

Joyner Appointed to Chair

Chancellor Eaglin has announced the appointment of Dr. Charles Joyner as Burroughs Distinguished Professor of Southern History and Culture at Coastal.

Joyner, professor of history at the University of Alabama, was selected following a national search to fill Coastal's first academic chair, established by the late Henry B. Burroughs Sr. of Conway in memory of his father and mother, Franklin Augustus Burroughs and Iola Buck Burroughs.

A native of Horry county, Joyner is an internationally recognized scholar who has published and lectured widely in the United States, Great Britain, Canada, Norway, New Zealand, Australia, and Yugoslavia. He is the author of two books and more than thirty articles.

Joyner's Down by the Riverside: A South Carolina Slave Community was the 1987 winner of the National University Press Book Award, given by the Eugene M. Kayden fund to the best book in the humanities published by a university press. The book also won second place in the prestigious University of Chicago international forklore competition.

Down by the Riverside, now in its seventh printing, is a portrayal of slave life on the rice plantations of the Waccamaw River in the South Carolina lowcountry. It has been called "the finest work ever written on American slavery." This fall the book will be required in several courses at Harvard University as well as many other universities in the United States and Canada.

In the fall of 1986 Joyner was visiting professor of history at the University of California, Berkeley. In the spring of 1987 he served as Ford Foundation Professor of Southern Studies at the University of Mississippi.

He has been a consultant for several television productions, and for the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation, the National Geographic Society, the Smithsonian Institution, and the Library of Congress.

Joyner is a graduate of Myrtle Beach High School and Presbyterian College. He earned a Ph.D. in history from the University of South Carolina and a second Ph.D. in Folklore and Folklife from the University of Pennsylvania. He also did post-doctoral work at Harvard University.

Barbara Palmer, teacher-in-residence, from Socastee Elementary School. Palmer has more than seven years teaching experience on the elementary level. Her degrees are a B.S. from the University of South Carolina at Spartanburg, and an M.Ed. from Converse College.

Jeffrey P. Linder, assistant professor of computer science, who was an instructor of computer science at Western Illinois University. He holds an M.S. in computer science from Western Illinois University, a B.S.Ed. from Illinois State University, and an associate degree from Illinois Valley Community College.

Dr. William F. Thomas, assistant professor of accounting, who was an assistant professor at George Washington University. He has a B.A. from Wofford College, and a Ph.D. from University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

Dr. John Beard, assistant professor of English, whose field is contemporary literature. Beard earned his B.S., M.A. and Ph.D. from Florida State University.

Dr. Charles Joyner, Burroughs Professor of Southern History and Culture and director of the Waccamaw Regional Studies Project. Joyner returns to Coastal from the University of Alabama. He earned his Ph.D. in history at the University of South Carolina, and Ph.D. in folklore and folklife at the University of Pennsylvania.

Linda Kuykendall, instructor of English and speech, who has been an adjunct faculty member at Coastal. Her field is communications. Kuykendall earned a B.A. from Loyola University of the South at New Orleans and an M.S. from University of Southwestern Louisiana.

Marine Science And Geology To Host Guest Speaker On Marine Litter

Ms. Elizabeth Day, area marine extension agent for the South Carolina Sea Grant Consortium will speak on "Marine Litter," Tuesday, September 20 at 11:30 a.m. in the

Science Building, room 106. The program is free and open to the public.

Day is involved in the Horry and Georgetown County planning of the "National Beach Clean-Up" program and will be seeking volunteers from Coastal to participate in this program. Volunteers will also collect raw data to contribute to a study of the types of marine litter that exists along the South Carolina coast.

South Carolina's beaches, harbors and tidal inlets are being flooded with trash. More than being unsightly, it's dangerous. Out at sea, marine animals and birds by the hundreds of thousands are dying as a result of eating plastics and other debris in our oceans, or from being entangled in it.

"National Beach Clean-Up" day is Saturday, September 24. This is the first time this event will be formally held along the grand strand and is an opportunity to help clean up the marine environment. Volunteers, both as individuals and organizations, are invited to sign up for the beach of their choice, where they will be given degradable bags.

Disability Continuation Income Plan Available To State Employees

Sick leave normally provides for continuation of income for short periods of illness; however, many of us could face financial difficulties should we suffer a long-term disability caused by either accident or sickness.

Through an arrangement with the Jefferson-Pilot Life Insurance, State employees may purchase Income Protection Insurance which would provide tax-free income during periods of disability. The premiums may be paid through Payroll Deduction.

Delphin And Romain To Perform At Coastal

The Cultural Arts Series at Coastal will open its 1988-89 season with a Sunday afternoon soiree with pianists Winfred Delphin and Edwin Romain, who were recently adopted as true sons of Charleston. The performance will be held Sunday, September 18 at 2:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium and is the first selection in the Wheelwright Passport.

The duo are delightful interpreters of classic piano repertoire and are known for their exuberant interpretations of bravura compositions, with the team's treatment of Mozart being described as bright and effective.

Delphin and Romain began their musical partnership while attending college in 1968, and made their professional debut in 1977 as soloists with the Symphony of the New World in New York's Carnegie Hall. Since then, they have performed throughout the world, playing with the linest of orchestras including the Cleveland Orchestra, Atlanta Symphony, and the New Orleans Philharmonic.

Presently, they are the only black duo pianists who tour and perform professionally, displaying an energy and enthusiasm in their performances tempered by smooth coordination and impeccable ensemble.
