Coastal Theatre To Stage "The Diviners"

The Coastal Carolina Theatre's American College Theatre Festival entry, "The Diviners," opens Friday, November 13 in Wheelwright Auditorium. With performances running on November 14 and 15, this play by Jim Leonard, Jr. marks Coastal fifth entry in the ACTF. Friday and Saturday performances are at 8 p.m. and Sunday is a 2:30 p.m. matinee.

"The Diviners" is the story of a young, disturbed boy who is befriended by a disenchanted preacher. In a moving story, built on short vignette-style scenes; this play builds to a climax which has been called "one of the true magic moments in theatre."

Palmetto Mastersingers To Perform

The Palmetto Mastersingers will perform Thursday, November 19 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. This is the second of four programs to be presented by the Cultural Arts Series.

The 80-voice, all male chorus was formed in 1981 by the late Dr. Arpad Drazs under the umbrella of the University of South Carolina Music Department.

During the 1981 Spring Concert of Choral organizations at the University of South Carolina, the Mastersingers gave its first performance. Since then, they have performed with the Palmetto State Orchestra, the South Carolina Chamber Orchestra, the USC Symphonic Band, the USC Concert Choir, the South Carolina Philharmonic Chorus, as well as numerous area church and high school choirs.

Early in 1983, the chorus, after competitive audition, was invited to be one of twelve groups from fifty states to perform at the Bi-annual National Convention of the American Choir Directors Association held at the Tennessee Convention Center for the Performing Arts in Nashville. The Mastersingers received critical acclaim at the performance, and established its

reputation in South Carolina, the United States and abroad.

In 1984, the chorus achieved international recognition by winning second prizes at two of the worlds most prestigious choral competitions, the Llangollen International Musical Gisteddfod in Northern Wales and the Bela Bartok Choral Competition in Debrecen, Hungary.

Active in state as well as in local events, the chorus performed for various religious, professional, governmental, civic and charitable organizations including the Rotary, Jaycees and the Children's Hospital. During Columbia's Bicentennial Celebration, it participated in the Community Worship Celebration, appeared on WIS-TV's Carolina Today Show, premiered the Bicentennial Hymn, "Columbia", and performed on the steps of the State House during the Bicentennial Pageant of History.

The chorus includes men from many business and professional careers such as medicine, insurance, finance, the clergy, teaching, real estate, publishing, and the military. Students as well as active and retired men are included.

Tickets are \$7 general admission, \$4 students and are available at the Wheelwright Box Office.


in estuary sedimentation and will be developing future collaborative research with members of the Marine Science Department. For further information, contact Paul Gayes, ext. 2213.

The seminar on Pseudoscience will be conducted Monday, November 23 at 1:30 p.m., and Tuesday, November 24 at 11:30 a.m., in room 120 of the Science Building. Many forms of pseudoscience, including astrology, will be discussed from a scientist's viewpoint.

Tuesday, November 24 at 8 p.m., Dr. Safko will give a public lecture in the Fine Arts Little Theatre, entitled "Gravity and Black Holes." The talk will not be overly technical. It will be of special interest to those who want to learn something about one of the fundamental forces in nature and about some of the most bizarre objects astronomers believe to populate our universe.

Charlotte Artist to Make Presentation

The Art Department and the Waccamaw Arts and Crafts Guild are delighted to announce the appearance of Polly Dove, mixed media artist from Charlotte, N.C.

Ms. Dove will deliver two presentations in our area. The first, on Thursday, November 12 at 8 p.m. at the Trinity Episcopal Church (30th Avenue N. on Hwy. 17, Myrtle Beach), will be a slide presentation and talk about her work. The second, on Friday, November 13 at 10 a.m. in the Fine Arts Building, will focus on art and technology and will include a viewing of her work.

Since 1970 Ms. Dove has been a member of the Art Faculty of Central Piedmont Community College, Charlotte, N. C. She holds an M.F.A. from George Washington University (Washington, D. C.) as well as a degree in Art History from Mary Baldwin College (Virginia).

In 1984 she was a Fullbright Fellow to the Netherlands. Ms. Dove has received a number of important grants and fellowships including ones from the North Carolina State Arts Council, the Charlotte Arts and Sciences Council and the League for Innovation through the Fullbright-Hayes Commission.

Pauline Dove is best known for her work combining traditional art materials and comtemporary technology. She often begins her pieces with xerox or other electronically produced work that she then alters and adapts by adding colour pencil or acrylic paints. She is a recognized pioneer in this field and has been included in every major Southeastern exhibition dealing with this extraordinarily innovative field.
