Coastal will hold its 1989 Conference on Women, "Women's Ways of Knowing," Saturday, April 15 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the college. Registration will be from 8:30 to 11 a.m.

Professionals throughout the state will attend the conference, and will discuss topics such as women and medical issues; stress management; women and leadership; women and the home environment; the building of self-esteem; women and politics; and women and intuition.

The conference will feature writers Nancy Goldberger, author of the highly-acclaimed book Women's Ways of Knowing, and Eleanora Tate, Myrtle Beach resident and author of the children's books The Secret of Gumbo Grove and Just an Overnight Guest.

Goldberger is a visiting scholar in psychology at New York University. In her book, she and fellow colleagues examine women's ways of knowing and describe five different perspectives that women view reality and draw conclusions about truth, knowledge and authority.

Tate is president of the public relations firm, Positive Images. She works to promote a positive image of women and black culture through her books and lectures.

"PhoneFriend" Service Continues To Be Success

In today's society, more and more children are coming home after school to an empty house. As the number of mothers who enter the labor force continues to increase, children are being forced to fend for themselves during after-school hours.

Last spring, USC Coastal Carolina College recognized the problem that latchkey children in the local community face, and implemented "PhoneFriend," an after-school telephone help-line service operated through its School of Education and Health Professions.

According to Ginny Stanley, instructor of education at Coastal and coordinator of the program, the service has proved itself as a successful method in dealing with children seeking help in areas such as homework, emergencies or looking for consolation on a lonely day.

"We receive up to 50 calls on extremely busy days," said Stanley. "Other days, we may average about 20 calls. I think one of the main reasons that children are using the service is because of the students who volunteer to answer the phones - they are wonderful with the kids."

Stanley said that the service operates Monday through Friday from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m., with three lines available operated by volunteer education majors and qualified individuals in the community. Children in kindergarten through sixth grade from approximately 25 area schools have been introduced to the program through publicity in the media, and items such as informational bookmarks and stickers sent directly to the schools.

Coastal education majors are getting the message out to the students as well by decorating bulletin boards in the schools with "PhoneFriend" information and symbols, giving puppet presentations, distributing coloring books with art work designed by a Coastal student, and making visits to the schools with Cocky, the University of South Carolina's mascot.

Stanley said the students are proud of their efforts in helping children through the service.

"One student told me that she felt she was really connecting with the children and that she also felt she was a real part of Coastal," said Stanley. "The students are giving something to the children in the community, as well as to their college."

The "PhoneFriend" concept originated at Penn State University, with Winthrop College in Rock Hill as its South Carolina originator.

According to Stanley, all prospective volunteers go through orientation learning the "PhoneFriend" system and the procedures of answering child's questions. Confidentiality is one of the rules that volunteers must follow, but for data collection purposes, the child is asked his or her first name, the school he or she attends and age. The caller's phone number is taken only if it is necessary to call the child back in an emergency situation.

Due to the interest that other South Carolina colleges may have in implementing their own versions of the help-line, Coastal recently held a "PhoneFriend Network Conference" at the college.

Stanley said that approximately 25 representatives from area colleges such as Coker, Lander and USC-Columbia attended the program, where the concept of "PhoneFriend" was discussed. Susan Smith, coordinator of the program at Winthrop College presented the overview of establishing such a service.

Stanley said the service will continue to expand at Coastal and they are discussing the possibility of adding a line for students in the Georgetown area if funds become available.

"Right now we are just spreading the good word," said Stanley.

"PhoneFriend" is supported by the Horry County Higher Education Commission, GTE of the South, Horry Telephone Cooperative, Pepsi-Cola Bottling Company, and Burger King.

Junior Scholars Program Begins At Coastal

Some of the area's top students in academics are getting a taste of college life a little before their time, through a new program offered at USC Coastal Carolina College.

The Junior Scholars Dinner Club, a program designed to nurture students in areas such as art, music, health, politics, and science, is for the top three percent of rising ninth grade students in Horry, Georgetown, Williamsburg and Marion counties.

Students are selected for the program based on his or her performance on the PSAT, a prelude test to the SAT.

Thus far, two presentations have been held at the college. The first presentation was given by Ballou Skinner, professor of physics at Coastal. Skinner's topic, "Space, Science and Research," focused on a discussion of his previous involvement with NASA and the Kennedy Space Center and research techniques used in the project.

The second, was a performance of excerpts from the cast of Coastal Theater's most recent production held at the college, "Girl Crazy." Carolyn Cox, chair of the Music Department at Coastal and associate professor of music, answered students' questions about theater performance, music scholarships and auditions.

According to Aubie Melot, coordinator of the Center for Rural Development at the college and instructor of education, the programs held for the students are to honor previous accomplishments of the high achievers and to provide an opportunity for further knowledge and growth in various areas.

Dawn Lask, a student at Waccamaw Middle School, said she enjoys the program because there is no pressure on performance or achievement; just learning basically through enjoyment. "This is something we can participate in without being evaluated," she said.

Brian Sox, a student at Beck Middle School in Georgetown said that the program is beneficial in providing an awareness in certain areas that may not usually be covered in his regular classes at school. "I feel lucky to be involved

in the program," said Sox. "The presentations open my point of view and expose me to cultural events," he said.

After the hour-long programs, students gather for dinner in the student center at the college.
