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

Coastal To Hold Commencement Ceremonies May 7

Coastal will hold its annual commencement ceremony May 7 at 2 p.m. at the Soccer Stadium on campus. There are approximately 440 graduates in the class of 1989.

Filmmaker Stanley Donen will deliver the commencement address and receive an honorary degree of Doctor of Fine Arts. Edwin Craig Wall Jr. will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Public Service.

Edwin Craig Wall Jr. was born in Conway, South Carolina, on August 21, 1937, the son of May Howard Wall and the late E. Craig Wall Sr.

He received his bachelor of arts degree in economics from Davidson College in 1959, and his master of business administration degree from Harvard University in 1962. After completing his education, Mr. Wall returned to Conway and began working in his family's business, Canal Wood Corporation. Seven years later, Mr. Wall helped form Canal Industries by consolidating several companies. He became the chief operating officer for the corporation in 1969, and the chief executive officer in 1985. Today, Canal Industries is an integrated corporation involved in land ownership and management, raw fiber procurement, lumber manufacturing, and retail building material stores, as well as an active investment program in the Southeast.

Active in regional business concerns, Mr. Wall serves on the boards of directors for five public companies, Blue Cross/Blue Shield of South Carolina, Citizens and Southern Corporation, SCANA Corporation, Sonoco Products Company, and Ruddick Corporation. In addition, he serves on the boards of several closely associated private corporations. In 1988, he was named Business Man of the Year by the South Carolina Chamber of Commerce.

Believing that involvement is the basis of the democratic system, Mr. Wall has been actively involved during his career with more than forty civic groups, educational institutions, and philanthropic organizations throughout the Southeast. Currently, he is affiliated with sixteen.

The main thrust of Mr. Wall's civic activity has been in education. He is a member of the Coastal Educational Foundation, the University of South Carolina Educational Foundation, the USC Business Partnership Foundation, the board of visitors for the E. Craig Wall Sr. School of Business Administration at USC Coastal Carolina, and the South Carolina Foundation of Independent Colleges. He is the chairman of Davidson College's board of trustees and a member of Converse College's board of trustees as well as a member of the Clemson University President's Advisory Council.

Mr. Wall is also a director or trustee of the South Carolina Tourism Council, the South Carolina Research Authority, Brookgreen Gardens, and the Palmetto Foundation.

He has been recognized for community service by a number of organizations including the Pee Dee Area Council of Boy Scouts of America, who presented him with the Silver Beaver Award in 1972, and the Conway American Legion Post III, which gave him the Distinguished Service Award in 1982.

Mr. Wall is married to Judith Atkins Wall, and they have three children: Judith Atkins Wall, Edwin Craig Wall III, and Benjamin Rutledge Wall II. The family resides in Conway.

Stanley Donen will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Fine Arts for his contribution to the arts as a filmmaker, for his role as a premier builder and developer of the American film musical genre, and for his four decades of labor in bringing visual expressions of American life to the screen.

Stanley Donen was born in Columbia, South Carolina, on April 13, 1924, the son of Mortie and Helen Donen.

He grew up in Columbia and first became interested in film when his father presented him with a hand-cranked projector. As a child, he enjoyed taking his 8mm camera with him on trips, photographing the highways, trees, and signs he passed.

At the age of nine, Mr. Donen was impressed with the musical film *Flying Down to Rio* and became interested in cinema and dance. He studied dance in Columbia and in New York. At the age of 16, immediately after receiving his high school diploma, his passion for the business of entertainment took him from Columbia to Broadway.

In the fall of 1940, Mr. Donen made his stage debut as a chorus boy in the musical *Pal Joey*. During the summer of 1942, he came back to Columbia for a short time to study at the University of South Carolina. Later that year, he returned to the New York stage working as an assistant stage manager. He made his film debut in 1943, dancing in the chorus of *Best Foot Forward*.

After deciding that show business would be his lifetime career, Mr. Donen signed a seven-year contract with Metro-

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Goldwyn-Mayer, and assisted Gene Kelly in choreographing some musical sequences in the 1944 film *Cover Girl*. In 1945, Mr. Donen used an innovative blend of live action and animation in the film *Anchors Aweigh*. Working with some of Hollywood's top performing artists, Mr. Donen choreographed more than sixteen films from 1940 to 1959.

He made his directorial debut in 1949 with the musical, On the Town. His list of credits as director includes classics such as Singin' in the Rain, Funny Face, The Pajama Game, and Damn Yankees.

In the 1960s, Mr. Donen successfully ventured into the suspense genre as a producer and director creating films such as *Charade* and *Arabesque*. More recently, he has produced *The Little Prince, Lucky Lady, Movie Movie, Two* for the Road, and Blame It on Rio.

Mr. Donen has been described as the finest director of film musicals of more recent vintage. With work still in progress, he has made twenty-seven films and has enjoyed immense success in the film industry. In his own words, Mr. Donen says, "Entertaining people is, to me, the bottom line."

Mr. Donen resides in Los Angeles, California. He has three sons: Peter, Joshua, and Mark.

In the event of rain, the commencement ceremonies will be held in the Williams Brice Building, Kimbel Gymnasium.
