Hedgepath Named Chair Of USC Coastal Carolina College Board Of Visitors

William Hedgepath Jr., president of William F. Hedgepath and Associates in Conway and SunSouth Properties, has been named chair of the recently formed Board of Visitors for the School of Education and Health Professions at USC Coastal Carolina College.

The Board of Visitors is an organization comprised of local individuals, involved in business, professional and community arenas. The board's functions are to strengthen ties between the business community and faculty and students of the School of Education and Health Professions; to provide advice and consultation to college administrators on sources of financial support for various projects and activities of the School of Education and Health Professions; to represent the Waccamaw community and the state by providing service programs and activities; and to offer guidance and input for the development of quality programs in the preparation of graduates for employment in specialized professional areas.

Coastal Theater Series To Present "Bell, Book and Candle"

"Bell, Book and Candle," a comedy about witchery, casting spells, and supernaturalism, is the second theater production of the season for Coastal Carolina Theater. The opening performance is Friday, December 2 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, with additional performances on Saturday, December 3 at 8 p.m., and Sunday, December 4 at 2:30 p.m.

The lead role of Gillian Holroyd, a young lady who beholds the power of witchery and is more talented at her craft than most witches, is played by Jennifer Kallmeyer. Holroyd falls in love with a publisher named Sheperd Henderson, played by Chad Ayers, who breaks off an engagement with another woman, due to a magical spell Holroyd casts on him.

Miss Holroyd, Gillian's aunt and confidante, is played by Doris Hudson. She is also a witch, but does not possess the powerful talents of her niece. Cast as Nicky Holroyd, the brother of Gillian, is Marc Kaufmann, who is a fun-loving but fairly lazy warlock. Kaufmann recently appeared as Audrey II, the plant in "Little Shop of Horrors."

Sidney Redlitch, a successful author who drinks a lot and writes about magic, is played by Willie Shaw.

The director of the play is Jeff Nichols, visiting professor of theater and speech. Stage manager is Suzanne Banks.

"Bell, Book and Candle" was written by John van Druten.

Tickets are \$7, students \$4, and may be purchased at the door or in advance through the Wheelwright box office.

At 7:30 p.m. that evening, Benson will lecture in Wheelwright Auditorium as part of the Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series, which is free and open to the public.

Benson, a film actor since his fifteenth birthday, is also a writer, producer, director, and composer of film scores. His acting credits include *One on One*, *Jeremy*, *The Chosen*, *Ice Castles*, *Tribute* (with Jack Lemmon), and *Harry and Son* (with Paul Newman). He wrote the screenplay for *Jeremy* as well as *One on One*. Benson just completed post production on *Crack in the Mirror* which he also directed and in which he stars.

Benson was Coastal's commencement speaker in May of 1988 and received an honorary doctorate of fine arts from USC. This year, he is artist-in-residence at USC - Columbia and is teaching a year-long course in filmmaking. During the spring semester in Columbia, he will direct a professional feature film, *Modern Love*, which he wrote.

Opera Carolina To Present "Hansel and Gretel" At Coastal

Humperdinck's classic play, "Hansel and Gretel" will be presented by Opera Carolina, Southeast's largest musical theater company, on Tuesday, December 6 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Opera Carolina has received rave reviews for its presentation of the fairy tale, "Hansel and Gretel." The familiar story involves a brother and sister, who live with their mother in an impoverished state while the father is away from home trying to find a way to make a living. The children are then banished to the woods by a frustrated mother. All ends well, when the family reunites at the end, but not before Hansel and Gretel have an adventure in the woods, which includes witches and gingerbread houses.

Opera Carolina's home base is in Charlotte. The company is a member of OPERA America, Inc. and is funded in part, by the National Endowment for the Arts, and the Arts and Science Council of Charlotte-Mecklenburg County. The North Carolina Arts Council recognizes Opera Carolina as a statewide arts resource and provides grant assistance from funds appropriated by the North Carolina General Assembly. Opera Carolina tours to member states under the auspices of the Southern Arts Federation.

