Graduate And Continuing Education To Sponsor New Zealand Trip

If you are looking for a unique gift idea for the adventurous person or favorite teacher on your Christmas list, a summer trip to New Zealand may be the answer.

"Whole Language Down Under," a two-week trip to New Zealand and a one-week trip to Australia, sponsored by Graduate and Continuing Education, is scheduled for July 14 to August 3, 1989.

Individuals will have the opportunity to learn how writing is taught in New Zealand, a country that has a 99 percent literacy rate, by visiting its schools. In conjunction with the trip, a course in whole language will be offered for those who desire graduate or undergraduate credit.

R. Cathcart Smith Cardiac Rehabilitation Center Evaluated

The R. Cathcart Smith Cardiac Rehabilitation Center, a joint venture between Conway Hospital, Inc. and Coastal, underwent an on-site evaluation for full certification on December 9.

In order to verify adherence to their standards, the South Carolina Medical Association sent a survey team of seven members including a cardiologist, registered nurse, exercise physiologist, psychologist, vocational rehabilitation counselor, dietitian and business manager to observe the program in progress and review policies, procedures and patient records.

A summary conference was held after the survey at which time it was announced that the team would recommend full certification to the South Carolina Medical Association for the R. Cathcart Smith Cardiac Rehabilitation Center.

The hospital's administrator of the program is Annette Rabon, and Coastal's coordinator is Marshall Parker.

Graduate And Continuing Education To Offer Educational Egyptian History Trip

A one-day educational trip to the Mint Museum and Discovery Place in Charlotte, North Carolina will be offered by Graduate and Continuing Education on Saturday, January 14, leaving Coastal at 7 a.m.

Although the trip is open to everyone, families with children are encouraged to participate in this educational tour. While traveling to Charlotte, an instructor will explain the exhibit in detail so participants will know what to look for and why the viewing is a once in a lifetime opportunity. Among the many items on display are Egyptian artifacts and builders tools, and items from the burial chamber of Ramesses, who is known as Egypt's greatest Pharaoh and builder.

In the exhibition halls of the Mint Museum, visitors will find breathtaking displays of gold jewelry and other treasures of Ramesses. Articles include the 19-pound solid gold collar known as the Gold of Valor, as well as Ramesses' own gold and lapis bracelets.

Other artifacts in the exhibit highlight the scientific, mathematic, and artistic accomplishments of the time. They include the world's first known clock, the Karnak clepsydra; a remarkable collection of carvings and statues of Egyptian gods, royal families, and animals of the period; and the display of a massive three-ton granite statue of Ramesses the Great.

The Discovery Place, Charlotte's award winning hands-on science museum will feature its display, "A Cortege of Mummies," which consists of a wide array of carefully preserved mummies dating back thousands of years. The focus of the exhibit is the process of mummification, which actually represents one of the earliest forms of science: embalming.

In addition to mummies of various ages, instruments used in mummification along with rare funeral artifacts complement the 1,500 square foot attraction.

The fee is \$48 per person, \$46 children, and includes motorcoach transportation to the Mint Museum, admission to the Discovery Place, and a guided bus tour which will provide an overview of Egyptian history. Payment is due when reservations are made. The last day to register is January 11.

Graduate And Continuing Education To Offer Computer Courses

Graduate and Continuing Education will offer four computer courses Monday, January 16 to Thursday, January 20. The classes will be held at the Cherokee Motor Inn, Myrtle Beach.

Third Quarter Program To Continue At Coastal

Third Quarter, an academic and cultural achievement program for senior citizens, will continue during the spring semester from January 24 through March 16. Classes will meet for one and one-half hours one day a week, on Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday afternoons.

The program is designed to give senior citizens a learning experience, and a chance to become active in a college environment where they can receive academic instruction.

Senior citizens who enroll in the program may choose from six courses this spring. The courses include: Greek Political Philosophy, Dr. Jack Riley, instructor; The Meaning and Significance of the 1988 Elections, Dr. Paul Peterson, instructor; The Landscape and Its Management, Ben Hines, instructor; Our Coastal Environment, Julie Finlayson, instructor; From Script to Stage, Jeffery Nichols, instructor; and Conversational Spanish: A Cultural Adventure, Dr. Elda Wilmont, instructor.

A study conducted approximately four years ago, indicated that a large percentage of Grand Strand residents, age 55 and over, said they believed their academic needs were not being served. Brenda Goldberg, coordinator of the program, said that the classes offered through Third Quarter provide the academic atmosphere that is desired by this age group, but without the pressure of performance.

"When a senior citizen comes to a class, he or she will see that the class is not set up as a traditional classroom," she said. "People have time to indulge into their imaginations and share stories in their various areas of expertise. There are no expectations on performance in the classroom. Students learn just because they want to be there."

To become a member of the Third Quarter program, an individual must be at least 55 years old. A college degree is not a prerequisite for participation.

Membership in the program allows individuals the option of taking from one to five courses offered in the spring. Upon registration, members receive Third Quarter I.D. cards; campus parking stickers; access to the Kimbel Library; and the advantage of discounts toward many campus events.

A fee of \$75 per person is required; \$125 for double registration. Deadline for registration is January 10.

"Children And Teenagers At Risk" Conference Scheduled

David Elkind, author of the books The Hurried Child, Mis-Education: Preschoolers at Risk, and All Grown Up and No Place to Go: Teenagers in Crisis, will be the keynote speaker at the "1989 Children and Teenagers at Risk Conference," Friday, February 17 and Saturday, February 18 at Coastal.

The two-day conference will focus on the themes of "Young Child as Child at Risk," "Black Child as Child at Risk," and "Teenager as Child at Risk."

The featured speaker, Elkind, is a professor of child study at Tufts University and Senior Resident Scholar at the Lincoln-Filene Center. He is president of the National Association for the Education of Young Children and received a Ph.D. in psychology from UCLA.

J. Herman Blake, the Eugene M. Long Professor of Social Change at Swarthmore College, will also be speaking at the conference.

The author of numerous articles and publications, Blake received a B.A. from New York University and an M.A. and Ph.D. from the University of California at Berkeley.

He is the recipient of the following fellowships: Mina Shaughnessy Fellowship; a Rockefeller Foundation Fellowship; a Ford Foundation Advanced Study Fellowship; a Danforth Foundation Fellowship; and the John Hay Whitney and Woodrow Wilson Fellowships.

Change magazine named Blake as one of the Top 100 Emerging Young Leaders in Higher Education.

Blake is also the former president of Tougaloo College in Tougaloo, Mississippi, a liberal arts college of 650 students.

Cognitive workshops will run throughout the weekend as well as separate addresses by the featured speakers.

Two courses will be offered in conjunction with the conference for those who would like to receive graduate or undergraduate credit. The deadline for enrollment for credit is January 15, 1989. The fee for credit registration is \$295 and includes conference, tuition, reception, and materials.

Those who wish to attend the conference only will be registered on a first come-first served basis. Enrollment is limited, so early registration is encouraged. The fee for non-credit registration is \$75 and includes non-credit registration, reception, and materials.

Fees will increase after February 3, 1989.
