Coastal Carolina Theater To Present "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?"

"Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" a play that reveals the turbulent roles of marriage, will be presented by Coastal Carolina Theater, Friday, April 14 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, with additional performances Saturday, April 15 at 8 p.m. and Sunday, April 16 at 2:30 p.m.

Set in a New England college town, this Edward Albee play tells the story of the married couple, George, played by Jeff Woodward, and Martha, played by Lisa Bonner.

After spending an evening at a party, an intoxicated George and Martha play host to another couple, Nick, played by Chad Ayers, and Honey, played by Kathy Wren.

As the night goes on, the couples continue drinking, and Martha decides to bitterly discuss her marital difficulties in the company of her guests. Martha and George, in their drunken state, reveal their emotions of desperation, including the hatred and resentment they feel toward each other.

By the end of the evening, it is apparent George and Martha believe that their lives have been ruined by marriage and then each blame the other for the mess.

The director of the play is Jeff Nichols, visiting professor of theater and speech. Scene designer is Mark Kaufmann; costume designer is Donna Catton-Johnson; lighting designer is Tim Hicks; and stage manager is Jennifer Kallmeyer.

U.S. Commission On Civil Rights Director To Present Lecture

John C. Eastman, director of congressional and public affairs for the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, will discuss the topic "The Artificial Congress: The Impact of Race in American Politics," Friday, April 14 at 1:30 p.m., in SC-205. Sponsored by the Department of Government and the Coastal Educational Foundation, the lecture is free and open to the public.

Eastman, the author of numerous published articles on civil rights, foreign policy and political science, will demonstrate in his discussion, a theory that suggests a significant number of blacks and Hispanics vote Democrat, even though they may disagree with a candidate's views on issues. According to Eastman, the voting patterns result in a majority in Congress that does not accurately reflect the majority opinion in the country.

Eastman also will discuss the strategy that Lee Atwater developed for breaking these voting patterns, and outline the tactics he believes Atwater should maintain to be successful.

A third segment of the lecture will include an assessment of President George Bush's first 75 days, and whether he has made any strides toward accomplishing the strategy of Atwater.

A native of Lincoln Nebraska, Eastman received his B.A. in politics and economics at the University of Dallas, graduating cum laude. He received an M.A. in government at the Claremont Graduate School, where he is presently working on his Ph.D. in government.

Eastman was previously the campaign manager for Bill Allen's U.S. Senate race in 1985; research director for Bill Campbell's race for controller in 1986; president of John Eastman & Associates, a political consulting business, 1985 to 1987; and campaign manager for Charles House in his race for Congress in 1986.

Eastman is presently an editor and contributor for *In Sickness and Health: Essays Concerning U.S. Involvement in South Africa*.

"Painting With Ilona" Art Course Offered At Coastal

Ilona Royce-Smithkin, artist, teacher and host of her own television series, "Ilona's Palette," will instruct a course, "Painting with Ilona," at Coastal, Monday, April 24 through Friday, April 28, from 9 a.m. until noon at the Cherokee Motor Inn in Myrtle Beach. The course also will be taught again Monday, May 1 through Friday, May 5, from 9 a.m. until noon at the Georgetown Extension.

Royce-Smithkin has studied art at the Reinman Schule in Berlin; Academie Royale des Beaux Arts in Antwerp; the Art Students League in New York; and the Cape School of Art in Provincetown, Massachusetts.

Royce-Smithkin has traveled for the Arts Commission and her art work has been displayed in museums across the country and abroad. She is best known for her portraits of personalities such as Ayn Rand; Tennessee Williams; Eugene O'Neill; and the children of Senator Edward Kennedy.

Art critic Carl Van Vechten describes the artist's work as "Infinite delicacy...bursts of brilliance...Fragile phases of line...her brush is bewitched..."

In the course, Royce-Smithkin will instruct individuals on how to paint in the style of personal impressionism, focusing on technique and choice of color. The course is designed for beginning, intermediate or advanced painters.

Marine Science Department Receives Grant

The United States Minerals Management Service has awarded a \$19,749 research grant to Coastal to be used in the Department of Marine Science and Center for Marine and Wetland Studies at the college.

