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

Coastal's Teacher Education Program Earns Approval

The teacher education program at USC Coastal Carolina College has received approval for a seven-year period beginning July 1 following the action of the State Board of Education. Coastal is the first college in South Carolina to achieve full approval of all its teacher education programs since the inception of new state accreditation standards.

The approval of teacher education programs is based on a comprehensive evaluation of the institution using the National Association of State Directors of Teacher Education and Certification (NASDTEC) standards suitably modified and extended by the State Board of Education. Any program of study in professional education offered in South Carolina must be approved by the State Board of Education if the program is to be used for the purpose of initial certification.

According to Sandy Bowden, associate professor of education at Coastal, the Professional Review Committee of the State Board of Education submits its recommendation after a complete examination is conducted at the college. The study at Coastal included a team of 20 individuals who came to the college during the spring 1989 semester to examine the teacher education program. The group examines recordkeeping, relationships with other schools within the college, relationship of the college and the local school districts, and the quality of student programs.

The state on-site review team evaluated Coastal's teacher education programs in elementary education; English; mathematics; biology; social studies; art; music education-choral; physical education; and early childhood education.

"We have worked hard to make sure our programs are in compliance with state standards," said Bowden. "A lot of what we did during the on-site evaluation at the college was to provide evidence of what we have accomplished. Dennis Wiseman, dean of the School of Education and Health Professions, worked diligently, dedicating many hours in leading the self-study segment of the NASDTEC Process."

Ron Ingle, vice chancellor for academic affairs, says approval of the certification program reflects on the entire college as a quality institution.

"The teacher education program approval standards are extremely rigorous. Our meeting these standards fully is a reflection of the quality not only of our teacher education programs, but also the efforts of the entire institution," Ingle said. "We also are very proud that Coastal Carolina College is the first institution in the state to receive full accreditation under the new procedures of the State Board of Education."

Bowden says the approval of the program also makes an impact on how other colleges perceive Coastal.

"Approval for the certification program signifies the campus-wide support that teacher education receives at Coastal and increases our statewide reputation," said Bowden. "We are receiving a lot of inquiries from other colleges to learn what kinds of things we are doing."

Intensive Desktop Publishing Workshop Offered By Continuing Education

Graduate and Continuing Education will offer a two-day intensive desktop publishing workshop, Thursday, July 6 and Friday, July 7 at the Graduate and Continuing Education Center on campus. Classes will be from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day.

This 16-hour workshop, taught by Dr. Jake Halford, will prepare participants to become effective and efficient in the use of desktop publishing by exploring the elements of design, learning lay-out techniques for pages, as well as how to properly edit texts. The art of color separation, editing and preparation of graphics, and the preparation of camera ready art will be part of the total learning experience of this workshop. Microsoft windows and the mouse will be used during the training.

During the workshop participants will prepare a two-page travel brochure and a four-page travel catalog.

The IBM PS/2 model 50 computers will be used with the Aldus Pagemaker III software. McIntosh computer users should also attend.

Fee for the workshop is \$325 and includes 16 hours of hands on instruction, workbook and student disk. 1.6 CEU's will be issued upon completion of this course. The deadline to register is Monday, July 3. The class is limited to seven participants.
