Theater To Present "Little Shop of Horrors"

"Little Shop of Horrors," a musical comedy in which young lovers are threatened by a person-eating plant, is the first theater production of the season for Coastal Carolina Theater. The first performance is set for Friday, October 7 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, with additional performances on Saturday, October 8 at 8 p.m., and Sunday, October 9 at 2:30 p.m.

"Little Shop of Horrors" originated as a film that was shot in just two days by Roger Corman when he was challenged by a studio employee to come up with a script and shoot a movie before the storefront setting that was used for a previous movie was torn down. The result was a delightful

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horror-comedy that was later remade in 1986, starring Rick Moranis as Seymour, Ellen Greene as Audrey, and Steve Martin as Orin Scrivello, D.D.S.

Playing the lead role in Coastal Carolina Theater's production of "Little Shop of Horrors" is David Pokopac as Seymour, a shy and awkward employee at a plant shop who is lovethirsty for Audrey, another plant shop employee, played by Kelley Swaim.

Audrey's boyfriend, a dentist who enjoys pulling teeth in a sadistic manner, is portrayed by Archie Buchan. Audrey II, the plant that has a yen for human blood is played by Marc Kaufmann, featuring Preston McKever-Floyd as the voice for the people-eater. Cast as Mushnik, owner of the plant shop, is Marc Gura.

Other members of the cast include Chiffon, played by Rachel Smith; Crystal, played by Valerie Gore; and Ronnette played by Maryann England. Mrs. Luce and Snip are played by A. Maine Baker, D.M.D.

The director of the play is David Millard, assistant dean of humanities and fine arts. In charge of costumes for the production is Margaret Fain, assistant librarian reference/non-print media. Lighting and the design of the set is coordinated by Jeff Nichols, visiting professor of theater and speech. Philip Powell, instructor of music, is musical director, and choreographer for the play is Rebekah Browne Vereen, a student at Coastal.

"Little Shop of Horrors" book and lyrics are by Howard Ashman. Music is by Alan Menken. It is based on a film by Roger Corman with screenplay by Charles Griffith.

Burroughs Lecture Series Announces Speakers

The Burroughs Lecture Series in Southern History and Culture has been inaugurated at Coastal. The lecture series is established by the Burroughs Chair in Southern History and Culture, endowed earlier this year by Henry B. Burroughs Sr., in honor of his parents.

The series will bring to the campus several renowned scholars who will speak on topics relating to the history and culture of the Waccamaw Region. "I am very excited to be able to bring to the college such distinguished scholars," notes Charles Joyner, organizer of the series. Earlier this year, Joyner was appointed Burroughs Distinguished Professor of Southern History and Culture at Coastal.

The lectures, which are free and open to the public, will be held in the Fine Arts Little Theater from 8 to 9 p.m. on the dates indicated.

October 3:

Historian Daniel C. Littlefield will speak on "Rice and Slaves: African Ethnicity on Lowcountry Rice Plantations." Littlefield has recently joined the history department at the University of Illinois after teaching more than a decade at Louisiana State University. He is the author of Rice and Slaves; ethnicity and the Slave Trade in Colonial South Carolina.

October 10:

Dale Rosengarten will speak on "Seagrass Basketmakers of the Lowcountry." She was also guest curator of the exhibit of the same name at McKissick Museum. A native of New York Rosengarten did her graduate work at Harvard University and currently resides in McClellanville, South Carolina.

October 24:

The Chosen Sisters of Plantersville, South Carolina, will present "A Concert of Lowcountry Spirituals and Gospel Music." The Chosen Sisters were honored this year at a joint session of the legislature with the state's first annual Folk Heritage Award. They have sung together for three decades. Their music, sung a capella in the traditional style of the lowcountry, is punctuated by polyrhythmic handclapping and footstamping. In addition to performing in numerous churches in the Waccamaw Region, they have sung at the South Carolina State Fair and at the National Folk Festival in Massachusetts.

November 21:

Folklorist John Michael Vlach will conclude the series with an address on "Coastal Development and Lowcountry Culture." He has done extensive fieldwork in South Carolina and is author of Charleston Blacksmith: The Work of Philip Simmons and of The Afro-American Tradition in the Decorative Arts. Vlach is professor of american studies at George Washington University in Washington, D.C.
