first-come, first-served basis, and doors will open at 7 p.m.

The lecture is sponsored by the Kimbel Trust, the Episcopal Diocese of South Carolina, <u>The Sun</u> <u>News</u>, the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc., Coastal Carolina College, and the Burroughs Foundation. Additional support for this lecture is provided by the Sheraton Myrtle Beach Inn.

New Admissions Standards Set for USC Coastal

A balance of tougher admissions standards and special opportunities for local residents has been approved for implementation next summer at Coastal.

"With growth being as rapid as it has over the past

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several years, a two-tiered admissions program was developed with the concept that special treatment would be given first to local applicants who reside in the five-county service area," Chancellor Eaglin said. That service area includes Horry, Georgetown, Williamsburg, Marion and Dillon counties.

Coastal has grown by 45% since 1982. Current enrollment is 3,650.

He said the key element of this admissions process is that the citizens of the five-county service area will be given opportunities, if they fail to meet admissions standards, to enroll in a summer or an evening program during the regular year to bolster their skills to enhance their opportunities for academic success. This program is currently being planned by Coastal Carolina faculty and will be in place by the summer of 1988.

Admissions criteria are based on combined SAT scores and the predicted grade point average (PGPR), which is calculated from class rank and placement tests. Out-of-state students must have a combined SAT score of 900 or a PGPR of at least 1.75 and a minimum 700 SAT total. In-state students must have an SAT total of 850 or a PGPR of at least 1.75 and a minimum 650 SAT total. Students who score below a certain level on the math or verbal portions of the SAT test will be required to take either developmental English or math and will be placed in the Guided Studies Track. This program provides trained advisors who will assist and monitor the progress of the students. and it limits students to 12 hours for at least the first semester.

"These new standards are a bold move by Coastal Carolina College to improve student retention, to enhance academic quality and to ensure higher education opportunities for local residents," Dr. Eaglin said.
