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

Edwin Newman Scheduled As Spring Lecturer For Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series

Edwin Newman, a 35-year veteran of NBC-TV News, will speak at Coastal, Tuesday, April 4, at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, as part of the Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series. Although the lecture is free and open to the public, tickets are required for admission. They are available on a first-come, first-served basis at Wheelwright box office, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Newman retired from NBC News in 1984, after 35 years with the network. During that time, he headed the NBC bureaus in London, Rome and Paris, reported from three dozen countries and anchored nearly every kind of news program the network produced.

Newman has appeared numerous times on NBC-TV's "Saturday Night Live," and has served as moderator of two presidential debates. He has been described as the only host of "Saturday Night Live" to moderate a presidential debate, and the only moderator of a presidential debate ever to be host of "Saturday Night Live."

Newman's journalistic career began in Washington in 1941, after graduating from the University of Wisconsin and completing a semester of graduate work at Louisiana State University. He went to work for the International News Service and then moved on to the United Press. He spent three and a half years in the Navy during World War II, then returned to wire service and newspaper reporting until 1947, when he took the position of news writer at CBS in Washington for two years. In 1949, he made the transition to NBC in London.

Newman worked with the NBC Religious Programs Unit and NBC Sports, and he hosted broadcasts from Tanglewood by the Boston Symphony Orchestra. He also has been a questioner and panel member for the Metropolitan Opera Quiz. He has received awards and honors for reporting from abroad, commentary, documentary reporting, interviewing and drama criticism.

Newman is well-known for his views on the state of the English language. His books on the subject, Strictly Speaking and A Civil Tongue, were best sellers. He has served as chairman of the usage panel of the American Heritage Dictionary and as a consultant on a series of textbooks on grammar and composition published by Houghton Mifflin. He also has written on a variety of topics for many American, British and Canadian publications including Reader's Digest, Harpers, Esquire, The Atlantic, The New York Times Magazine, Geo, Newsweek, Saturday

Review, Psychology Today, and Punch. His comic novel, Sunday Punch, was published in 1979.

Newman is active on the lecture-circuit and has continued to work in television, anchoring numerous programs on PBS, including the series, "Congress: We the People," and the annual conferences of former secretaries of state.

Jill McCorkle, author of the critically-acclaimed novels, <u>The Cheer Leader</u> and <u>July 7th</u>, will present a reading and discussion Thursday, March 23 in the Fine Arts Little Theater. McCorkle has been a lecturer in creative writing at UNC Chapel Hill and teacher at the School for Continuing Education at Duke University. She presently teaches at Tufts University in Boston.

A reviewer at *The Greensboro News and Record*, described McCorkle as "an author bursting with stories to tell," after reading her third novel, <u>Tending to Virginia</u>.

McCorkle is a graduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. and received her master's degree at Hollins College in Virginia.

Dr. Donald Harper Lecture Scheduled At Coastal

Dr. Donald Harper, an expert in the area of clinical psychopharmacology, will present a lecture entitled "The Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil and Drug Abuse of the Psychobiology of Religion," Monday, April 3, from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. in the Student Center, room 205, at USC Coastal Carolina College. The presentation is sponsored by the Psychology and Philosophy clubs, and is free and open to the public.

Harper has conducted research in areas such as kidney malfunctions, regulation of blood pressure, and the effects of certain medications and drugs.

After completing a year of research in psychopharmacology, Harper served an internship at Presbyterian Hospital in Dallas. He then went on to New Haven, Connecticut to undergo a training program in neurology at Yale University with an emphasis on behavioral neurology. During that time, he also was a post-doctoral fellow and presented resident and medical community lectures on a variety of subjects.

Harper is presently in private practice in Layfayette, Louisiana. After implementing the Department of Neurology for a large multi-specialty group, he developed an independent practice, helping patients with difficult pain management problems and was a consultant for the Indigent Defender's Office. He has taught neurology at the University Medical Center in Louisiana. Recently he has been involved with the Louisiana State Medical Society Committee on Chronic Diseases and the Pharmacy and Ethics Committees of Lafayette General Hospital. He also is a physician member of the National Headache Foundation and is a certified addictionologist.

