### 48 Teams Compete In USC Coastal Carolina College **Academic Bowl**

The first Academic Bowl at USC Coastal Carolina College, held on Friday, April 28 and Saturday, April 29, had students participating from 48 high schools and middle schools throughout South Carolina and Georgia for academic quiz team competition.

The purpose of the two-day competition was to provide an opportunity where students could be recognized academically in a fun, but challenging atmosphere.

According to Ed Andersen, continuing education coordinator, there was a feeling of excitement on the Coastal campus when the students gathered to compete academically.

Andersen said, "It enabled students to gather with students from other schools in a group setting," he said. "It was a great socialization/learning experience for the students. I was amazed with the students," he said. "It was a joy to have them here on campus."

Dennis Wiseman, dean of the School of Education and Health Professions, and a moderator for the event, said the college recognizes the need for the development of programs such as the academic bowl, for students in the future.

"Coastal Carolina College believes that it has a major responsibility of providing outreach programs that will acknowledge the academic excellence of students throughout the state," said Wiseman. "We would like to make the academic bowl an annual spring event at the college and continue with other academic programs for students."

Students involved in the competition were divided into teams based on grade level. Grades nine through 12 competed in the upper division category, and middle school through ninth grade students competed in the lower division.

Wiseman said that students were very positive and supportive of each other, concentrating on team achievement, rather than individual recognition.

"While all of the students wanted to win, they also wanted others to do well," said Wiseman. "There was a tremendous drive and high energy level among team members and a keen awareness of competitive spirit. It was especially rewarding to see the teams participating from Horry County do so well with St. James Middle School receiving the first place trophy in the lower division competition."

Dr. David Millard, assistant dean of humanities and fine arts and a judge for the competition, also was pleased with the performances from the students.

"One of the real pleasures of being a judge, was noticing that team members were going beyond factual data, and were having a good time," said Millard. "The competition was enormously successful for its first year."

Millard said that the winning team also was able to carry home more than a trophy as first-place achievers.

"We were pleased to initiate and award a full-tuition scholarship to Midland Valley High School from Aiken, South Carolina, the winning upper-division team," said Millard. "The recipient of the scholarship will later be determined by their school."

The top six teams also received trophies and team members each received individual achievement awards.

Others involved with the competition were honor students Michael Brady, William Lewis, Lisa Thompson, Karen Dulik, Stephanie Hatchell, Donna Radcliffe and Todd Ward. Conway High School students Matt Talbert, Cedric Brown and Julie Tardiff were timekeepers and scorekeepers. Conway High School faculty member Irby Koon was a moderator.
