Pianist Mac Frampton Concert Scheduled

Pianist Mac Frampton and his trio will perform Tuesday, March 29 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

A musician with a keen appreciation for the contemporary pop and jazz sounds, Frampton is at home in a wide variety of musical settings. In concert, he is known for his energetic performing style and appealing personality, and for the way he combines elements of pop, rock, and classical traditions to create his distinctive musical arrangements.

During the past 15 years, Frampton has taken his show to more than 1600 halls around the world. Although he performs some 100 dates each year, no two are the same. He designs every program to appeal to each individual audience. His program might include "Moonlight Sonata", "Rhapsody in Blue", "Sailing", "Thriller," or a string of audience requests which he turns into a spontaneous medley.

Frampton has appeared with dozens of symphony orchestras as well as performers Bill Cosby, Roberta Peters, Roberta Flack, John Davidson, and many more. He also has found time to release ten record albums and complete a motion picture sound track.

His show at Coastal will include solo segments as well as selections with a percussionist and bass player.

The Mac Frampton Show is presented by the Wheelwright Council for the Arts. Tickets are \$7 adults and \$4 for students, and are available at the Wheelwright Auditorium Box Office, ext. 2502.

USC Coastal Carolina College Offers Travel And Study In England

Graduate and Continuing Education is sponsoring a summer study program at Manchester College in Oxford, England, July 14 to August 12. The opportunity is open to everyone, although to receive academic credit you must be enrolled at a campus in the USC system.

A total of four weeks will be spent at Manchester College where those involved will be able to sample Oxford traditions while enjoying the small-class atmosphere.

Participants in the travel and study program will depart from the Charleston Airport on July 14 and will return to Charleston August 12.

Part of the trip will include planned excursions, covered by a general fee.

Students may register for one or more of the following graduate and undergraduate courses: Dramatic Perspectives on Literary Themes; Studies in the Mystical Tradition; Religion and Literature; Spiritual Autobiography; Advanced Study of LanguageDevelopmentandCommunicationSkillsin Early Childhood Education; and Play Theory and Early Learning.

During the first week of residency, USC Columbia's University 101 Program will also sponsor a three-day non-credit workshop, "Humanism in American Higher Education", which will feature a presentation by Dr. Ron Eaglin, chancellor of Coastal.
