## Blanton Named Director Emeritus of Coastal Educational Foundation

James P. Blanton, a Coastal Educational Foundation director since its formation in 1954, has retired from the organization and was recently honored for his many years of service when the foundation named him director emeritus.

The Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc., is the non-profit corporation formed by the founders of Coastal Carolina College in 1954.

"Having been one of the original foundation members, and having been with the foundation throughout the years, I had the opportunity to see things accomplished that we first dreamed of when the foundation was formed," said Blanton. "My life has been based on helping to improve the educational system throughout Horry County, and I am glad to be a part of the growth and the opportunities that are available as challenges to young people today."

Blanton said that although he is retiring from the organization, he will never retire from it in his mind.

"I believe there is a time in everyone's life when they must realize that they must pass the torch on to the next generation," said Blanton. "But my role throughout the years has been to lend my support to those who can carry the ball, and if the foundation would like my input in the future or my services I will always be available."

Blanton says that the Coastal Educational Foundation along with other members of the community have been able to meet the goal of expanded higher education, and he is looking forward to seeing the educational system in Horry County expand even farther in the future.

"When the foundation was first formed, it was hard for people to get an education," he said. "It takes many people to accomplish what has been done so far, and I am proud that I have been able to contribute my time and assistance throughout the years."

## Phonefriend Service For Local Children Continues

"Phonefriend," an after-school telephone help-line service at Coastal for children who may need to talk to someone or need assistance in an emergency, while parents are still at work is now available.

"Phonefriend" was implemented at the college in the spring and is a community service project operated by the School of

Education and Health Professions. The service is provided to students of local schools, in kindergarten through the sixth grade. Support of the project is provided by the Horry County Higher Education Commission, GTE of the South, Horry Telephone Cooperative, Pepsi-Cola Bottling Company, and Burger King.

Children may use "Phonefriend" daily, Monday through Friday, 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. Education majors, who serve as operators, will answer questions about homework, assist a child in an emergency situation, or talk to a child who is lonely. All operators are instructed and trained in the phone-answering and assisting processes.

Confidentiality is respected with "Phonefriend." For data selection purposes, the child is asked his or her first name, the school he or she attends, and age. The caller's phone number is requested only if it is felt that it may be necessary to call the child back.

"Phonefriend" originated at Penn State University and the first site to use the system in the South was Winthrop College in Rock Hill. It has been recognized as a valuable community service by the national office of the American Association of University Women.

## Graduate And Continuing Education To Sponsor "Children's Literature Conference"

Paul Zindel, author of numerous novels for young people, including *The Pigman*, will be a featured speaker at "Happily Ever After: Children's Literature Across the Curriculum," a children's literature conference to be held at Coastal Friday, November 4 and Saturday, November 5.

The two-day literature program is a whole language conference for teachers of kindergarten through twelfth grade, librarians, counselors, and administrators who use children's literature in reading, writing, and all subject areas.

Speaking at the conference will be Paul Zindel, along with wife Bonnie Zindel, who co-authored the popular teen book *Pardon Me, You're Stepping on My Eyeball!*; local author,

Eleanora Tate who has written The Secret of Gumbo Grove and Just an Overnight Guest; and Nancy Larrick, author of A Parent's Guide to Children's Reading, Piping Down the Valley's Wild, and On City Streets: An Anthology of Poetry.

Cognitive workshops will be held throughout the conference featuring topics such as "Censorship, Conscience, and Cowardice," "Distinctive Children's Literature as Models for Content Area Writing," and "Storytelling-the Sound of Story." Autograph sessions, questions and answers with the authors, and a "Poetry Alive" segment are also scheduled.

Due to an outstanding response of over 600 people registering for the conference, registration is now closed.

## Prague Symphony Orchestra To Perform At Coastal

The Prague Symphony Orchestra, among the premier orchestras of the world, will perform at Coastal on Tuesday, October 25 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Founded in 1934, the Prague Symphony Orchestra has completed more than 40 acclaimed international tours, performing throughout Western Europe, the United States, Great Britain, the Soviet Union, Scandinavia, Greece, Turkey and Poland.

