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Delphin And Romain To Perform At Coastal

The Cultural Arts Series at Coastal will open its 1988-89 season with a Sunday afternoon soiree with pianists Winfred Delphin and Edwin Romain, who were recently adopted as true sons of Charleston. The performance will be held Sunday, September 18 at 2:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium and is the first selection in the Wheelwright Passport.

The duo are delightful interpreters of classic piano repertoire and are known for their exuberant interpretations of bravura compositions, with the team's treatment of Mozart being described as bright and effective.

Delphin and Romain began their musical partnership while attending college in 1968, and made their professional debut in 1977 as soloists with the Symphony of the New World in New York's Carnegie Hall. Since then, they have performed throughout the world, playing with the finest of orchestras including the Cleveland Orchestra, Atlanta Symphony, and the New Orleans Philharmonic.

Presently, they are the only black duo pianists who tour and perform professionally, displaying an energy and enthusiasm in their performances tempered by smooth coordination and impeccable ensemble.

Coastal Receives Drug And Alcohol Education Grant

Coastal has received a \$120,067 grant from the U. S. Department of Education's Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE) for a two-year Drug and Alcohol Prevention Program.

According to Chancellor Eaglin, "The most immediate impact of this project will be to create a campus environment in which substance abuse is perceived by all students as a negative activity. Our purpose is to educate students about the dangers of abusing drugs and alcohol so they can make responsible choices."

The project has been funded to develop and implement a comprehensive educational program to reduce drug use and alcohol abuse among Coastal's campus population of more than 3,800 students. Project components include development of an institutional policy regarding substance abuse for students, faculty and staff; implementation of proactive prevention programs that reach out to students and provide healthy alternatives to students caught-up in substance abuse; development of curricular and training programs; and development of a peer program through which campus housing resident assistants receive training in the recognition of and response to drug and alcohol abuse situations.

Receipt of the grant was announced by Dr. Richard H. Moore, assistant vice chancellor for grants and sponsored research. The proposal was written by Peter Lecouras of the English department and grants office, with assistance from Dr. Joe Mazurkiewicz, director of counseling, and Kim Montague, director of residence life. Lecouras will serve as program director.

Financial Management Workshop

Hain has also been a registered principal with Southmark Financial Services and assistant vice-president of advanced marketing for Georgia International Life.

Marine Science And Geology To Host Guest Speaker On Marine Litter

Ms. Elizabeth Day, area marine extension agent for the South Carolina Sea Grant Consortium will speak on "Marine Litter," Tuesday, September 20 at 11:30 a.m. in the Science Building, room 106. The program is free and open to the public.

Day is involved in the Horry and Georgetown County planning of the "National Beach Clean-Up" program and will be seeking volunteers from Coastal to participate in this program. Volunteers will also collect raw data to contribute to a study of the types of marine litter that exist along the South Carolina coast.

South Carolina's beaches, harbors and tidal inlets are being flooded with trash. More than being unsightly, it's dangerous. Out at sea, marine animals and birds by the hundreds of thousands are dying as a result of eating plastics and other debris in our oceans, or from being entangled in it.

"National Beach Clean-Up" day, sponsored by the South Carolina Sea Grant Consortium and the Center for Environmental Education in Washington, is Saturday, September 24. This is the first time this event will be

formally held along the Grand Strand and is an opportunity to help clean up the marine environment. Volunteers, both as individuals and organizations, are invited to sign up for the beach of their choice, where they will be given degradable bags.

Rebels And Redcoats Tour Set For September

The traditions and events that make up the rich history of Horry and Georgetown counties will be recounted during the Rebels and Redcoats History Tour, sponsored by Graduate and Continuing Education, on Friday, September 23, from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The all-day tour will be conducted by Rod Gragg, author of *Pirates, Planters and Patriots: Historical Tales of the South Carolina Grand Strand*, and will visit historical sites in the Waccamaw-Grand Strand Region. Among the sites visited are Hampton Plantation, a plantation built circa 1730 which is listed on the National Historical Register for Architecture and was the home of the first governor of South Carolina; Hopsewee Plantation, home of Thomas Lynch, a signer of the Declaration of Independence; Battery White, a huge Confederate Fort over-looking Winyah Bay; Kingston Presbyterian Church on the banks of the Waccamaw River in Conway; the Horry County Museum; and Prince George Winyah Episcopal Church in Georgetown which is said to have been a stable used for British horses during the Revolution.

The tour leaves Wheelwright Auditorium at 9:30 a.m. and returns at approximately 5 p.m. The \$35 admission fee (\$20 for children) covers transportation and admission to all sites. A dutch lunch will be available.

This is the first tour of the season. Additional tours will be October 21 and November 18.

College Fishing Match Celebrates Fifteenth Anniversary

The fifteenth renewal of what remains a unique college fishing competition, the Coastal Carolina Invitational, is a highlight of National Hunting and Fishing Week in the Carolinas. Deep-sea fishing for grouper, snapper, and king mackerel out of Little River and Murrells Inlet brings college students from the U.S. and Canada to Myrtle Beach each fall. Three days of competition and seminars, September 21-23, lead up to National Hunting and Fishing Day, Saturday, September 24.

The collegians and their coaches who fish in the invitational have varied backgrounds. One year a group of graduate students came from several Japanese universities, flown to the U.S. by the Ryobi Corporation. The Yale team has included varsity football players, when the invitational was held in the spring, and baseball players in the fall. This year Yale even has a national women's collegiate skeet-shooting champion on its team. The Yale coach, Tom Migdalski, is the son of Ed Migdalski, who started the first intercollegiate fishing matches in Nova Scotia in 1953.

The Western Ontario University team, Canada's traditional representative, has included varsity squash players and graduate students in exercise physiology. Dr. John Fairs, the Western coach, has as his hobby designing defensive keys for the Western Ontario football team, a frequent Canadian national champion.

Closer to home, the U.N.C.-Wilmington team has included varsity baseball players and marine science students, while Clemson University has been represented by graduate agricultural science students who liked salt water fishing. Francis Marion college coach Don Kelly, a professor in the business administration department, spends many of his weekends fishing at the Little River and Murrells Inlet jetties, and his student-anglers have profited from his wisdom with no less than four championships in the fourteen year history of the invitational. Most of the Francis Marion anglers have been brought up river-fishing for bass and bream.

Coastal's Dr. Richard Moore, author of "Fishes of the Gulf of Mexico," has been chief judge and weighmaster for the collegians since 1974. His talk with slides on the first night of the tournament (Wednesday, September 21, 8 p.m. at Meeting Room #1 at Springmaid Beach) serves as an introduction and orientation on the gamefish of the South Carolina coast. Moore's presentation and that of James Rathbun of the Atlantic Coast Conservation Association (Thursday, September 22, 8 p.m.), are free and open to the public.

Besides experiencing Gulf Stream headboat fishing, student anglers will learn how to tag and release fish for further study. The fish they catch, whether bottom-fishing (snapper, blueback seabass, grouper, and grunt) or by live-lining baitfishing near the surface (king mackerel, dolphin, and cobia) are donated to the Murrells Inlet and Little