Coastal Carolina People

o **Randall A. Wells**, associate professor of English and speech, made a presentation on "Alternatives to the Thesis-and-Support Pattern" at the annual convention of the National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE), on November 19 in St. Louis, Missouri.

Wells distributed examples of the meditation form and the inductive argument written by students at Socastee High School, whose teachers, Debbie Pace and Sandra Nay, had collaborated on the project.

o The Music Educators National Conference recently held a "Performing Arts Medicine Symposium" at Furman University on November 5. The MENC local chapter #958 was represented by Carolyn Cox, associate professor of music and advisor of MENC, and Pat Alexander, advisor of MENC, Matt Morris, president, Patricia Brumer, secretary/treasurer, along with other fellow MENC members. The symposium offered an insight to "Artist Therapy" which is a unique therapy and educational program designed to treat the symptoms and eradicate the causes of pain, weakness or diminished coordination that could impair an artist's ability to perform. This symposium was sponsored by St. Francis Hospital, the Vitality Center Atop St. Francis Hospital, and Furman University.

o Dr. Mike Ferguson, associate professor of biology, presented a paper entitled "Use of foliar application of zoospores of Phytophthora megasperma f.sp. glycinea to assess tolerance in soybean" at the annual meeting of the American Phytopathological Society, in San Diego, Calif. The paper dealt with a novel method to determine resistance to Phytophthora root rot in soybean. Phytophthora root rot is a major disease problem of soybean in the Midwest, causing millions of dollars in lost production. Dr. Ferguson was also an invited speaker at a conference at the same location, entitled "Molecular Approaches to the Genetics and Systematics of the Oomycetes: Phytophthora and Pythium." He delivered a presentation of recent research results on the use of monoclonal antibodies for taxonomy of Phytophthora, particularly the Phytophthora megasperma group. Phytophthora is a plant pathogenic fungus of world wide importance. An international group attended the conference.

o "The Economics and Finance Curriculum: The Last Decade," an article written by Dr. Darcy Carr, associate professor of economics, and Dr. Gerald Boyles, professor of finance, has been accepted for publication in *The Journal of Economics and Finance*. The *Journal* is the referred publication of the Midsouth Academy of Economics and Finance.

o Dr. Gerald Boyles, professor of finance, was the discussant at the Institute of Management Science's annual meeting. The paper discussed was titled, "A Cross-Sectional Analysis of the Implication of Price Changes in Listed Residential Real Estate."

o Peter Lecouras, English instructor and director of the FIPSE Drug Education Project and Waccamaw 70001, attended the South Carolina Association of Developmental Education Conference, November 3 through 5 at Hilton Head, where he made a presentation on "The Process of Writing Grants."

o Coastal was well represented recently at the annual meeting of the Southern Historical Association in Norfolk, Va. Those in attendance from the history department were Dr. Fred Hicks, Dr. Charles Joyner, Dr. Roy Talbert, John Vrooman, and Jim Branham. Also attending was Dr. Jim Henderson from the government department.

o Dr. Jacqueline L. Gmuca, assistant professor of English, was recently elected to the scholarship committee of the Children's Literature Association. The association is a nation-wide organization devoted to promoting scholarship and criticism in the field of children's literature.

o Dr. Ballou Skinner, professor of physics, spoke to the South Strand Kiwanis Club on November 21 at Surfside Beach. His topic was "Looking to the Future of Space: The Next 25 Years."

o David Bomar Smith, instructor of political science and director of planned giving, was appointed to serve as a member of the Textbook Selection and Distribution Study Committee of the State Board of Education. The committee is being requested to study, for South Carolina public schools, the current State Board of Education regulations and procedures as they relate to the adoption process; legislative provisions affecting the free textbook system; contractual provisions; auditing standards and procedures; and, the ordering and distribution process for supplying textbooks to schools.

o Dr. Paul T. Gayes, assistant professor of marine science and geology, recently attended the centennial national meeting of the Geologic Society of America held in Denver, Colorado. While in Denver, Dr. Gayes also participated in the first business meeting of the American Working Group of the International Geological Correlation Programme Project 274 planning the American contributions to the program for the next few years.
