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Policy Change For Distribution of Payroll Checks

As Coastal continues to grow, we face new challenges and problems. With an ever-expanding payroll, it has become necessary to revise our system of payroll distribution. Also, switchboard personnel (who distribute checks) are often temporary employees or students who are not familiar with all Coastal employees. The following changes have been made to ensure proper paycheck delivery.

Beginning with the March 15 payroll, employees will be asked to show a picture identification (Coastal I.D. or driver's license) in order to pick up paychecks. This change is necessary to ensure proper delivery of each paycheck to the appropriate person.

Also, beginning March 15, employees will be asked to sign the check roster, rather than just initialing by their name. If one person is picking up another employee's paycheck, written permission must be delivered at the time the check is picked up. You must show your identification in order to pick up any paycheck.

Direct deposit slips will continue to be handled in the same manner as before. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.