While excellent in the traditional repertoire, the orchestra is best known for its rich and exciting interpretations of Bohemian masterpieces. In its early years, the ensemble worked mostly in film recording and developed such artistic, political, and social significance that it became attached to the City Council of Prague in 1952. Its name was then changed from Symphony Orchestra FOK (Film-Opera-Koncert) to the Prague Symphony Orchestra and it began giving public performances on a regular basis under such distinguished conductors as Dr. Vaclav Smetacek, Jindrich Rohan, and Vaclav Neumann, who led the orchestra from 1956 to 1963.

The orchestra's current chief conductor and artistic director is Jiri Belohlavek, who was born in Prague in 1946. Belohlavek joined the orchestra in 1977 and has toured with them to North America, Germany, Spain, Britain, Austria, and Switzerland. Belohlavek has also maintained his association with the Czech Philharmonic, where he was assistant conductor from 1970 to 1972.

In addition to the orchestra's public performances, it collaborates with Czechoslovak Radio and records for Supraphon and Panton Records.

## The Chosen Sisters To Perform In Burroughs Lecture Series

The Burroughs Lecture Series in Southern History and Culture will feature The Chosen Sisters presenting "A Concert of Lowcountry Spirituals and Gospel Music" on Monday, October 24 at 8 p.m. in the Fine Arts Little Theater. The program is free and open to the public.

The Chosen Sisters of Plantersville, South Carolina were honored this year at a joint session of the legislature with the state's first annual Folk Heritage Award. They have sung together for three decades. Their music, sung a capella in the traditional style of the lowcountry, is punctuated by polyrhythmic handclapping and footstamping. In addition to performing in numerous churches in the Waccamaw Region, they have sung at the South Carolina State Fair and at the National Folk Festival in Massachusetts.

Vicki M. Gardner has been appointed to the position of Alcohol and Other Drug Prevention Coordinator at Coastal and will provide leadership to the college's newly established Substance Abuse and Education Program as funded by the Fund for Improvement of Post Secondary Education (F.I.P.S.E.).

Gardner has been in private counseling practice in Myrtle Beach since October 1986 and was previously employed at the Life Center at Coastal Carolina Hospital in Conway-Myrtle Beach, the Waccamaw Center for Mental Health, Central Fulton Community Mental Health Center at Grady Memorial Hospital in Atlanta, Georgia, and the Georgia Mental Health Institute in Atlanta. She has a total of 16 years of professional work experience as a mental health technician, substance abuse counselor, coordinator of alcohol and drug services, and therapist/educator.

She has a B.A. degree from Emory University, and an M.S. in Community Mental Health from Tulane School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine in New Orleans.

## Coastal Carolina People

o Donald J. Millus, professor of English, recently presented a paper on William Tyndale the sixteenth century Bible translator and controversialist, at Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana. Millus's paper dealt with Tyndale's rhetoric and his use of scripture in his commentary on the first epistle of St. John.

The conference was the 1988 English Renaissance Prose Conference, "The Lively Image," sponsored by the dean of humanities, social science, and education of Purdue University. In addition to sponsoring numerous papers on Tyndale, the Committee for Renaissance Prose marked the occasion by the publication of "A Working William Tyndale Biography," greeted by many participants as another step toward a modern critical edition of the works of this important Reformation writer.

Millus is a member of the editorial board for the Complete Works of William Tyndale, to be published by the press of the Catholic University of America. He is scheduled to teach a course on sixteenth century literature in the spring term, with Erasmus, More, and Tyndale as some of the major authors considered.

o Dr. Peter B. Barr, associate professor of management, and Linda R. Henderson, assistant professor of accounting, presented a paper entitled "Faculty Retention and Organizational Climate in Schools of Business," at the annual meeting of the Institute of Management Science. The paper will be published in the Association's 1988 proceedings.
