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## Henry B. Burroughs, Sr. Establishes Chair at USC Coastal

Coastal has reached another benchmark in its history with the development of its first academic chair, established by Henry B. Burroughs, Sr. of Conway in memory of his father and mother, Franklin Augustus Burroughs and Iola Buck Burroughs. The chair is in recognition of their contributions to the economic and educational welfare of Horry County.

The gift of stock in a privately owned corporation, will provide income to support the chair which will cost approximately \$25,000 annually.

The idea for the chair, which will be in the School of Humanities and Fine Arts, grew out of Mr. Burroughs' life-long interest in preserving the history and culture of the Waccamaw Region. The rich and unique history of Horry County deserves the attention of a professional scholar. This region has been and will continue to be important to the growth and development of South Carolina, and its study should be an integral part of the academic programs offered to our young people at Coastal Carolina College. It is his hope that this chair will provide a vehicle through which this can be accomplished.

Chancellor Ron Eaglin said that one of the primary goals of the chair will be to revitalize the Waccamaw Regional Studies Program which was started in 1980. "Mr. Burroughs and other members of his family laid much of the ground work for this project in the late 1970's when they secured the help of Coastal in cataloging the extensive collection of archival material related to the history of Burroughs and Collins Company," Eaglin said. "At that time, our history scholars recognized the important role this family has had in Horry County's proud heritage."

Eaglin said the chair will enable Coastal to attract an eminent scholar in the field of history. Currently, a nationwide search is being conducted for the scholar who will lead this project. The program should be fully under way by fall 1988.

"Endowed chairs such as this," Eaglin said, "provide the mechanism for attracting new faculty and recognizing current faculty of the highest reputation. These faculty bring depth and relevance to the curriculum because of their expertise in selective fields of study. Such faculty also will attract additional promising students to the college."

Eaglin said, "The development of this chair demonstrates that Coastal has come of age and that it is ready to take its

place among other leading institutions in the southeast by following the precedent of establishing an endowed chair to insure continued academic excellence."

Born in 1872 in Conway, Franklin Augustus Burroughs spent most of his life affiliated with, and as an officer of, Burroughs and Collins Company which was organized in 1866 and which was incorporated under the Laws of the state of South Carolina in 1895. He and Iola Buck Burroughs, born in 1876 in Bucksport, were married in 1896. Henry B. Burroughs, Sr., born in 1907, was one of five children.

Henry Burroughs said he admired his parents for many qualities, particularly the way they loved people and cared about the welfare of others in the community. His parents were kind and compassionate not only to their children and members of the family but also to persons in the community.

## Drug Education And Prevention: A Summer Institute

The Office of Graduate and Continuing Education will conduct a two-week summer institute on "Drug Education and Prevention: A Summer Institute" on Monday, June 13 through Friday, June 24 from 8:30 a.m. until noon.

The institute is designed to give teachers, coaches, and counselors information on drug education and prevention. Special topics include: Drugs and The High School Athlete, Teaching Students about Drug Prevention, Drug Laws, Signs of Drug Users, and more.

Courses may be taken on a non-credit basis or as three hours of graduate credit in physical education or psychology. Teachers wishing to take courses for recertification points rather than graduate credit need approval from the school district staff development director.

Course instructors are Dr. Paul Stanton, USC Coastal psychology professor, former high school teacher and coach, and well-known speaker and counselor, and Tom Riker, former Gamecock basketball star and Knicks basketball player.

New students seeking graduate credit, who have not had a USC graduate course, MUST apply to the graduate school and have official transcripts sent in advance. New students

who are applying for a degree will be able to register for only one semester prior to being fully admitted to a program. For an application packet, call the USC Graduate School Admissions at 1-800-922-9755. A non-refundable fee of \$25.00 will apply to all new students.

Continuing students must check on their registration eligibility. To register, students holding a non-degree status must have a continuing enrollment form APPROVED AND ON FILE IN COLUMBIA prior to registration.

Certification requirements must be cleared through the Office of Teacher Certification in Columbia, telephone number 734-8466.

Registration and applicable fees must be received by the June 1 deadline. Non-credit course fee is \$175.00 and graduate credit fee is \$275.00. Textbooks may be purchased the first day of class.
