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

### Playcard Environmental Education Center Plans Open House

Playcard Environmental Education Center, a 200-acre natural black water swamp preserve, will hold an open house on Saturday, November 7 from 1 to 4 p.m. with an afternoon of activities for wildlife enthusiasts of all ages.

Activities include a hot air balloon, a nationally-known storyteller for children, exhibitions by Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, wildlife exhibitions, a parachutist, tours of the undisturbed natural swampland environment and refreshments. All activities are free.

The Center is located on S.C. 410, approximately 20 miles north of Conway and eight miles southwest of Loris.

The Environmental Education Center is the

culmination of a project undertaken by the Horry County Conservation Foundation to preserve the Playcard Swamp as an educational and research center for the study of the natural lowcountry swamp environment. The center is being utilized as an educational facility for students and for environmental research.

The Center has a newly-constructed educational building and when fully developed, the Center will have on-site educational facilities to accommodate single-day and over-night programs. There will also be a natural amphitheater for outdoor programs, hiking trails marked for environmental study, outdoor laboratories for on-site research, canoes, docks and observation decks for viewing the natural setting.

Playcard Swamp is the natural habitat for alligators, black bears, and beavers as well as being a perfect environment for many varieties of wetland plantlife threatened by extinction in many parts of the country.

# Second Speaker Set for Bicentennial Series

"The Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, and the Promise of Liberty," the second in a series of three programs celebrating the bicentennial of the U. S. Constitution, will be held Thursday, November 5, at 2:30 p.m. in the Fine Arts Little Theatre.

The speaker is Dr. Hrach Gregorian of the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH). Dr. Gregorian heads the Endowment's Foundations of American Society program which is designed to encourage scholarship and public programs on the history and founding principles of America. He received his Ph.D. in political

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science from Brandeis University. Prior to his work with NEH, he taught political science at Kenyon and Simmons colleges. He is the author of a number of journal articles and professional papers on political philosophy and American government.

The Coastal Carolina Theatre's American College Theatre Festival entry, "The Diviners," opens Friday, November 13 in Wheelwright Auditorium. With performances running on November 14 and 15, this play by Jim Leonard, Jr. marks Coastal's fifth entry in the ACTF. Friday and Saturday performances are at 8 p.m. and Sunday is a 2:30 p.m. matinee.

The American College Theatre Festival is presented and produced by the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts and is sponsored by the National Broadcasting Company with the support of the Kennedy Center Corporate Fund, the U. S. Department of Education and Ryder Systems. Coastal's past entries include "Seascape" by Edward Albee, "Oedipus the King" by Sophocles, "The Last Meeting of the Knights of the White Magnolia" by Preston Jones and "Tartuffe" by Moliere.

"The Diviners" is the story of a young, disturbed boy who is befriended by a disenchanted preacher. In a moving story, built on short vignette-style scenes; this play builds to climax which has been called "one of the true magic moments in theatre."

The Coastal production is being directed by David E. Majewski, chairman of the Department of Theatre and Speech. In the feature role of Buddy, the young boy, is David F. Russell. As the preacher, C. C. Showers, is David Buyck. Other leading characters are portrayed by Jacqueline Rebekah Browne as Jennie Mae, Buddy's sister and Bob Stocks as Ferris Layman, Buddy's father.

Kent Phillips of Walt Disney World will be on campus Wednesday, November 18 for a presentation and interviews with students who are interested in the Walt Disney World Internship program.



- o Susan Libes, assistant professor of marine science and chemistry, recently attended a workshop on the Chemical Impact to the South Carolina Environment. The meeting was sponsored by the American Chemical Society and held at DuPont's Savannah River Laboratory in Aiken, S.C.
- o Richard Oliver Collin, associate professor of government, has recently written an article entitled "The 1987 General Elections in Italy," which was published in the October 1987 edition of the Byrnes International Center Regional Bulletin, a publication of the University of South Carolina.
