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

"Women's Reality" Conference

"Women's Reality" is the theme of this year's annual women's conference to be held at Coastal May 7 from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Concurrent sessions on important topics affecting today's woman will run throughout the day.

The conference on women is designed to benefit any woman or man interested in learning more about living and working with women, according to Sally Hare, conference coordinator and assistant chancellor for Academic Affairs and education professor.

This year the conference will specifically include issues that appeal to women in higher education, the black woman, and the undergraduate.

Professionals throughout the state will be present to offer their knowledge on subjects such as women and medical issues, dealing with sexual harassment, distrust, racism, competition, and legal issues affecting women in South Carolina.

The keynote address will be given by Dr. Anne Wilson Schaef of Boulder, Colorado.

Schaef is the author of the books: <u>Women's Reality, Co-Dependence</u>, <u>When Society Becomes An Addict</u>, and <u>The Addictive Organization</u>.

An internationally known psychotherapist, lecturer, and writer, Schaef did her doctoral work in clinical psychology at Washington University in St. Louis.

Schaef is also the co-founder of the Women's Institute of Alternative Psychotherapy and conducts her own private practice in Colorado. A great deal of her time is spent training professionals in process therapy and conducting intensive workshops throughout the world.

Registration will begin at 8:30 a.m. Books and crafts will be available for purchase throughout the day and Schaef will be available to autograph her books.

The registration fee is \$65 and includes lunch.

Graduate Seminar In Journalism Offered This Summer

Mal Deans, former newspaper editor in such major cities as Philadelphia, Richmond, Los Angeles and Denver, will teach a graduate seminar in journalism at Coastal this summer.

Deans, who moved to Myrtle Beach last year, was a tenured professor of journalism at the University of Colorado in Boulder. Prior to that, he was readers' representative, or

ombudsman, and a Sunday columnist for the Rocky Mountain News in Denver. He has been assistant managing editor of the Philadelphia Bulletin, and served as a reporter and editor in Richmond, San Diego and Los Angeles. He is a graduate of Washington and Lee University in Virginia.

The graduate seminar Deans will lead is "Editorial Interpretation, Policy and Management." The course is another in a series of graduate seminars conducted by the College of Journalism and Mass Communications at the University of South Carolina, and offered at Coastal. A seminar in communications law, taught by Dr. Erik Collins of the USC faculty, is being taught at Coastal this spring.

"Mal Deans is a fine professional, and he will bring a strong media background into the classroom with him," said Dean Joseph Shoquist of the College of Journalism and Mass Communication. "We are delighted that he is in the area and that we can involve him in the excellent graduate program we are building at Coastal."

"Young People's College" Scheduled

Young People's College, an enrichment program for children ages 4 through 13, will be held from July 11 through August 11 at Coastal.

Children: A Celebration of the Arts is a summer program designed to challenge the student, with concepts and activities which are not usually found in the traditional school program. Students will be able to explore academic, fine art and physical recreation programs in ways that will allow use of creative skills, and in the process see the interrelationships of different subject areas.

Enrollment is open to all students who demonstrate average to above average ability in the traditional classroom setting, and are motivated to exploring new areas of interest not usually open to them during the school year. Enrollment will be limited to 20 students per program, and will be taken on a first come first served basis. Early registration is advised.

Classes will meet Monday through Thursday, July 11 through August 11. Classes will meet for 90 minute blocks of time, with time allotted for lunch. Students may bring their lunch or eat in the campus cafeteria. Classes for the 4 to 6 year old children, held off-campus will meet from 9 a.m. until 11:45 a.m. on Monday through Thursday.

Garland Honored For "Children At Risk" Program

Audrey Garland, continuing education director on campus, received a creative programming award from a national

association on Sunday, April 17 for her work on a "Children at Risk" program held at Coastal November 21 and 22, 1987. The award of achievement was presented to Garland at the 1988 National University Continuing Education Association (NUCEA), National Conference held in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

The NUCEA program, in its seventy-third year, honors members' outstanding contributions to the NUCEA and the field, as well as recognizing members' achievements in innovative programming, marketing and promotion, community development and services, research and publications, and many other areas. National, regional, and divisional awards are given to members.

Garland said that the "Children at Risk" program that she coordinated involved a conference for people, such as parents and social workers. "At risk" children could include children who have problems reading, physical and emotional problems, family abuse problems, children with suicidal tendencies, and children who are stereotyped and may not be accepted, explained Garland.

The conference covered such topics as children of divorce, social-emotional problems with children who are "at risk," a session on latch-key children, and counseling needs for families with handicapped children.

Garland first joined Coastal as a graduate assistant in the Media/Learning Resources Center in 1978. In 1980, Garland served as a graduate assistant in Continuing Education and Graduate Studies and since 1981, she served as assistant director, coordinator, and presently, director of Continuing Education.

The "Children at Risk" program has also won recognition as a program of excellence in the regional category in region III. Garland received this honor at a ceremony during the week of April 24 in Jackson, Mississippi.
