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Coastal's First Wheelwright Angels Announced

Nearly all of Coastal's cultural programming is made possible with funding from the Coastal Educational Foundation through gifts from individuals and corporations who support the arts.

Coastal's first corporate and individual Wheelwright Angels were announced during a ceremony prior to the performance of The Prague Symphony on Tuesday, November 25, honoring two who have assumed leadership roles in supporting the arts in this region by becoming Wheelwright Angels.

The first individual Wheelwright Angel is George J. Bishop III, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Waccamaw Corporation and Waccamaw Clay Products Company, Inc. Mr. Bishop also serves as managing partner of Outlet Park and Pine Island Land Investors. He is a director and founder of Anchor Bank and Anchor Financial Corporation and also serves on the board of directors of Conway Hospital, Business Development Corporation of South Carolina, and Clemson University Foundation. Mr. Bishop is a member of the President's Advisory Council of Clemson University. He is past president and member of Myrtle Beach Rotary Club.

Born in Charleston, South Carolina, he received his B.S. degree in ceramic engineering from Clemson University in 1952. He is married to Dorothy Jones Bishop; they have four children and five grandchildren.

Coastal's first corporate Wheelwright Angel is Myrtle Beach Farms, which was incorporated in 1912. Myrtle Beach Farms had its beginning in the 1860s when Mr. F. G. Burroughs moved from eastern North Carolina to Horry County in search of long leaf pine forests for his turpentine manufacturing operation. He found that he could purchase land for slightly more than what it cost to lease it, and he began to buy large parcels. It has been said that at one time, he owned almost two-thirds of Horry County. The turpentine industry began to decline in 1890, and the Burroughs family turned to logging and later diversified into farming.

In the early 1900s, the company built The Seaside Inn and the Pavilion, which served visitors who came to the beach by train and by wagon. At about the same time, Mr. Simon B. Chapin, a New York and Chicago industrialist, decided to make a real estate investment along the coast of South Carolina. After deciding there was potential for a resort at Myrtle Beach, he made a deal with the Burroughs family, and Myrtle Beach Farms was incorporated.

By the 1930s, the old company store was known as Chapin

Company and the land holding company was Myrtle Beach Farms. Despite two devastating fires and a hurricane, the Pavilion was rebuilt and has continued to thrive.

In the 1960s, the company changed its focus from farming to golf and tourism. Its first golf course opened in 1966, and the second in 1975. The same year, Myrtle Beach Farms opened its regional shopping center, Myrtle Square Mall. Today, the company has two additional strip shopping center (with another in the planning stages), two lighted 27 hole par-three golf courses, two lighted driving ranges, residential subdivisions, a medical park, and several commercial subdivisions.

Myrtle Beach Farms Board of Directors are Larry L. Biddle, James Egerton Burroughs, Timothy G. Dargan, Elsie A. Burroughs, Henry B. Burroughs Jr., Dr. Hal B. Holmes Jr., and Harry Hartshorne Jr.

Wheelwright Angel is an exclusive designation reserved for those who make gifts of \$100,000 or more to the endowment for the cultural arts. Through the endowment, these gifts provide a perpetual income to support performing arts programs and to insure that they will continue for generations to come. Portraits of these special donors will hang permanently in Wheelwright Auditorium in recognition of their generosity and commitment to the performing arts.

The portrait of George J. Bishop III was unveiled during the ceremony. The college has commissioned Myrtle Beach artist Jane Charles to paint a portrait of Mr. F. G. Burroughs and Mr. Simon B. Chapin for Myrtle Beach Farms. This portrait will also be placed in Wheelwright Auditorium upon completion.

Rebels And Redcoats Tour Scheduled

The traditions and events that make up the rich history of Horry and Georgetown counties will be retraced during the Rebels and Redcoats History Tour on Friday, November 17, from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. The tour is the last of the season.

The all-day tour will be conducted by Rod Gragg, author of Pirates, Planters and Patriots: Historical Tales of the South Carolina Grand Strand, and will visit historical sites in the Waccamaw-Grand Strand region. Among the sites visited will be Hampton Plantation, a plantation built circa 1750 which is listed on the National Historical Register for Architecture and was the home of the first governor of South Carolina; Hopsewee Plantation, the home of a signer of the Declaration of Independence; Battery White, a huge Confederate Fort overlooking Winyah Bay; Kingston Presbyterian Church on the banks of the Waccamaw River in Conway; the Horry County Museum; Prince George Winyah Episcopal Church in Georgetown, which is said to have been a stable used for British horses during the Revolution; and Friendfield Slave Village, one of the few remaining slave villages in the nation.

The tour leaves Wheelwright Auditorium at 9:30 a.m. and returns approximately at 5 p.m. The \$35 admission fee covers transportation and admission to all sites. A dutch lunch will be available.

o **Dr. Karen D. Carpenter**, assistant professor of nursing, has been accepted as a test item writer for the Critical Care Certification examination offered by the American Association of Critical Care Nurses. The CCRN certification assesses the ability of the Critical Care Nurse to utilize data, formulate problems and plan nursing interventions at a critical care level. This decision making process is one of the most important aspects of critical care nursing and is stressed in the examination. The CCRN Certification Program was established in 1975 by the American Association of Critical Care Nurses to formally recognize professional competence of critical care nurses.

As of this date, 29,700 critical care nurses nationwide have passed the CCRN examination.

o **Dr. Peter B. Barr**, associate professor of management, presented a paper entitled "Market Penetration In Electrical Goods Industries: A Study of a Small Business in Northeast Region," at the annual meeting of the Institute of Management Science. The paper will be published in the Association's 1988 proceedings.

o **Patricia Kirkland**, assistant professor of nursing and chairperson of the department of nursing and health, attended the South Carolina Nurses Association Convention in Myrtle Beach on October 20 and October 21. Kirkland gave the welcoming address and attended workshops and seminars. The theme for this year's convention was "A Celebration of Caring." On October 21, she served as the official delegate to the convention representing the Waccamaw District.

Among the continuing education programs offered during the convention were Nursing Retention and Recruitment; Nursing's Future in South Carolina; Health Policy and Practice: Changing Years; Caregivers of the Elderly; Working with Groups; Finding Funding for Grants and Research; Linking Research with Practice; The Role of School Nurses in Comprehensive Health Education; Nursing Management: A Changing Tradition; How to Initiate, Develop, Implement, and Evaluate a Continuing Education Workshop; Case Management: A Special Role for Nurses; Health Promotion and Disease Prevention Concepts; Peer Assistance Forum; Implementing Nursing Diagnoses in Acute Care Settings; and, ANA Issues and Answers.
