Coastal Expands Evening Course Schedule

The evening course schedule has been expanded this year, to meet the needs of working students who cannot attend day-time classes. Evening classes meet between 5:30 and 11 p.m.

Undergraduate evening courses are offered in computer science, history, English, biology, business administration, education, mathematics, psychology, music, spanish, government and international studies, economics, and art history.

Fall semester classes begin Monday, August 28. The sixteen-week session will be held Monday, August 28 through Friday, December 8. Fall I, an eight-week session, will be held Monday, August 28 through Wednesday, October 18. Fall II session will be held Monday, October 23 through Thursday, December 14.

The Admissions Department will hold "Straight Talks," informational sessions for prospective students age 22 and over, on Thursday, August 17 from 6 to 9 p.m., and Saturday, August 19 from 9 a.m. to 12 noon in the Little Theater located in the Graduate and Continuing Education Building. The sessions are free and open to the public.

College representatives will discuss undergraduate admissions procedures, how to manage the cost of education, advisement, and class scheduling for the fall semester.

Horry County Higher Education Commission Elects 1989-90 Officers

The Horry County Higher Education Commission (HCHC), has announced its officers for the 1989-90 year.

They are Elizabeth Shaw of Conway, chairperson; Clay D. Brittain III of Myrtle Beach, vice chairman; Edward M. Henry of Conway, secretary; and Donald A. Moore of North Myrtle Beach, treasurer.

Shaw has been a member of HCHC since 1985, and previously served as the group's chairman of the finance/budget/audit committee. She is part owner of Cawins, Inc., an accounting firm based in Conway.

Employed with Canal Industries, Inc. for forty-three years, Shaw retired as corporate secretary/treasurer. She graduated as valedictorian from both Motte's Business College in Wilmington, North Carolina and Conway High School.

Shaw serves as secretary of the Red Hill Chapter for the Republican party; and has been a volunteer with the American Heart Association since 1972. She is a former city campaign chairman for the American Cancer Society; volunteer of the United Way and March of Dimes; and city chairman of the Boy Scouts of America campaign.

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An avid supporter of Coastal Carolina College, Shaw has worked with the Coastal Council for Internationals, an organization that strives to promote welfare, happiness and well-being of international students who attend the college; and is a member of the Wheelwright Council for the Arts. She has lobbied for the new E. Craig Wall Sr. School of Business Administration, and has traveled to Columbia to consult with and encourage the county delegation on the project.

Clay Brittain, III, Myrtle Beach lawyer, was appointed to the Commission in 1987 and is a former vice-president of the group.

Brittain graduated from Wofford College in 1977 and the University of South Carolina School of Law in 1980. He is a 1973 graduate of Myrtle Beach High School.

Edward Henry, retired Conway elementary school principal, has served on the Commission since 1972. He previously served on the Commission's nominating/legislative committee.

Henry earned bachelor of science and master of science degrees from Florida A&M University. He is a graduate of Lincoln High School.

Henry served in the United States Army from 1941 to 1946 and is a former staff sergeant. Active in several community and professional organizations, he is a member of the Bethel A.M.E. Church; Horry County Council of Aging; and the Horry County Retired Education Association. He is a former member of the Horry County Board of Education.

Donald Moore, retired real estate agent, has been a Commission member since 1970. He has served as chairman and member of the finance committee of the group.

Moore received a bachelor of arts degree from Albion College, and is a graduate of Grosse Pointe High School. He is a former member of the United States Army Air Corps, Army Aviation Engineers.

Moore is a former president and secretary of the North Myrtle Beach Rotary, and past vice-president of the North Myrtle Beach Real Estate Board.

The Commission also has appointed Clark Parker, certified public accountant, as a new member this year. Parker is a partner of Parker, Hilburn and McQueen Accounting Associates with offices based in Myrtle Beach and Conway.

Clark received a bachelor of science degree in accounting from Coastal Carolina College in 1977 and is a graduate of Aynor High School.

Parker was self-employed as an accounting practitioner in Conway from 1985 to 1988; a partner with Parker and Gore Accounting Associates in Conway from 1982 to 1985; business manager at Harris-Weible Advertising, Inc. in Myrtle Beach from 1979 to 1982; and business manager at Resort Publications, Inc., from 1977 to 1979.

Presently, Parker is treasurer of Community Volunteer Services, Inc.; stewardship and finance chairman of Waccamaw Baptist Association; member of Gideons International; member and past president of the Coastal Carolina College Alumni Association; and member and past president of Coastal Carolina College's "CINO" Booster Club.

Alford Named Chairman Emeritus Of Horry County Higher Education Commission

William H. Alford of Myrtle Beach has been named chairman emeritus by the Horry County Higher Education Commission, and has been recognized for his service in a resolution passed by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina. Alford has served on the Commission since 1985, and was chairman from 1987 to 1989.

Alford is vice president of A&I Fire and Water Restoration Inc. of Myrtle Beach. He is past president of the Myrtle Beach Area Chamber of Commerce and a member and past president of the Rotary Club. Presently, Alford is chairman of the Horry County Higher Education Commission Ad Hoc Special Study Committee.

The resolution commends Alford for his devotion to Commission work and for his work in behalf of the people of Horry County, work that has resulted in the progress of education in the county and increased resources for Coastal Carolina College.

Alford is a graduate of Coastal Carolina and a former United States Marine.

