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

Coastal To Host Elderhostel

The Office of Continuing Education announces Coastal will be hosting its first Elderhostel on February 7 through 12 and February 21 through 26.

Elderhostel is a network of colleges and universities throughout the country who host academic enrichment programs for people over the age of 60.

This conference was originally scheduled for one week but due to the tremendous response, another week was scheduled. Both weeks are fully booked with a maximum of 50 people attending each session. People will be attending from Washington (state), New York, Minnesota, Texas, Connecticut, and various other states.

Program topics include "The Constitution" presented by Eddie Dyer, associate professor of political science, and Paul Peterson, associate professor of government and international studies, "Low Country History", and "Coastal Environment", in additional to various other topics.

A reception will be held on campus Wednesday, February 10 where Col. William Baxley, associate chancellor, and other faculty/staff personnel will speak. Robert Elvington, conference director, will conduct a campus tour to further stimulate interest and encourage participants to relate a positive image upon returning to their home state.

The Office of Continuing Education also plans to schedule additional weeks of hosting Elderhostel during the fall of 1988 and winter of 1989, and encourages faculty and staff to participate in making presentations to this group. Elderhostel has a mailing list of 400,000 across the United States and Coastal is honored to host such distinguished guests.

Topics presented were "ABWA Continuing Education: Verbal and Nonverbal Communication, Motivation /Enthusiasm," and "Organization and Personal Intregrity." All presentations were developed and approved by the National American Business Women's Association.

o Karen Carpenter, assistant professor, School of Education and Health Professions, has successfully completed the requirements for a Ph.D in educational administration. Her dissertation was titled "The Relationship between Job Characteristics, Work Motivation, and general job satisfaction of academic middle managers for baccalaureate nursing."

o Dr. Richard Dame, professor of marine science, recently had an article published in the journal Continental Shelf Research. The article entitled "The New Flux of Inorganic Matter by an Intertidal Oyster Reef," focuses on the uptake at release of suspended particulate matter on oyster reefs in North Inlet near Georgetown. Oyster reefs are identified as major processors of particulate material in estuaries because of their high rates of filtration and feces production. While biological processes, such a filtration, are important in the removal of material from the water, physical processes, such as water velocity, are important in the resuspension of particulate materials on reefs.

o Dr. Susan Libes, assistant professor of marine science, attended the 1988 joint meeting of the American Geophysical Union and American Society of Limnologists and Oceanographers held on January 16 through 22 in New Orleans. She presented a paper entitled "The Isotope Geochemistry of Particulate Nitrogen in the Peru Upwelling Area and the Gulf of Maine.
