Kearns Hall Dedicated

On March 31, the academic building at Coastal was named Kearns Hall in a dedication ceremony honoring Raymond and Mary Lou Kearns of Myrtle Beach.

The brief ceremony included the unveiling of a portrait of the couple which will hang permanently in the foyer of Kearns Hall. Coastal Educational Foundation President James J. Johnson presented Mr. and Mrs. Kearns with a copy of the portrait and expressed the foundation's appreciation for their generosity and support to the college.

"It has been a privilege working with people like you who have given to the college," Johnson said. "I believe that the people who benefit the most are those who are givers and I hope that you both experience the joy of giving today."

Chancellor Ron Eaglin, speaking on behalf of the college, praised Mr. and Mrs. Kearns for their support of the college and for their strong belief in the importance of providing educational opportunities for the young people of this region. "In a special way, Raymond and Mary Lou Kearns have touched each and every student on this campus, and Kearns Hall will be a permanent tribute to them," Eaglin said.

Student Government President Richard Weldon represented the students of Coastal at the dedication.

"On behalf of the students, we are proud to have this building named in your honor," Weldon said. "It serves as a fitting and lasting tribute to you. Your gift will benefit students from this day forward."

Upon completion of the dedication ceremony, Mrs. Kearns expressed she and her husband's gratitude and love for the college.

"We just love it here and everybody here," she said. "We never thought we would have our names on a building like this. We feel like we have adopted 3,600 children." USC COASTAL CAROLINA COLLEGE Office of Public Relations, PO Box 1954, Conway, SC 29526

In 1986, Mr. and Mrs. Kearns made the largest single gift in the history of the college when they donated a 33 acre tract of land valued at \$1.5 million. The property was later sold and the income from the sale was placed in the Coastal Educational Foundation's General Endowment which supports the library, scholarships, enrichment programs for students such as field studies and research projects, and faculty development.

Raymond and Mary Lou Kearns, both Oklahoma natives, came to Myrtle Beach in 1942 when Mr. Kearns, then an airman in the United States Air Force, was assigned to Myrtle Beach Air Force Base. After World War II, Mr. Kearns left the service, but by then, the young couple had fallen in love with the area and decided to settle here.

They opened their own floor covering business in 1949, operating out of the garage under their Flagg Street apartment in Myrtle Beach. As the business grew and expanded, they moved to Oak Street, then to North Kings Highway, and finally to a location on 10th Avenue North.

In 1979, they sold Kearns Floor Covering Company and retired. The couple began to think about sharing some of their own good fortune with the community, and decided to give the property they had invested in years before to Coastal Carolina College. They wanted to give something back to their community, and they felt a gift to the local college would be an appropriate way to show their appreciation.

On March 14, 1988, the University of South Carolina Board of Trustees approved the proposal to name the academic building in their honor. The building houses classrooms, the schools of Education and Business Administration, and Continuing Education and Graduate Programs.

o Dr. Paul T. Gayes, assistant professor of marine science and geology, has recently been invited to participate in the International Geologic Correlation Programme (IGCP) Project 274; "Quaternary coastal evolution; case studies, models and regional patterns". This will be a five-year Unesco sponsored project to develop a programme for an integrated, interdisciplinary study of coastal and shelf areas of the world to explain local-to-global variations in the Quaternary evolution of coastal and shelf areas. Dr. Gayes will attend the inaugural meeting of IGCP 274 held in Amsterdam during September 1988.

o Tommye Ellison and Pat Taylor, at the request of Congressman Robin Tallon, represented the School of Education and Health Professions at a field hearing for the Agricultural Subcommittee on Conservation, Credit, and Rural Development. The field hearing, held at the Marion Vocational Center, was one of three hearings to be held in the United States.

Subcommittee Chairman Ed Jones of Tennessee, who is widely respected for his nineteen-years of service to rural America, listened to testimony from a wide range of public officials, private citizens and researchers involved in rural development. The purpose of the field hearing was to gather input for a bill designed to strengthen and rebuild rural America. (The Rural Area Revitalization Act).

o Thomas E. Jones, assistant professor of theatre and speech and director of Wheelwright Auditorium, attended the annual conference of the Popular Culture Association held in New Orleans, La. He presented several papers at the conference and chaired a panel during the four-day event. This national conference, with over five hundred sessions, offered many stimulating presentations of research being conducted in various areas of our culture.

o Steve Nagle, associate professor of English,

presented "Marginal Modals and the Restructuring of the English Modals" at SECOL XXXVIII, the Spring conference of the Southeastern Conference on Linguistics, March 24 through 26 in Memphis, Tennessee. He also chaired a session on syntax.

o Maura Kenny, assistant professor of art, presented a slide lecture on her paintings to Myrtle Beach High School art students on April 4.

o **Bobbie Lawson**, adjunct instructor of art, has been appointed to a three-year term on the Accommodations Tax Advisory Board by the Myrtle Beach City Council.
