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Afro-Am History Month Activities Continue

The celebration of Afro-American History Month continues Tuesday, February 2, with an afternoon workshop for Leadership Challenge participants and a free evening program for students and the public at 7 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Keynote speaker for both events is Reuben M. Greenberg, Chief of Police for Charleston. The theme is "Blacks in Education, Glancing Back, Moving Forward." Greenberg was formerly with police departments in San Francisco County, California; Savannah, Georgia, Opa-Lock, Florida; and Orange County, Florida. He has taught at California State University, the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, and Florida International University.

He received his bachelor's degree from San Francisco State University, and a master's in public administration and a master's in city planning from the University of California at Berkley.

In addition to Greenberg's lecture, the program will feature music by Hilda McKiever, media specialist at Aynor High School, and Leslie McIver, band director for Conway High School. A reception in Wheelwright mezzanine will follow the program.

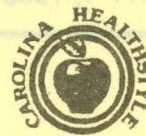
