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Campus Community Celebrates Founders Day

Coastal Carolina College will honor George Magrath Sr. of Conway and C. Foster Smith of Myrtle Beach, during the annual Founders Day Convocation, Monday, February 6 at 1:40 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. All members of the campus community are urged to attend.

USC President James B. Holderman will address the convocation and introduce Harry Miley, senior executive assistant of economic development for the state of South Carolina, who will deliver the keynote address. Magrath and Smith will receive the coveted Founder's medallion in recognition of their service to the college.

In recognition of this annual convocation, the Chancellor has requested that no other campus activities be scheduled during this time. All faculty, staff, and students should plan to attend.

South African Writer To Lecture At Coastal

Dr. Es'kia Mphahlele, a distinguished South African writer and literary scholar, will speak at Coastal Wednesday, February 8, 7:30 p.m., in Wheelwright Auditorium as part of the Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series.

The program is free and open to the public. Tickets are available on a first-come, first-served basis at Wheelwright box office 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Considered one of the leading black literary voices in South Africa, Mphahlele has written or edited more than 17 books since his first collection of short stories appeared in 1947.

At USC he will teach both undergraduate and graduate courses in traditional and contemporary African literature, including a study of African oral and poetic texts.

He also has taught at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, the University of Denver in Colorado, the University of Zambia and the University of Pennsylvania.

Born and raised in the Pretoria slums, Mphahlele attended St. Peter's Secondary School in Johannesburg, which was widely known for its high standards of academic freedom and scholarship. He earned a bachelor's degree from the University of South Africa.

His outspoken opposition to the South African

government's Bantu Education Act -- intended to lower the standard of education for Black Africans -- resulted in his being banned from teaching in 1952.

From 1955-57, he was fiction editor of *Drum*, a picture magazine designed for a Black audience. At the same time he studied for a second bachelor's degree and a master's degree at the University of South Africa.

In 1957, Mphahlele went into exile in Nigeria, where he taught at a grammar school and later lectured in English language and literature at the University of Ibadan.

He moved to Paris in 1961 and became director of African Programmes at the Congress for Cultural Freedom and co-edited the literary Journal "Black Orpheus."

From 1963-65 he was director of the Chemchemi Creative Center in Nairobi, Kenya, which he helped found under the sponsorship of the Congress for Cultural Freedom and the Farfield Foundation of New York.

He earned his doctorate from the University of Denver in 1968.

Mphahlele ended his exile in 1977. When his appointment as professor of English at the University of the North at Turfloop, South Africa, was vetoed by the government, he became an inspector of schools in the Northern Transvaal.

Since 1979, he has taught at the University of the Witwatersrand in Johannesburg, where he is professor and head of African literature in the department of comparative and African literature.

His books include *Man Must Live*, a collection of short stories (1947); *Down Second Avenue*, an autobiography, (1959); a second collection of short stories, *The Living and the Dead* (1961); *Chirundu* (1980); *Afrika My Music* (1981), a book about his exile and return to South Africa; and a novel, *Father Come Home* (1984).

The African Arts/Arts d'Afrique competition named Mphahlele's novel, *The Wanderers*, best African novel of 1968-69. In 1969, he was nominated for a Nobel Prize in literature.

Coastal To Present Celebration Of Black History Teleconference

"Beyond the Dream, A Celebration of Black History Month," a two-hour telecommunications program that will serve as the national kickoff of celebration of Black Americans, will be aired live via satellite, Wednesday, February 1, in the Edward Singleton Building, room 224, from 1 to 3 p.m. The program is free and open to Coastal faculty, staff and students.

Broadcast live, from the nation's capital, "Beyond the Dream" will bring together distinguished experts who will discuss the contributions that Blacks have made in America, with audiences at colleges and universities, military installations, secondary schools, national associations, and federal and state agencies. The event will provide interaction, enabling the audience to participate, with questions or comments by calling a special toll-free number.

The program will feature prominent scholars including John Hope Franklin, author and pioneer historian; Mary Hatwood Futrell, president of the National Education Association; Mae Jemison, America's first Black female astronaut; and Derek Bok, president of Harvard University.

"Beyond the Dream" will look at Blacks in the fields of education, politics, economics, the military, the arts, sports, entertainment, and social issues. It will also present Black men and women who will make up the next generation of Black leaders in this country.

The program is sponsored by the publishers of *Black Issues in Higher Education*.

Jane Powell To Perform

Singer Jane Powell, nominated as 1989 Campus Artist of the Year and 1989 Jazz Artist of the Year by Performing Arts/Music, an organization that awards top entertainers who perform at college campuses, will perform Thursday, February 9 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Sponsored by the Coastal Campus Union, the concert is part of the college's celebration of its Afro-American Black History Month Program.

Powell performs a variety of music, including jazz and blues, top 40, country, ballads, and show tunes. She has received rave reviews from critics and top performers in the music industry and has been described as outrageous, touching and unforgettable.

A native of Roanoke, Virginia, Powell is considered a favorite on the campuses where she has visited and given concerts. In 1983, when she came to North Myrtle Beach to perform, she left one reporter with this impression: "She is witty, friendly, saucy, and a terrific singer..."

Singer Tony Bennett, who attended one of her concerts in Nashville in 1985, approached Powell after the concert and said, "A certain talent comes along only every 20 years or so, and you're it." That same year, columnist Richard Harrington wrote in *The Washington Post* on her performance with Ray Charles, "she stole the night from a legend."

She travels extensively to perform at assorted clubs and

college campuses, and in 1985 appeared in the movie *Marie*, starring Sissy Spacek. She also tours and appears as the opening act for various musicians, that include Ray Charles, Lionel Hampton, and The Platters.

Powell presently performs with a five-piece funk band. She describes herself as an honest person and performer who sings from the heart.

Pianist Leon Bates To Perform Tribute To George Gershwin

Pianist Leon Bates and singers Eddy Pierce Young and Benjamin Matthews will perform "Gershwin by Request," a musical tribute to George Gershwin, Monday, February 13, at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Bates, a familiar figure on the international concert scene, has performed with the New York Philharmonic, the Philadelphia Orchestra, at the Hollywood Bowl, and the Kennedy Center. He has also performed with the Orchestra Sinfonica dell 'Accademie Nazionale di Santa Cecilia in Rome, and with the Basel Symphony in Switzerland, where he made a classical music video of the Gershwin Concerto in F.

A native of Philadelphia, Bates studied with pianist Natalie Hinderas. His performances of Gershwin in Rome have warranted him five return engagements.

Eddy Pierce Young, soprano, has appeared in recital, opera, and oratorio throughout the world. A national finalist in the Metropolitan Opera Auditions and winner of the San Francisco Opera Grand Finals, Young made her New York recital debut in 1979, receiving critical acclaim from reviews and audience.

Benjamin Matthews, bass baritone, recently returned from Rio de Janeiro where he performed the lead role in "Porgy and Bess" for two months. His other operatic credits include performances with the New York City Opera, the Graz Opera in Austria, and the Philadelphia Grand Opera in a wide diversity of roles. He has appeared as soloist with major orchestras in the United States, Canada, Europe and South America.

The trio's performance of "Gershwin by Request" is filled with the piano music of Gershwin, complete with "Rhapsody in Blue," selections from "Porgy and Bess," and classics such as "Fascinatin' Rhythm," "The Man I Love," and "Strike Up the Band."

Tickets are \$14; \$7 for students, and may be purchased in advance from the Wheelwright box office.

Graduate And Continuing Education Teachers Sought
