

Pianist Leon Bates To Perform "Gershwin By Request"

Pianist Leon Bates and singers Eddye Pierce Young and Benjamin Matthews will perform "Gershwin by Request," a musical tribute to George Gershwin, Monday, February 13, at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Bates, a familiar figure on the international concert scene, has performed with the New York Philharmonic, the Philadelphia Orchestra, at the Hollywood Bowl, and the Kennedy Center. He has also performed with the Orchestra Sinfonica dell 'Accademie Nationale di Santa Cecilia in Rome, and with the Basel Symphony in Switzerland, where he made a classical music video of the Gershwin Concerto in F.

Eddye Pierce Young, soprano, has appeared in recital, opera, and oratorio throughout the world. A national finalist in the Metropolitan Opera Auditions and winner of the San Francisco Opera Grand Finals, Young made her New York recital debut in 1979, receiving critical acclaim from reviews and audience.

Benjamin Matthews, bass baritone, recently returned from Rio de Janeiro where he performed the lead role in "Porgy and Bess" for two months. His other operatic credits include performances with the New York City Opera, the Graz Opera in Austria, and the Philadelphia Grand Opera in a wide diversity of roles. He has appeared as soloist with major orchestras in the United States, Canada, Europe and South America.

The trio's performance of "Gershwin by Request" is filled with the piano music of Gershwin, complete with "Rhapsody in Blue," selections from "Porgy and Bess," and classics such as "Fascinatin' Rhythm," "The Man I Love," and "Strike Up the Band."

Tickets are \$14; \$7 for students, and may be purchased in advance from the Wheelwright box office.

South Carolina Sea Island Expert To Speak At Coastal

Dr. J. Herman Blake, the Eugene M. Long Professor of Social Change at Swarthmore College, will present a lecture Friday, February 17 at 5:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Sponsored by Graduate and Continuing Education, the lecture is free and open to the public, with a reception to follow the program in the Physical Education Activities Gym. An expert on the people of the South Carolina Sea Islands, Blake is an author and former historian for the Black Panthers. He received a B.A. from New York University and an M.A. and Ph.D from the University of California at Berkeley.

Blake is the former president of Tougaloo College in Tougaloo, Mississippi, a liberal arts college of 650 students. He is the recipient of numerous fellowships that include the Mina Shaughnessy Fellowship, a Rockefeller Foundation Fellowship, a Ford Foundation Advanced Study Fellowship, a Danforth Foundation Fellowship, and a John Hay Whitney and Woodrow Wilson Fellowship.

Reiger has been a junior member of the U.S. negotiating team at the Paris Peace Talks, the former editor of *Audubon* magazine, and the author of numerous books and articles on fishing, hunting, and bird-watching. Recently, he toured the duck wintering grounds of the Soviet Union.

"Girl Crazy," a George and Ira Gershwin musical that originated in the 1930s as a Broadway play, will be presented by the Coastal Carolina Theater on Friday, February 24 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, with additional performances on Saturday, February 25 at 8 p.m. and Sunday, February 26 at 2:30 p.m.

Playing the lead role of Frisco Kate, a down and out nightclub singer, is Lisa Bonner, of Myrtle Beach, who plans on pursuing a theatrical career in New York. In the play, Kate travels with her Hungarian ex-husband Zoli, played by Patrick Coyle, minister of music at a local church on the Grand Strand.

While pursuing a comeback in her career, Kate decides that she would like to rekindle an old romance with cowboy and ex-TV star of "Cowpolk," Johnny Churchill, played by Matt Morris, a sophomore at Coastal. But Churchill's heart belongs to a sweet little country cowgirl, Molly Moorehead, played by sophomore Coastal student Nora Gail Recee.

A sub-plot of the play is made up of gamblers trying to take over the town of Custervlle, with Churchill, who decides to to run for sheriff, trying to run them out of town.

Other major cast members include cowboy Sam Mason, played by Coastal graduate Wayne Nobles; Snake Eyes, played by Coastal freshman Vaughn Cox; and Doc Parkerhurst played by Coastal sophomore James Bryan.

Carolyn Cox, associate professor of music at Coastal is musical director, and Linda Hollandsworth, instructor of English and speech, is stage director. Jeff Nichols, visiting professor of theater and speech at Coastal is scenic director.

Stage manager is Mark Kaufmann, Coastal student; chereographer is Lisa Kirby; Tim Hicks is in charge of lighting; and Kristie Knight is assistant stage manager.

Message From Student Health Services

North Carolina college's combat against the measles outbreak is sending hundreds of people to county health departments for immunizations. Fortunately, Coastal students should not fear a measles epidemic on our campus.

Prior to our registration, each student was required to submit immunization records from their doctor. Therefore, if immunization records are current/complete, this should alleviate any apprehension. Doctors, DHEC and medical resources advised Coastal to require immunization records since 1985 to prevent such an event as the North Carolina measles outbreak.

Research indicates that vaccines dated from the mid 1950s to the late 1960s were not effective. According to Bill Nichols, assistant coordinator of the immunization program in the division of health services of North Carolina, "officials are trying to limit immunizations to the most susceptible populations - those 15 months to 32 years old, and those who were immunized prior to 15 months of age or before 1968.
