Junior Scholars Marine Science Program Held At Coastal

Thirty-two of South Carolina's top ninth grade students recently participated in the second annual Junior Scholars Program in Marine Science at Coastal. The program is open to the top three percent of ninth grade students in the state, determined by students' scores on the PSAT, a preliminary test to the SAT.

The program involved the exploration of marine science and how understanding the marine processes in the area is critical to the utilization and preservation of the area environments. Students studied biological, geological, chemical, and physical science principles.

According to Dr. Paul Gayes, director of the Center for Marine and Wetland Studies at Coastal and coordinator of the program, the students gained valuable information on all areas of marine science which will be beneficial in their future roles in college and careers.

"Marine science studies a complex system," said Gayes. "We were able to give these students exposure and hands-on experience of all areas of the field. Regardless of what any of these students choose to pursue careerwise in the future, what they learned through this program will be beneficial. Political, social and economic concerns can be impacted by processes studied in marine science."

Michael Clark, a junior marine science major at Coastal, served as a counselor in the program. He says that students were really excited about learning and had fun at the same time.

"They asked very good questions," said Clark. "They were interested in learning and getting out there and actually doing things. The students did not have to read out of texts. They learned through participation."

Michael Pearson, a senior marine science major at Coastal, and counselor for the program, says he was able to learn along with the students.

"I have considered teaching in marine science in the future, and this program gave me the opportunity to work with students in the same age group that I would like to teach," he said.

Pearson said students enjoyed discovering their unique interests through the program.

"Each student had a specific thing he or she liked more than something else, and would really get into it," he said. "Some students really went for beach profiling, while others got into other areas. Two students in the program really did not participate fully until they got to wavelength measuring - that was their interest."

Many of the students believe they were lucky to have participated in the program and can carry the experience with them into the future.

William Joseph Cunningham of Myrtle Beach, a student in the program, says the staff at Coastal was competent in the information they presented, and he will never forget what he learned.

"I learned a lot about everything in marine science," said Cunningham. "I was really lucky to be in the program, and I will use the information in the future because I am interested in science."

Cunningham also said he was one of 22 students who became a certified scuba diver during the two-week period.

Kathleen De Goeyse of Conway says that she is not sure she wants to pursue a science-related career, but the experience she gained in the program will be a great resource in any other field she chooses.

"Everything I learned and the way it was presented was so interesting," said De Goeyse. "I especially enjoyed learning about beach erosion, animals and salt marshes. I think that learning about so many different areas was good, and I might be interested in these topics later because of it."
