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

## **Coastal Receives \$50,000 Gift From Coastal Federal**

Coastal Federal Savings and Loan Association of Myrtle Beach has given \$50,000 to Coastal for construction of the E. Craig Wall Sr. School of Business Administration Building.

The gift was made to Coastal Educational Foundation as part of its current campaign to raise \$2.2 million in private funds to supplement \$9.6 million in state funds for construction of the building. The capital campaign will also raise \$2.8 million for cultural and educational endowments at the college.

"Coastal Federal and Coastal Carolina College were both started the same year, for the same purpose - to provide local opportunities for local citizens," said Coastal Federal President J. T. Clemmons. "For 35 years, we've both been in the business of helping to make dreams come true. Both institutions have grown and prospered and become strong, vital entities in the community."

"I'm comparing an institution of higher learning with a financial institution only in the sense that both began as ideas along with a lot of hard work and dedication, and both were made possible by local people pulling together," Clemmons said. "This was during a time when beach front lots were selling for \$5250 and college degrees were much harder to obtain because students had to leave the county to attend school and the majority never returned. I wonder if these far sighted people realized at the time all the doors they were actually opening for everybody?"

Chancellor Eaglin praised Coastal Federal officers and board members for their support. He said that the gift is extremely important to the college and the community in that it will move us much closer to our fund raising goal and our anticipated ground breaking next year. The E. Craig Wall building will provide classroom space and educational facilities for about 1/3 of Coastal's undergraduate students who take business administration and computer science courses. "It is important to note," Eaglin said, "that our business community and other local residents will benefit as well. Upon its completion in the early 1990's, the Wall Building will be the focal point for the college's Economic Development Center - a clearing house for regional economic data and statistics, will become a training and educational resource for the business community, and will support a research center for local economic development. This gift is an investment in our young people and a demonstration of faith in the continued prosperity of this region. It shows that Coastal Federal is a concerned and active participant in insuring a productive future for the Waccamaw/Grand Strand Region."

Coastal Federal is a federally chartered, mutually owned thrift institution with more than 150 employees. There are ten offices in the area from Sunset Beach to Pawleys Island and west to Conway. The institution has maintained close ties with Coastal Carolina College and was a major contributor to the 1979 capital campaign to build Wheelwright Auditorium.

"The Board of Directors of Coastal Federal has always been a strong supporter of the college," said Clemmons. "We take pride in the quality of everything the college has to offer the people of this county, and a lot of these people are Coastal Federal people - our employees and their families. We support the college because we have benefited from the contributions it has made. Many of our employees are Coastal Carolina Alumni."


