Georgetown County Students Win USC Coastal Carolina College Essay Contest

Two Georgetown County high school students recently won top honors in the Essays in Economics Award program sponsored by the International Paper Company Foundation of Georgetown and the E. Craig Wall Sr. School of Business Administration at Coastal. The annual contest is open to set Georgetown County high school students.

Mark Roof, a student at Georgetown High School was first place winner. Roof received \$200 for his essay entitled, *The People's Federal Deficit*.

Second place winner was Kavis D. Reed, a student attending Choppee High School. Reed was awarded \$100 for his essay entry entitled, *Deficit Solution: Balanced Budget Amendment*.

The contest is part of an outreach program that focuses on promoting economic understanding and an appreciation for the free enterprise system among the citizens of Georgetown County. The International Paper Company Foundation provides funding for the program annually through a grant. In addition to the essay contest, the grant has been used to fund a seminar program for members of the Georgetown Chamber of Commerce, and a public lecture at Georgetown High School presented by Clayton M. Christensen, president and chief executive of Ceramics Process Systems Corporation based in Massachusetts.

Coastal's Alumni Association Presents Alumni Of The Year Awards

Two Myrtle Beach business professionals were recently presented with the Alumna and Alumnus of the Year awards at the thirteenth annual meeting of the Alumni Association at Coastal.

The prestigious awards are presented annually to distinguished alumni of the college who have made notable contributions to alumni activities and have provided outstanding leadership to their business or profession, college, community, country, and society.

Ruthie Kearns, vice president of marketing at Coastal Federal Savings & Loan Association, was the recipient of the Alumna of the Year award. went on to receive a bachelor's degree from USC. She has been involved with the Coastal Alumni Association since 1979. She was treasurer of the organization in 1980, vicepresident of programming in 1981, and president in 1982.

Kearns, also vice chairman of the Horry County Higher Education Committee (HCHEC), says that Coastal has had much to do with her success in life and she is glad she chose the college to receive her undergraduate education.

Clark Parker, certified public accountant with Parker, Hilburn and McQueen Accounting Services, received the Alumnus of the Year award. Parker graduated from Coastal with a degree in accounting in 1977. He has been actively involved with the association since that time as president of the Alumni Association 1978-79, chairman of the board in 1980, and director in 1982.

He is a member of the Chicora and Conway Rotary clubs, the Myrtle Beach Jaycees, Grand Strand Press Association, and CINO Club.

Parker says he believes his active role in Coastal's Alumni Association is his way of giving Coastal something in return for the quality of education he received at the college.

Debbie Schmitt, director of alumni affairs, received an Award of Merit, for her outstanding service to the organization.

Junior Scholars Program In Theater Offered During Summer

Top academic students will have the opportunity to experience life in the theater during the Junior Scholars Program in Theater at Coastal, Sunday, July 23 to Sunday, July 30.

The program is open to any South Carolina public school student who has been identified as a Junior Scholar based on his or her performance on the PSAT, a prelude test to the SAT.

According to Claudia Cleary, assistant professor of philosophy and director of the program, the eight-day residential program is designed to completely immerse the student in the excitement of theater.

"We expect that by the end of the week, students will leave with a wonder and excitement of the theater," she said.

The program will involve students working in small groups, receiving ten hours of instruction in acting skills, costume design, and set/technical design. Each evening, students will rehearse for a full-scale production which will be presented the final day of the program.

Director of acting for the program is Jay Thompson, known throughout the United States for his theatrical work and coauthor of *Once Upon a Mattress*. Locally, Thompson has directed shows in many cities in South Carolina and his original plays have been featured at Piccolo Spoleto in Charleston.

Technical director for the program is Jeff Nichols, whose work in theater extends from Maine to South Carolina. Nichols was visiting professor of theater and speech at Coastal this past year and has been technical director of numerous professional, college and community productions.

Donna Catton-Johnson, who has costumed over 25 productions, will be costume director.

Students will learn theatrical skills in Wheelwright Auditorium and will benefit from Coastal's complete technical and costume shops and professional stage.

Students will stay in air-conditioned residence halls and all meals will be served in the Student Center cafeteria. Coastal's Physical Education Center swimming and recreational facilities also will be available to the students.

Fee for the program is \$400 and includes meals, residence hall fees, costuming and technical materials, instructional fees, and a Junior Scholars T-shirt. A \$50 deposit is required at time of registration. Financial need scholarship information is also available. Application deadline is Tuesday, June 6.
