Seminar Series On Future Of Coastal For Faculty And Staff

The second in a series of programs for faculty and staff on the future of Coastal is scheduled for Tuesday, March 7 from 3 to 5 p.m. in the Fine Arts Little Theater.

The guests for this program are members of the ALPHA Group which has been meeting for more than a year talking about the future of the Grand Strand region. The panel will include a representative from Grand Strand Water and Sewer Authority and other local business leaders, including Gil Thelen, editor of the Sun News.

The seminars are designed to help faculty and administrators understand the potential future role of Coastal. Guests will explain what they do and how the college has been involved in the past, and will talk about how they see Coastal in the future of this region. The informality of the program should lead to numerous interactive questions and answers. The goal is to help all of us understand what the community expects of us, and then to use this information to help formulate how we can be helpful in the future development of this region.

The third program, scheduled for Monday, March 13, will include members of the legislative delegation, county council and representatives from various municipalities. It will be held from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. in the Fine Arts Little Theater.

Washington Ballet To Perform At Coastal

The Washington Ballet, described by critics as one of the country's finest professional ballet companies, will perform at Coastal Tuesday, March 7 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Founded in 1976, by Mary Day, artistic director, the Washington Ballet presents a blend of the classic and contemporary ballets of Petipa, Balanchine, Nebrada, and the late Choo San Goh, the company's past associate artistic director who has been acclaimed by critics around the world. Tours throughout the U.S. include regular performances in Memphis and Charlottesville, as well as Baltimore, the ballet's "second home."

Since the early 1960s, The Washington Ballet has delighted Washingtonians and visitors to the nation's capital with its holiday performances of "The Nutcracker." Its 1986 tour of Japan and Malaysia, 1985 tour of China and Singapore, 1984 tours of South America and the Far East, and previous international tours have further enhanced the artistic reputation of the Washington Ballet.

In just ten years, The Washington Ballet has earned a reputation as one of the country's finest professional ballet companies. Its dancers have won numerous awards in international ballet competitions including a bronze medal at the 1983 Varna Ballet Competition, and the gold medal in the 1981 Moscow Ballet Competition.

Artistic Director Mary Day has received numerous awards that include a 1987 award from WGMS Radio for her generosity in the promotion of the arts; the 1985 Mayor's Arts Award for her contribution to the performing arts in the nation's capital; the 1980 "Washingtonian of the Year" from Washington magazine; the 1980 Metropolitan Dance Association Award; the 1981 WETA (public television) "Woman of Achievement;" and the 1983 YWCA "Woman of the Year."

The first event will be a lecture presented by Roger R. Regelbrugge, chief executive officer of Georgetown Industries, Inc., Monday, March 13 at 10:30 a.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Regelbrugge's topic will be "Competitive Strategies for the 1990s."

He received a B.S. in mechanical engineering from State Technical College in Ghent Belgium, a B.S. in industrial engineering from the G.M. Institute, and an M.S. from Michigan State. He serves on the Board of Directors of the American Iron and Steel Institute.

"Customer Obsession: The Formula for Success," will be the topic of a lecture presented by James K. Batten, chief executive officer of Knight-Ridder, Inc., Tuesday, March 14 at 10 a.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Batten has previously worked as a reporter and executive editor for *The Charlotte Observer* and assistant city editor of the *Detroit Free Press*.

His experience with Knight-Ridder, Inc. includes the positions of correspondent for the corporation's Washington Bureau, specializing in Southern politics and civil rights; news-side vice president; senior vice-president; director; president; and the current title of chief executive officer.

Batten received a B.S. and a master's degree in public affairs from Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson School of Public and International Affairs. He completed an advanced management program at Harvard Business School in 1981

A third lecture, entitled "Creating Success from an Apparent Disaster: The Closing of Donaldson Air Force Base," will be given by J. Philip Southerland, executive director of The Donaldson Center in Greenville, Wednesday, March 15 at 9:30 a.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

Southerland is a graduate of Myrtle Beach High School and The Citadel in Charleston, where he received a B.S. in business administration.

Southerland began his business career at Myrtle Beach Bank and Trust Company. He was executive vice-president of the Bank of Florence from 1955 to 1961; executive vice-president of the First National Bank of Laurens from 1961-1971; and senior vice-president of business development and marketing at Southern Bank and Trust Company from 1971 to 1986.

He is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Foundation for American Communications, a trustee of the Ford Motor Company Fund, and a member of the Detroit Free Press Foundation, the Public Relations Society of America, and the USIA Private Sector Public Relations Committee.

Coastal To Offer Travel And Study Opportunity In England

Coastal will offer a travel and study opportunity

Manchester College, Oxford, England, July 10 through August 7, 1989.

The trip is open to USC students, educators and members of the community. Participants may choose from four courses for academic credit or simply join the group for an extended visit to Oxford. South Carolina teachers recertifying in English, social studies and some other areas may be able to use the courses in their content areas.

Centrally located in an ancient university city, the Manchester College campus includes a renowned library, a chapel with notable stained-glass windows by Burn-Jones and Morris, and other historic buildings.

Participants will be able to sample Oxford traditions and enjoy the small-class atmosphere during the four-week stay at the university. Travel on weekends and planned excursions to places such as Stonehenge and Salisbury, Stratford on Avon, Warwick Castle, Windsor Castle, and other sites are included in the cost of the trip.

Four undergraduate courses are available to those who enroll on a credit-basis. Students may register for one or more of the following courses offered through USC Coastal Carolina College. All credits earned will be accepted by the University of South Carolina.

History of England II (CHST 312)- The Empire through the Nuclear Age: the political, social, economic and cultural development of the British Isles from 1688 to the present. The instructor is Dr. Fred Hicks, professor of history at Coastal.

Studies in English Literature (CEGL 424)- Oxford in verse and prose, architecture and the arts. This is a unique experience in English culture under the direction of an Oxford don. The instructor is Dr. Ralph Waller, principal of Manchester College.

Introduction to Philosophy (CPHL 102)- An introduction to the main problems of philosophy and its methods of inquiry, analysis and criticism. Students will read works of important English philosophers. The instructor is Dr. Robert N. Robinson, chairman of the Department of Philosophy and Religion at Coastal and director of the USC at Oxford Program.

The Morality of Ethical Leadership (CPHL 398C)-Special topics: The moral dimensions of leadership as illustrated through philosophical criticism of biographical, historical and dramatic classes. The instructor is Dr. Robert N. Robinson.

Cost of the program is \$2650, and enrollment is limited to the first 50 to register. Cost includes weekday meals (breakfast, lunch, dinner), room (double occupancy), planned excursions, round trip air transportation to London, and ground transportation to Oxford. Tuition for the program and weekend meals are not included.

A \$700 deposit is due by March 31, to cover the cost of the airline ticket and deposits on arrangements in England. The balance is due June 1.

Tuition is \$204 for undergraduates, \$423 for undergraduate non-residents, and \$288 for graduate students (resident or non-resident).

Counseling Services To Present Program About Date Rape

The issue of date rape on college campuses will be presented through the film, "It Still Hurts," followed by a discussion of prevention strategies Monday, March 6, at 12:30 p.m. in SC-204. All students, faculty and staff are invited to attend the program.

Nationally, sexual assault is a significant problem on college campuses. In a recent survey of over 6,000 students from 32 colleges, one out of every six female students reported being a victim of rape or attempted rape, and one out of every fifteen males reported committing rape or attempting to commit rape during the preceding year. Of the rapes on campuses, over 90% were by assailants the victim knew, and only 10% of the date rape victims reported the assaults.
