## Department of International Studies To Present Latin American Programs

The Academy Award winning Argentine film, *The Official Story*, an acclaimed treatment of Argentina's recent "dirty war", will be shown on Monday, March 21, at 4 p.m., in the Fine Arts Little Theatre.

Professor Medofilo Medina, of the National University of Colombia, will speak on the subject "Historic and Contemporary Origins of Colombian Violencia" focusing on violence in contemporary Latin America, at 7 p.m. at the Fine Arts Little Theatre.

Following Medina's presentation Professors Richard Collin and James Henderson, department of international studies, will join the speaker in an informal discussion of the increase in violence throughout the Americas in recent years. The Medellin Cartel and the international drug trade, as it relates to the ongoing crisis in Panama, will be particular subjects of discussion.

A free Latin American food buffet, served in the lobby of the Fine Arts Building, will precede Professor Medina's lecture.

Dr. John W. Kenelly, alumni professor of mathematical sciences at Clemson University, a

leading mathematician and math educator, will visit our campus on March 24 to deliver speeches at 2:30 p.m. and 4:30 p.m.

Dr. Kenelly has been chief reader in mathematics for the Educational Testing Service and serves as the director of advance placement reading. He chairs MAA's (Mathematical Association of America) Committee on Placement Examinations, and is one of its nationally recognized visiting lecturers and curriculum consultants. His visit is partially sponsored by MAA.

## Mac Frampton Concert Date Announced

Pianist Mac Frampton and his trio will perform Tuesday, March 29 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

A musician with a keen appreciation for the contemporary pop and jazz sounds, Frampton is at home in a wide variety of musical settings. In concert, he is known for his energetic performing style and appealing personality, and for the way he combines elements of pop, rock, and classical traditions to create his distinctive musical arrangements.

During the past 15 years, Frampton has taken his show to more than 1600 halls around the world. Although he performs some 100 dates each year, no two are the same. He designs every program to appeal to each individual audience. His program might include "Moonlight Sonata", "Rhapsody in Blue", "Sailing", "Thriller," or a string of audience requests which he turns into a spontaneous medley.

Frampton has appeared with dozens of symphony orchestras as well as performers Bill Cosby, Roberta Peters, Roberta Flack, John Davidson, and many more. He also has found time to release ten record albums and complete a motion picture sound track.

His show at Coastal will include solo segments as well as selections with a percussionist and bass player.

The Mac Frampton Show is presented by the Wheelwright Council for the Arts. Tickets are \$7 adults and \$4 for students, and are available at the Wheelwright Auditorium Box Office, ext. 2502.

## "Great Carolina Soccer Shootout" Tournament Announced

The Great Carolina Soccer Shootout tournament will take place the weekend of March 26 and 27 at Coastal. The "Shootout", in its second year, will feature soccer action from top teams in the southeast.

The four competing teams are Clemson University, national champions; the University of South Carolina, second in the nation; the University of North Carolina, fifth in the nation; and Coastal, ranked tenth in the south.

Clemson's Bruce Murray holds the Hermann Award, the equivalent to the Heisman Trophy in football.

"The best soccer in the United States will be played at the tournament," said Paul Banta, coordinator and developer of the tournament and soccer coach at Coastal.

## Buddhist Monk To Visit Coastal

From March 20 through 27, the Reverend Bhikkhu Mahinda will be in residence at Coastal as a guest of the School of Humanities and Fine Arts. "Bhikkhu" is the proper address for a fully ordained but junior Buddhist monk. Bhikkhu Mahinda became a novice at age 11 and was fully ordained at age 20. His home is a small monastery in Sri Lanka that serves as the religious center for the surrounding villages.

Bhikkhu Mahinda obtained his undergraduate degree at the University of Peradeniya in Sri Lanka, one of the most respected and traditional universities in South Asia. The President of Sri Lanka personally selected him for a Fulbright grant to obtain his graduate degrees at Harvard Divinity School.

His presence at Coastal offers a unique learning experience. He may lecture in various classes and be available to answer questions. The point is to learn about the underlying philosophy that motivates hundreds of millions of people in Asia in the same way that Christianity or Judaism motivates us.

On Thursday, March 24, from 7 to 9 p.m., Bhikkhu Mahinda will teach the Buddhism class currently offered by the Office of Continuing Education. This session will be open to the general public, free of charge. The class normally takes place in the Academic Building room 119, but may be moved elsewhere if there is an overflow crowd.
