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

Campus Community Celebrates Founders Day

Coastal Carolina College will honor George Magrath Sr. of Conway and C. Foster Smith of Myrtle Beach, during the annual Founders Day Convocation, Monday, February 6 at 1:40 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. All members of the campus community are urged to attend.

USC President James B. Holderman will address the convocation and introduce Harry Miley, senior executive assistant of economic development for the state of South Carolina, who will deliver the keynote address. Magrath and Smith will receive the coveted Founder's medallion in recognition of their service to the college.

In recognition of this annual convocation, the Chancellor has requested that no other campus activities be scheduled during this time. All faculty, staff, and students should plan to attend.

C. Foster Smith

C. Foster Smith was born in Florence County in 1919. He is a graduate of the University of South Carolina where he was selected for membership in Phi Beta Kappa, Omicron Delta Kappa, and Who's Who Among Students.

Mr. Smith served in the Army at Hawaii and Okinawa during World War II. He then returned to Myrtle Beach and entered business. He is a retired partner with the Myrtle Beach accounting firm of Smith, Sapp, Bookhout, Crumpler, and Calliham.

Throughout his career, Mr. Smith has been recognized for professional achievements. He was appointed to the South Carolina Board of Accountancy by the governor in 1969, and served as its chairman from 1971 to 1974. He is a member of the American Institute of C.P.A.'s and the South Carolina Association of C.P.A.'s, in which he was president from 1959 to 1960. He is now a senior trustee of the South Carolina Association of C.P.A's Educational Fund.

For ten years, he was a director of People's National Bank in Conway. After a merger in 1969, he became a director of Citizens and Southern National Bank in Myrtle Beach, retiring in 1976.

Active in The First Methodist Church and in a number of civic organizations, he was named to Who's Who in South Carolina and Who's Who in the South and Southwest.

Mr. Smith has been a director of the Coastal Educational Foundation since 1959. He has held the offices of treasurer, vice-president, and president. During his thirty years of

service, he has been active in a variety of development activities to support educational, cultural, and capital expansion programs for Coastal Carolina College.

George N. Magrath Sr.

George N. Magrath Sr. was born in Conway, South Carolina, in 1922. A graduate of The Citadel, he earned a bachelor of science degree in business administration.

After graduation, Mr. Magrath served in the armed forces in the United States and Manila for three years. He then returned to Conway and entered business full-time. He is president of the People's Federal Savings & Loan Association of Conway.

Mr. Magrath has served on the board of directors of the South Carolina League of Savings Associations and as president of the South Carolina Association of Insurance Agents. He is a former member of the Horry County Building Commission, a former trustee for Conway Elementary and Conway High Schools, past president of Conway Golf and Country Club, and an elder and trustee of Kingston Presbyterian Church.

He is a past president of the Conway Chamber of Commerce, past chairman of the board for Conway Hospital, past chairman of Fripp Island Development Corporation, and a former director of the South Carolina State Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Magrath was appointed to the Horry County Higher Education Commission in 1972, and he later chaired that body. In 1986, he was named to the Coastal Educational Foundation, Inc. As a member of both organizations, he has worked for programs aimed at helping Coastal Carolina College develop and prosper.

South African Writer To Lecture At Coastal

Dr. Es'kia Mphahlele, a distinguished South African writer and literary scholar, will speak at Coastal Wednesday, February 8, 7:30 p.m., in Wheelwright Auditorium as part of the Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series.

Dr. Mphahlele will present a reading of prose and poetry at 2:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Considered one of the leading black literary voices in South Africa, Mphahlele has written or edited more than 17 books since his first collection of short stories appeared in 1947.

Coastal Professor Publishes Book

Fishing the Southeast Coast, a new book by Coastal's Professor Donald Millis, is a book that explores fishing along the South Atlantic Coast and reveals tricks of veteran anglers and their tales, including photographs of their skills and luck in the sport.

Published by Sandlapper Press in Orangeburg, South Carolina, it is the second book on fishing by Professor Millus.

From Morehead City (the first fishing port below Cape Hatteras), to the Georgia Sea Islands, Millus's range includes Wilmington, Southport, and Bald Head Island on the North Carolina Coast, and Little River, Myrtle Beach, Murrells Inlet, Georgetown, Charleston, Beaufort, and Hilton Head on the South Carolina Coast.

Millus has had articles published on a variety of subjects in publications such as The New York Times, America, Salt Water Sportsman, Outdoor Life, and South Carolina Wildlife.

He is the editor and co-publisher of two Myrtle Beach area magazines, On the Green and On the Beach, and writes a weekly column for The Horry Independent. Millus has also written fishing columns for The Sun News.

At Coastal, Millus lectures on Renaissance and Medieval English Literature, besides teaching American literature and writing. He is also the coach of the fishing team and is the founder of the oldest intercollegiate fishing match in the United States, the Coastal Carolina Invitational.

