Direct Inward Dial Accessed

Computer Services and Communications announce the Direct Inward Dial equipment is now in place on campus allowing direct dial access to campus telephones without going through the switchboard.

The new East Conway exchange, 349 plus the extension number will dial directly to that particular telephone. All current telephone extensions will remain the same, with the exception of the Chancellor's office, which is now 2001.

Example: To call Coastal's Computer Services and Communications Department from a Conway exchange, dial 349-2084. The call will be answered in the Computer Services Department instead of the switchboard.

The current telephone numbers using the 347, 448 and 546 exchanges will continue to be answered and relayed by the switchboard operator. Private line numbers will also remain the same.

Conversation Cut-off Problems

Some extensions have recently experienced a problem with telephone calls being cut off; therefore, AT&T has replaced most components in switch. This problem seems to be corrected; however, if you experience any further cut-off problems, contact Kay Alford or the Computer Services and Communications Department, ext. 2084.

o **Paul Banta**, soccer coach, was selected as one of several international coaches to teach for the first Jamaican Football (Soccer) Federation Coaching Licensing Program sponsored by the Jamaican Football (Soccer) Federation to be held in July. Coaches involved in this program are coming from Europe, Central America, South America, and Canada. The licensing is an intense four-day program to be held at the Jamaica School of Physical Education in Spanishtown. Previously, Coach Banta coached in Jamaica from 1977-1979 at Munro College and worked with Santos Football Club, who played in the National Premier League. Banta also worked with the national team coach.
