Dr. John L. Safko To Present Seminar

The Physical Science Department of the School of Natural and Applied Sciences will present a seminar and public lecture by Dr. John L. Safko, professor of physics and astronomy at USC-Columbia. The seminar on Pseudoscience will be conducted Monday, November 23 at 1:30 p.m., and Tuesday, November 24 at 11:30 a.m., in room 120 of the Science Building. Many forms of pseudoscience, including astrology, will be discussed from a scientist's viewpoint.

Tuesday, November 24 at 8 p.m., Dr. Safko will give a public lecture in the Fine Arts Little Theatre, entitled "Gravity and Black Holes." The talk will not be overly technical. It will be of special interest to those who want to learn something about one of the fundamental forces in nature and about some of the most bizarre objects that astronomers believe populate our universe.