Millus has been fishing the Southeast Coast since 1974, when he moved to Conway with his wife Patricia, sons Chris and Donnie, and daughter, Sara.

He received his A.B. degree from Fordham and his Ph.D. from Yale University. Millus also served as a U.S. Army captain in Vietnam and received a Bronze Star for his service. His major scholarly interest is the English Bible.

Jane Powell To Perform

Singer Jane Powell, nominated as 1989 Campus Artist of the Year and 1989 Jazz Artist of the Year by Performing Arts/Music, an organization that awards top entertainers who perform at college campuses, will perform Thursday, February 9 at 7:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The concert is sponsored by Campus Union.

Powell performs a variety of music, including jazz and blues, top 40, country, ballads, and show tunes. She has received rave reviews from critics and top performers in the music

industry and has been described as outrageous, touching and unforgettable.

Pianist Leon Bates To Perform Tribute To George Gershwin

Pianist Leon Bates and singers Eddye Pierce Young and Benjamin Matthews will perform "Gershwin by Request," a musical tribute to George Gershwin, Monday, February 13, at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Bates, a familiar figure on the international concert scene, has performed with the New York Philharmonic, the Philadelphia Orchestra, at the Hollywood Bowl, and the Kennedy Center. He has also performed with the Orchestra Sinfonica dell 'Accademic Nationale di Santa Cecilia in Rome, and with the Basel Symphony in Switzerland, where he made a classical music video of the Gershwin Concerto in F.

A native of Philadelphia, Bates studied with pianist Natalie Hinderas. His performances of Gershwin in Rome have warranted him five return engagements.

Eddye Pierce Young, soprano, has appeared in recital, opera, and oratorio throughout the world. A national finalist in the Metropolitan Opera Auditions and winner of the San Francisco Opera Grand Finals, Young made her New York recital debut in 1979, receiving critical acclaim from reviews and audience.

Benjamin Matthews, bass baritone, recently returned from Rio de Janeiro where he performed the lead role in "Porgy and Bess" for two months. His other operatic credits include performances with the New York City Opera, the Graz Opera in Austria, and the Philadelphia Grand Opera in a wide diversity of roles. He has appeared as soloist with major orchestras in the United States, Canada, Europe and South America.

The trio's performance of "Gershwin by Request" is filled with the piano music of Gershwin, complete with "Rhapsody in Blue," selections from "Porgy and Bess," and classics such as "Fascinatin' Rhythm," "The Man I Love," and "Strike Up the Band."

South Carolina Sea Island Expert To Speak At Coastal

Dr. J. Herman Blake, the Eugene M. Long Professor of Social Change at Swarthmore College, will present a lecture Friday, February 17 at 5:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Sponsored by Graduate and Continuing Education, the lecture is free and open to the public, with a reception to follow the program in the Physical Education Activities Gym.

An expert on the people of the South Carolina Sea Islands, Blake is an author and former historian for the Black Panthers. He received a B.A. from New York University and an M.A. and Ph.D from the University of California at Berkeley.

Blake is the former president of Tougaloo College in Tougaloo, Mississippi, a liberal arts college of 650 students. He is the recipient of numerous fellowships that include the Mina Shaughnessy Fellowship, a Rockefeller Foundation Fellowship, a Ford Foundation Advanced Study Fellowship, a Danforth Foundation Fellowship, and a John Hay Whitney and Woodrow Wilson Fellowship.

Computer Software Demonstration To Be Held

Richard Blum, instructor of computer science, will demonstrate Knowledge Vision, a new software package he is currently developing, Thursday, February 9, at 1 p.m. in KH-106.

Blum has been in the business of developing computer software during the last decade. He will discuss the purpose of the new program and the process of developing professional quality software.

Blum has developed Knowledge Vision with the intent to make the production of multimedia communications as easy as typing a document on a word processor. Multimedia includes graphics, animation, music, and speech. In other words, it is much like a personal television production.

Blum will demonstrate Knowledge Vision in its current state and discuss the potential of multimedia communication for education and corporate training. He will also discuss the process of developing a large software package.

Wildlife Magazine Editor To Conduct Public Forum

George Reiger, conservation editor of *Field and Stream* magazine, will conduct a lecture with questions and answers concerning the future of the world's duck population Thursday, February 16 at 8 p.m. in the Fine Arts Little Theater. The program is free and open to the public. A reception and book autographing session will follow the lecture.

Reiger has observed ducks extensively throughout North America and the British Isles. He is the author of three books on ducks that include The Wings of Dawn, Wanderer on My Native Shore, and Floaters and Stick-ups: North America Decoys.

Reiger has been a junior member of the U.S. negotiating team at the Paris Peace Talks, the former editor of *Audubon* magazine, and the author of numerous books and articles on fishing, hunting, and bird-watching. Recently, he toured the duck wintering grounds of the Soviet Union.