A native of Kansas City, Missouri, Harper received his undergraduate training at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, where he was a National Merit Scholar. He received his graduate education from the Harvard Medical School, Southwestern Medical School, and his doctoral education from the University of Texas Health Science Center at Dallas.

Coastal's Annual Women's Conference To Be Held In April

Coastal will hold its 1989 Conference on Women, "Women's Ways of Knowing," Saturday, April 15 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the college. Registration will be from 8:30 to 11 a.m.

Professionals throughout the state will attend the conference, and will discuss topics such as women and medical issues; stress management; women and leadership; women and the home environment; the building of self-esteem; women and politics; and women and intuition.

The conference will feature writers Nancy Goldberger, author of the highly-acclaimed book Women's Ways of Knowing, and Eleanora Tate, Myrtle Beach resident and author of the children's books The Secret of Gumbo Grove and Just an Overnight Guest.

Goldberger is a visiting scholar in psychology at New York University. In her book, she and fellow colleagues examine women's ways of knowing and describe five different perspectives that women view reality and draw conclusions about truth, knowledge and authority.

Tate is president of the public relations firm, Positive Images. She works to promote a positive image of women and black culture through her books and lectures.

This year's conference is co-sponsored by Graduate and Continuing Education, the South Carolina Women in Higher Education Administration, *Coast* magazine, USC Columbia Women Student's Services, and USC Coastal Division of Student Development.

Registration fee for the conference is \$59 and includes lunch. Deadline for registration is March 31. Early registration is requested, as space is limited. Late registration will be accepted after March 31. Late registration fee is \$75.

Talbert Receives Excellent Reviews On F.D.R.'s Utopian

After a long period of waiting for the critics to respond, Roy Talbert Jr., associate professor of history at USC Coastal Carolina College, says the favorable reviews he has received on his book F.D.R.'s Utopian: Arthur Morgan of the TVA were well worth the wait.

F.D.R.'s Utopian: Arthur Morgan of the TVA was published in 1987 by the University Press of Mississippi. In the book, Talbert examines the career of Arthur Morgan, who headed the TVA (Tennessee Valley Authority) in 1933, a challenge offered Morgan by President Franklin D. Roosevelt. The book is the first to examine the life of Morgan, completed after 20 years of research and interviews by Talbert.

According to Talbert, it has not been easy waiting on the critics' feedback that recently appeared in the top-rated

professional journals that publish reviews on academic books.

Talbert said that after 18 months of waiting, his anxiety disappeared after reading the reviews in *The Journal of Southern History*, *The American Historical Review*, and *Perspective*, Reviews of New Books on Government/Politics and International Affairs.

"I was pretty pleased with the reviews," said Talbert. "The book was very well-received."

Talbert says the reviews are the ones that count in the academic world. He says that local reviews are important as well, but reviews that appear in these three journals are written by academic professionals. One of the critics, in fact, is Alan Brinkley, son of ABC news commentator David Brinkley.

Talbert believes the strong reviews not only make him look good as an author, but make Coastal look good as a strong academic institution.

"I think it helps to build a strong scholarly reputation at the college," said Talbert.

Born in Cheraw, South Carolina in 1943, Talbert has previously lived in the Pee Dee area and is a graduate of McClenaghan High School in Florence. He attended Furman University in Greenville on an academic scholarship and graduated with honors in history in 1965. A Distinguished Military graduate in ROTC, Talbert went on to Vanderbilt University on a National Defense Fellowship and earned an M.A. and Ph.D. in history. He then entered the army, earned the rank of captain, and served in the Directorate of Counterintelligence in the Pentagon, and received the Meritorious Service Medal.

After leaving the army in 1974, Talbert became assistant professor of history at Ferrum College near Roanoke, Virginia. In 1976, he took the position of associate dean of the college.

In 1979, Talbert returned to South Carolina as vice chancellor for academic affairs at Coastal. In 1984, he retired from administration to return to teaching and writing.

Talbert's book is available at the Coastal bookstore on campus.
