

Growing Up in South Africa: A South African's Memoirs

Dr. Es'kia Mphahlele

Dr. Es'kia Mphahlele, a distinguished South African writer and scholar, is considered one of the leading black literary voices in South Africa. He has written or edited more than 17 books since his first collection of short stories appeared in 1947. Since his return to South Africa in 1977, after a 20-year exile, he has been professor and head of African literature at the University of Witwatersrand.

What's Right With America

Douglas Edwards

Douglas Edwards has anchored a daily network television news broadcast since August 1948, without interruption, longer than any other broadcast journalist. Edwards was the anchor of "The CBS Television News," which was broadcast on Saturday nights from 1946 to 1948. In 1948, he assumed anchor duties on CBS News' first Monday-through-Friday evening news broadcast which was titled "Douglas Edwards With the News." In 1962, he moved to the CBS News weekday afternoon shows, an assignment he currently holds with "Newsbreak."

Kimbel lectures are free and open to the public. Tickets may be picked up in the box office beginning two weeks before each performance. The series is sponsored by the Kimbel Trust, the Episcopal Diocese of South Carolina, the Knight Foundation, *The Sun News*, and the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc.

Coastal Theater Series To Present "Bell, Book and Candle"

"Bell, Book and Candle," a comedy about witchery, casting spells, and supernaturalism, is the second theater production of the season for Coastal Carolina Theater. The opening performance is Friday, December 2 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, with additional performances on Saturday, December 3 at 8 p.m., and Sunday, December 4 at 2:30 p.m.

The lead role of Gillian Holroyd, a young lady who beholds the power of witchery and is more talented at her craft than most witches, is played by Jennifer Kallmeyer. Holroyd falls in love with a publisher named Sheperd Henderson, played by Chad Ayers, who breaks off an engagement with another woman, due to a magical spell Holroyd casts on him.

Miss Holroyd, Gillian's aunt and confidante, is played by Doris Hudson. She is also a witch, but does not possess the powerful talents of her niece. Cast as Nicky Holroyd, the brother of Gillian, is Marc Kaufmann, who is a fun-loving but fairly lazy warlock. Kaufmann recently appeared as Audrey II, the plant in "Little Shop of Horrors."

Sidney Redlitch, a successful author who drinks a lot and writes about magic, is played by Willie Shaw.

The director of the play is Jeff Nichols, visiting professor of theater and speech. Stage manager is Suzanne Banks.

"Bell, Book and Candle" was written by John Van Druten.

Tickets are \$7, students \$4, and may be purchased at the door or in advance through the Wheelwright box office.

Opera Carolina To Present "Hansel and Gretel" At Coastal

Humperdinck's classic play, "Hansel and Gretel" will be presented by Opera Carolina, Southeast's largest musical theater company, on Tuesday, December 6 at 8 p.m. in the Wheelwright Auditorium.

Opera Carolina has received rave reviews for its presentation of the fairy tale, "Hansel and Gretel." The familiar story involves a brother and sister, who live with their mother in an impoverished state while the father is away from home trying to find a way to make a living. The children are then banished to the woods by a frustrated

mother. All ends well, when the family reunites at the end, but not before Hansel and Gretel have an adventure in the woods, which includes witches and gingerbread houses.

Opera Carolina's home base is in Charlotte. The North Carolina Arts Council recognizes Opera Carolina as a statewide arts resource and provides grant assistance from funds appropriated by the North Carolina General Assembly. Opera Carolina tours to member states under the auspices of the Southern Arts Federation.

New Student Activities Bulletin Board Procedure

In order to more effectively use limited student activities bulletin board space and to eliminate overcrowding of posted information, the Student Government Association, in conjunction with the Office of Student Activities, is implementing a new procedure for "Student Activities" bulletin boards. The new procedure is as follows:

- o All information for posters must be submitted to the Office of Student Activities no later than three working days prior to the date you wish to have it posted. There will be no exceptions.
- o Information must be specific and complete.
- o Information must be approved by the Office of Student Activities and placed in designated area.
- o The Student Government bulletin board coordinator will collect information daily.
- o All information will be coordinated and printed on 8-1/2" x 11" posters.
- o The bulletin board coordinator will then be responsible for posting information on bulletin boards and removing it at the conclusion of the event.

Note: Individuals wishing to create their own posters may do so provided they do not exceed 8-1/2" x 11". These should also be submitted to the Student Activities Office for approval and posting.

This procedure does not affect departmental bulletin boards.

- o Dr. Ballou Skinner, professor of physics, was an invited participant in a special NASA conference held in Williamsburg, Virginia on November 9 through 11. The conference, recognizing the 25th Anniversary of the NASA/ASSE Summer Faculty Fellowship Program, had as its theme "Looking to the Future of Space: The Next 25 Years. Topics included future research ventures between NASA and the universities, future space missions of the Shuttle, the purposes of the space station, projected space projects of the 1990's, required space technologies for 2000 and beyond, man's exploration of Mars, and NASA's interaction with Washington and the World.
- o Dr. Paul T. Gayes, assistant professor of marine science and geology recently participated in a habitat assessment of the Continental Slope off Savannah, Georgia in conjunction with the South Carolina Department of Wildlife and Marine Resources. The research cruise was conducted aboard the R/V Seaward Johnson of the Harbor Branch Foundation, Ft. Pierce, Florida. Dr. Gayes made four submersible dives in the research submarine, Sea Link II, in water depths of 1800 to 1900 feet describing and sampling bottom habitats and geologic features. Some of the samples taken will be

made available to the Coastal Carolina marine science courses for examination and study and a seminar presentation of the submersible dives will be offered soon.

- o Dr. Jill Sessoms, assistant professor of English, coordinated the sixth annual conference of the South Carolina Association of Developmental Educators, which was held in Hilton Head from November 3 through 5. Approximately 150 persons attended the conference. Dr. Sessoms is president-elect of the organization and will assume the presidency of SCADE in January 1988.
- o Dr. Richard Moore, assistant vice chancellor for grants and sponsored research, attended the meeting of the Southeastern Estuarine Research Society on October 27 through 29 in Jacksonville, Florida. Also at the meeting was Coastal Alum Dr. Mark Peterson (Marine Science), who is currently a postdoctoral researcher at the Harbor Branch Oceanographic Institute in Ft. Pierce, Florida.
- o Dr. Douglas Nelson, professor of marine science and geology, recently attended the 100th anniversary convention of the Geologic Society of America in Denver, Colorado. During the five day meeting, research from a wide variety of geologic related topics were presented. Sea level rise, understanding the most recent ice age and the relation between climate, ocean circulation and ecology of marine organisms were major symposia that were attended.
- o Dr. Gerald Boyles, professor of finance, and Dr. Darcy Carr, associate professor of economics, presented their research paper, "Changes in Investor Preferences Since the October 1987 Stock Market Crash," at the annual meeting of the Institute of Management Science. The paper will be published in the *Proceedings* of TIMS.