According to Dr. Douglas Nelson, professor of marine science and geology, and Dr. Paul Gayes, assistant professor of marine science, the grant funds will be used to study, define and assess potential economic mineral deposits on the inner South Carolina continental shelf. The grant also will be used in the development of a state-of-the-art sediment analysis laboratory at Coastal to study the sedimentation history and heavy mineral enrichment on the inner continental shelf off northeastern South Carolina.

Coastal's Latin American Program Receives Grant

Coastal has been awarded a \$500 Mellon Grant from Tulane University to promote the teaching of Latin American area studies. The funds have been designated principally toward increasing Latin American holdings at Kimbel Library.

The grant is part of an ongoing program sponsored by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation and administered by Tulane University. Institutions of higher education throughout the Southeastern states receive aid through the program.

This is the third consecutive year that Coastal has received the grant, according to Dr. James D. Henderson, associate professor of government and international studies.

Graduate And Continuing Education Offers PC Computer Courses

Graduate and Continuing Education is offering "hands-on" beginner PC computer courses designed to teach the use of the IBM personal computers and applications software to adults and students.

Dr. Jake Halford, who received his Ph.D. in electrical engineering from Duke University, will be the instructor for the courses. Halford has served on the faculty of the United States Naval Academy, The Citadel and the College of

Charleston. He has nine years experience in teaching and developing computer courses.

In each course, an IBM Personal System/2 Model 50 computer with hard disk and color monitor will be shared by no more than two students. All users of IBM XT's, AT's, PCjr's, System/2 Model 30's, 50's, 60's or 80's or IBM compatible computers are encouraged to enroll.

Rebels And Redcoats Tour Set For April

The traditions and events that make up the rich history of Horry and Georgetown counties will be recounted during the Rebels and Redcoats History Tour, sponsored by Graduate and Continuing Education, Friday, April 28, from 9:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

The all-day tour will be conducted by Rod Gragg, author of Pirates, Planters and Patriots: Historical Tales of the South Carolina Grand Strand, and will visit historical sites in the Waccamaw-Grand Strand region. Among the sites visited will be Hampton Plantation, a plantation built circa 1730 which is listed on the National Historical Register for Architecture and was the home of the first governor of South Carolina; Hopsewee Plantation, home of Thomas Lynch, a signer of the Declaration of Independence; Battery White, a huge Confederate Fort overlooking Winyah Bay; Kingston Presbyterian Church on the banks of the Waccamaw River in Conway; the Horry County Museum; and Prince George Winyah Episcopal Church in Georgetown, which is said to have been a stable used for British horses during the Revolution.

The tour leaves Wheelwright Auditorium at 9:30 a.m. and returns at approximately 5 p.m. The \$35 admission fee (\$20 for children), covers transportation and admission to all sites. A dutch lunch will be available.

Florida Astronomer To Present Seminar At Coastal

Terry D. Oswalt, astronomer, and associate professor of physics and space sciences at the Florida Institute of Technology in Melbourne, will present two seminars at USC Coastal Carolina College, on Tuesday, April 18. Both programs, funded by the Harlow Shapley Visiting Lectureships in Astronomy program, are free and open to the public.

The first seminar, "A Visit to the Stellar Graveyard," will be held at 1 p.m. in SCI-120, and will include a discussion of the life cycle of stars featuring an informal photographic tour of Kitt Peak National Observatory in Arizona and the Cerro Tololo Interamerican Observatory in Chile, where much of Oswalt's work on white dwarfs has been conducted, using some of the world's largest telescopes.

The second seminar, "Star Bright, Sky Brighter: The Problem of Light Pollution," will be held at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. Oswalt will share a description of the nature of "light pollution," and its effect on astronomical research. He also will discuss cost-effective solutions to the problem that have been successfully adopted by cities such as Tucson, Arizona.

Oswalt received a B.A. degree in astronomy in 1974 from Indiana University and in 1981, completed his Ph.D. in astronomy from Ohio State University. He has taught physical science at Ohio State University and has conducted research at Indiana University.

He is affiliated with numerous associations in science, including the American Association for the Advancement of Science, American Association of Physics Teachers and the American Astronomical Society.