Students Learn Theater Experience Through Junior Scholars Program At Coastal

Twenty-three students participated in the first Junior Scholars Program in Theater recently at Coastal. The week-long program, designed to expose children to the excitement of theater, was open to the state's top middle school students in academics, determined by scores on the PSAT, a preliminary test to the SAT.

During the week a swarm of activity was going on at Wheelwright Auditorium as young students were hammering nails on stage, assembling parts that would soon be transformed into a fantasy land; some of the students were above the stage in the costume shop picking out materials and sewing costumes for characters named Alice, Jabberwock, and Dormouse. Other students gathered outside the auditorium's doors, crawling the floors, pretending they were giraffes. And when they were done with all of this, they went their separate ways to learn lines for a play they presented at the end of the week.

According to Claudia Cleary, assistant professor of philosophy and director of the program, the students who were able to participate in this year's program gained top-notch experience, both in the quality of instructors and in the areas of instruction.

"This is one of those experiences that students would not realize how much they had learned until they got home," said Cleary. "And the instructors they worked with are really the cream of the crop."

Cleary said the students followed a rigorous schedule during their week of learning about acting skills, costume design, and set/technical design. Students and instructors stayed in

Coastal Carolina Invitational

For the tenth consecutive year the Western Ontario

University fishing team is the first official entry for the Coastal Carolina Invitational, an intercollegiate fishing match and seminar held annually on the Grand Strand. This year's dates are September 20 through 22, just before National Hunting and Fishing Day.

Professor John Fairs of the physical education department at Western will again coach the Western team which has participated in the Coastal Carolina Invitational every year since 1975, the year after its founding. "We have yet to win, but we've caught a lot of fish and enjoyed the Coastal Carolina hospitality," Fairs noted when he called with his acceptance. Student anglers and coaches will fish on the Hurricane fleet out of North Myrtle Beach and on the Capt. Bill out of Captain Dick's Marine in Murrells Inlet.

the college dormitories, woke up at 7 a.m. and worked until 11 p.m. The little free time the students did have was spent memorizing lines for the group's production at the end of the week.

Donna Catton-Johnson, costume director of the program and a 1982 graduate of Coastal, says she was overwhelmed in working with the group of children.

"I've always wanted to do something like this -- there's something about taking a bunch of teenagers in blue jeans and putting them in costumes. Costumes transform people. When the kids see themselves in a costume they say 'Wow, that's me, the Jabberwock,' or whatever character it may be."

"I love working with kids," she said. "This group was really bright and asked pertinent questions. They have even given me ideas."

Catton-Johnson, who has costumed over 25 productions, and has worked primarily with college-age students, says working with children was a thrill.

Donna Catton-Johnson's assistant was Jeff Woodward of Conway, who played the character of George in the spring Coastal Theater production of *Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?*

What did the kids have to say about their week in the spotlight?

Tracy Amick of West Columbia, whose future plans include a career in acting, says she loved the experience.

"I love drama and any other form of art," said Amick. "When I received the information in the mail about this program, I jumped at the chance. I have learned a lot more than I expected. I've made props, learned how to sew, and acted in a play."

Amick says the play, *Six Impossible Things Before Breakfast*, a variation of the play *Through the Looking Glass*, was a wonderful play to act in, and that she loved designing the cover of the program for the play. She says that her portrayal of the character March Hare has reinforced her goal of becoming an actress one day.

"I definitely want to be an actress," she said. "My mother and brother both do movies, so it runs in the family."

Whitney Howard of Myrtle Beach, says aside of her drama activities at church, she had not been exposed to theatrical techniques until the junior scholars program.

"I am really happy that I decided to be in the program," she said. "The experience of actually being able to help design a costume and scenery, and do acting all at the same time was great."

Howard has hopes of becoming an actress also, and wants to attend Juilliard School in New York when the time comes. She says if someone her age was thinking about participating in a program like this, she would say one thing -- "Do it."

Another participant who hopes to be an actress one day, Nikki Doby of Myrtle Beach, says that by being in the program, she was able to learn ways of decreasing her shyness.

"I was the shyest one in the program," she said. "But I want

to be an actress one day because I like the art of entertaining people. I have learned how to breathe when speaking and how to make my voice carry when on stage."

Doby, whose part in the play was the Executioner, and the tail end section of the Jabberwock, says she loves to daydream, so she especially loved the fantasy world involved in the play. But on the other hand, she says modern day movies are one of her main interests; her favorite actor is Tom Cruise and favorite actress, Candice Cameron from the TV sitcom-comedy "Full House."

Courtney Cunningham of Myrtle Beach summed up the feelings of most of the students pretty well, when she said the only bad part of the program was getting up every morning.

"I really love everything we've done here this week, but I just don't like getting up early."

Jay Thompson, co-author of *Once Upon a Mattress*, was the program's director of acting. Thompson is known throughout the United States for his work in theater. Locally, he has directed shows in many of the major cities of South Carolina. His original plays have been featured at Piccolo Spoleto in Charleston. Thompson's assistant was Coastal graduate, Robin Edwards of Myrtle Beach.

Jeff Nichols, whose work extends from Maine to South Carolina, was the technical director of the program. Nichols has been technical director in professional, college and community productions and was visiting professor of theater and speech at Coastal this past year. His assistant was Coastal student, Mark Kaufmann.
