Administrative Officer Appears In Book For War Achievements

William J. Baxley, Jr., associate chancellor for College Advancement, is featured with a photo in The Illustrated History of Chargers-The Vietnam War, written by F. Clifton Berry Jr., a military officer who served as operations officer of the 196th Light Infantry Brigade in Vietnam from 1967 to 1968. The book was published in June of 1988 by Bantam Books.

Baxley is pictured in the book at the time he served as commander of the First Battalion, 6th Infantry in the Vietnam War. The photo caption explains that combat fatalities were kept low in the infantry because Baxley insisted that his men wear flak jackets and steel helmets at all times.

Baxley said that he first discovered his photo was in the book when his sister-in-law, who lives in New Mexico, sent him a copy. Her husband, General Richard T. Knowles also appears in the book.

According to Baxley, the photo brought back a lot of memories.

"It provided a quick and vivid return to history when I saw the photograph," said Baxley. "It brought back the memory of friends, both officers and enlisted men, and how they were such great Americans."

Baxley has won numerous awards and recognition for his achievements while serving in the army. The list includes: The Silver Star for Gallantry in Action; The Distinguished Flying Cross for Heroism while Participating in Aerial Flight; The Bronze Star Medal for Heroism in Ground Combat; The Air Medal for Heroism While Participating in Aerial Flight; and The Legion of Merit, First Oak Leaf Cluster for Exceptionally Meritorious Conduct in the Performance of Outstanding Services.

The awards were achieved between the years of 1967 to 1968.

"It is a surprise when someone says you are going to get an award for just doing your job," said Baxley. "I care about people, and I think if you do care, you take actions that you don't have to think about - you just do it. An example would be if you were to see a child drowning, then you try to save that child."

Baxley enlisted in the army in 1944 when he was 17 years-old and in 1950 he graduated from West Point.

In his career, Baxley served as an officer in several command and staff positions which include: infantry

platoon leader; infantry company commander; staff officer; infantry battalion commander; instructor in infantry school; Army Pacific staff officer; Army general staff officer; staff officer in the Office of Secretary of Defense; and resident faculty of the Industrial College of the Armed Forces.

Baxley said that much of his character and his life have been shaped according to the experiences he had in the Vietnam War and in the Army.

"I believe that many of my characteristics were formed during this time in my life," said Baxley. "Work habits, and my philosophy of life are partly based on that time period."

Rebels And Redcoats Tour Scheduled

The final Rebels and Redcoats History Tour of the season, retracing traditions and events that make up the rich history of Horry and Georgetown counties, will be Friday, November 17, from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The all-day tour will be conducted by Rod Gragg, author of Pirates, Planters and Patriots: Historical Tales of the South Carolina Grand Strand, and will visit historical sites in the Waccamaw-Grand Strand region. Among the sites visited will be Hampton Plantation, a plantation built circa 1750 which is listed on the National Historical Register for Architecture and was the home of the first governor of South Carolina; Hopsewee Plantation, the home of a signer of the Declaration of Independence; Battery White, a huge Confederate Fort overlooking Winyah Bay; Kingston Presbyterian Church on the banks of the Waccamaw River in Conway; the Horry County Museum; Prince George Winyah Episcopal Church in Georgetown, which is said to have been a stable used for British horses during the Revolution; and Friendfield Slave Village, one of the few remaining slave villages in the nation.

The tour leaves Wheelwright Auditorium at 9:30 a.m. and returns approximately at 5 p.m. The \$35 admission fee covers transportation and admission to all sites. A dutch lunch will be available.

o **Dr. James J. Farsolas**, associate professor of history, attended the Southern Conference on Slavic Studies, held in Charleston, S. C., on October 20 through 23. He participated in a series of panel discussions concerning Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union.

Dr. Farsolas was invited by Florence Dennis, who teaches the eighth grade English Honor Student class at West Conway Middle School, to speak to the students on the current situation in the Soviet Union. After a brief presentation of the history of the Soviet Union, a question and answer session followed which lasted over one-hour, which the students thoroughly enjoyed the discussion.

o **Bobbie Lawson**, lecturer in the art department, presented a paper at the International Conference on The Outsider in Literature, Philosophy, and the Visual Arts, in Atlanta. The conference involves scholars from schools across the United States and several foreign countries. Her paper, entitled "John Heartfield, Unwitting Outsider," profiled the little-known German artist. She also chaired a session on Folk Art. Coincidentally, her son, Bland Lawson, a doctoral candidate at Florida State University, presented a paper at the conference in one of the literature sessions.
