## School Of Education And Health Professions Begin "Phonefriend" Project

Phonefriend is a new community service project, which operates daily Monday through Friday from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m., by the School of Education and Health Professions.

Many young people today come home from school and have to spend a few hours alone while their parents are still at work. What if one of those children wanted a question answered with their homework and another one needed to know where to get help in an emergency, and what if one of those children was lonely and just wanted someone to talk to? Phonefriend, an after-school telephone help-line service, can help all of these children who may need assistance when parents are not available.

The service was introduced recently in approximately 25 area schools to students in kindergarten through sixth grade with informational bookmarks and stickers sent to them by the college.

According to Dennis Wiseman, dean of the school of education and health professions, there will be three lines available operating out of the School of Education and Health Professions Office on campus.

Education majors at Coastal will have the opportunity to serve as the operators for the service, gaining valuable experience for themselves as well as providing a beneficial service to area young people.

Individuals who answer the phones when a child calls are trained to provide information to the caller, make referrals when the situation suggests, and to listen and be a friend. These students are also trained to inquire of children with problems, "What would your parents want you to do in this situation?"

Confidentiality is respected with Phonefriend. For data collection purposes, the child is asked his or her first name, school he or she attends and age. The caller's phone number is requested only if it is felt that it might be necessary to call the child back.

Phonefriend originated from Penn State University and the first site in South Carolina that used the service was Rock Hill at Winthrop College. The service has been recognized as a valuable community service by the National Office of the American Association of University Women in its recent awarding of grants for such projects.

Since the service's debut at Coastal on Monday, April 11, it has proven to be quite successful, according to Wiseman. Already it is being considered to make available another line for the young callers.

The program is supported by the Horry County Higher Education Commission, GTE of the South, Horry Telephone Cooperative, Pepsi-Cola Bottling Company, and Burger King.

## "Young People's College" Scheduled

Young People's College, an enrichment program for children ages 4 through 13, will be held from July 11 through August 11 at Coastal.

*Children: A Celebration of the Arts* is a summer program designed to challenge the student, with concepts and activities which are not usually found in the traditional school program. Students will be able to explore academic, fine art and physical recreation programs in ways that will allow use of creative skills, and in the process see the inter-relationships of different subject areas.

Enrollment is open to all students who demonstrate average to above average ability in the traditional classroom setting, and are motivated to exploring new areas of interest not usually open to them during the school year. Enrollment will be limited to 20 students per program, and will be taken on a first come first served basis. Early registration is advised.

Classes will meet Monday through Thursday, July 11 through August 11. Classes will meet for 90 minute blocks of time, with time allotted for lunch. Students may bring their lunch or eat in the campus cafeteria. Classes for the 4 to 6 year old children, held off-campus will meet from 9 a.m. until 11:45 a.m. on Monday through Thursday.

## Graduate Seminar In Journalism Offered This Summer

Mal Deans, former newspaper editor in such major cities as Philadelphia, Richmond, Los Angeles and Denver, will teach a graduate seminar in journalism at Coastal this summer.

Deans, who moved to Myrtle Beach last year, was a tenured professor of journalism at the University of Colorado in Boulder. Prior to that, he was readers' representative, or ombudsman, and a Sunday columnist for the Rocky Mountain News in Denver. He has been assistant managing editor of the Philadelphia Bulletin, and served as a reporter and editor in Richmond, San Diego and Los Angeles. He is a graduate of Washington and Lee University in Virginia.

The graduate seminar Deans will lead is "Editorial Interpretation, Policy and Management." The course is another in a series of graduate seminars conducted by the College of Journalism and Mass Communications at the University of South Carolina, and offered at Coastal. A seminar in communications law, taught by Dr. Erik Collins of the USC faculty, is being taught at Coastal this spring.

"Mal Deans is a fine professional, and he will bring a strong media background into the classroom with him," said Dean Joseph Shoquist of the College of Journalism and Mass Communication. "We are delighted that he is in the area and that we can involve him in the excellent graduate program we are building at Coastal."
