# **Coastal Joins ACT**

In April, Coastal Carolina College joined the American College Testing Program (ACT) in the field testing of ACT's new college sophomore level exam, the Collegiate Assessment of Academic Proficiency (CAAP). All items for CAAP were written by two and four-year teaching faculty at public and private colleges and universities throughout the nation. The exam assesses foundational academic skills in four areas: reading, writing, mathematics and critical things. CAAP is designed to assist institutions with academic program and individual student evaluation.

Over 30,000 student in forty states participated in the CAAP field test. ACT will now analyze the results and finalize the CAAP exams for use during the pilot period which begins on September 1 of this year. School officials will be receiving the results from the April field test in June.

ACT is pleased to congratulate Coastal Carolina College on its leading role in the development of the CAAP as a national standardized exam which can help institutions of higher education assess selected student learning outcomes and evaluate essential components of their general education program.
