Renowned painter and lecturer Willow Winston of London, will be a special guest at the celebration of Coastal's Art Center building on Sunday, September 17. The program is open to the public.

Activities will begin with a gallery reception at 2:30 p.m. in the Graduate and Continuing Education building, (formerly the Fine Arts building). Winston's latest collection of paintings, "The Magic Desert Journey," will be on display in the gallery, and will be available for viewing through Thursday, October 12. Winston describes her exhibit as "a tapestry telling the story of the journeys in America, with paintings from Europe to show the contrast between the two continents."

In conjunction with the reception, Jordan "Pat" Alexander, (piano), lecturer in music at Coastal, and Charles Gidney, (recorder), chair of the Department of Foreign Languages and associate professor at Coastal will perform. There also will be an open house in the recently renovated Art Center building. Guests may view student and faculty works while touring the center.

At 4 p.m., the celebration will conclude with a lecture by Winston in the Little Theater of the Graduate and Continuing Education building.

Winston received a postgraduate diploma in printmaking and a bachelor of arts degree in fine arts/painting from the Central School of Art and Design in London. She has taught at Royal Academy Schools, Sunderland Arts Center, Camden Institute, and St. Paul's Girls School in London.

Winston will remain at Coastal through Friday, September 22 as visiting artist-in-residence, teaching techniques and methods to Coastal printmaking and drawing students.

Coastal To Begin Comprehensive Enrichment Program In International Studies

USC Coastal Carolina College has been designated to coordinate the formation of a comprehensive enrichment program in international studies, which involves networking with nine other colleges in South Carolina. Program funds, totaling \$336,000, will be provided by a three-year grant from the Center for International Education, United States

Department of Education. Federal funds of \$75,000 each year will be matched by local contributions of approximately \$37,000 each year.

Coastal administrators, faculty and staff recently met with representatives from the nine other participating colleges in the state to discuss the new program.

According to Fred Hicks, professor of history and director of the program, the college was selected to head the program for several reasons.

"Coastal has been recognized as a major provider of higher education opportunities to black citizens in the state," said Hicks. "Coastal also is one of the fastest growing institutions in the state. We are no longer regarded as a local institution, but as a regional institution."

According to Hicks and Geoff Parsons, coordinator of the program at Coastal, it will enable colleges to foster increased international awareness on their campuses, in their communities and among their students.

Activities that have been planned thus far are an October conference where international scholar Dr. Chadwick Alger, director of the International Studies Program at Ohio State, will speak with college representatives; a mid-winter trip in Mexico for selected students from the ten campuses; a week-long international festival on each campus; and workshops for college representatives on how to internationalize the campus and the curriculum. Funds also will be used toward numerous staff development programs, educational materials and books, and travel for faculty and students at participating institutions.

The ten participating colleges are Coastal Carolina College; Allen University, Columbia; Benedict College, Columbia; Morris College, Sumter; South Carolina State College, Orangeburg; Voorhees College, Denmark; USC Aiken; USC Beaufort; USC Salkehatchie; and USC Union.

Over the next three years, representatives from the colleges will continue to meet and discuss further development of the program.

Department of Biology Receives Research Grants

The Department of Biology was recently awarded \$29,052 from the Yawkey Foundation and \$7,930 from the South Carolina Grant Consortium to conduct research.

Dr. Chris Marsh, assistant professor of biology, will use the grants for two research projects.

The first project, funded by the Yawkey Foundation, is entitled "Ecology of the American Avocet on the Tom Yawkey Wildlife Center."

According to Marsh, the two-year project involves the investigation of the ecology of the American Avocet, an unusual-looking shorebird that winters in large numbers at the Tom Yawkey Wildlife Center, located south of Georgetown, but is otherwise rare along the Atlantic Coast.

Marsh will attempt to determine how management of marshes for waterfowl at the Yawkey Wildlife Center has created a favorable habitat for avocets and how management practices can be modified to increase avocet use of the center.

The second project, "Assessment of a Volunteer Program to Survey Shorebird Populations on the Coast of South Carolina," is funded by the South Carolina Sea Grant Consortium.

It involves evaluating the use of volunteers to conduct monthly surveys of the South Carolina coast to locate areas regularly used by species of shorebirds of special concern.

The objectives of the project are to conduct a weekend workshop to train and evaluate skills of the volunteers; to locate areas that should be monitored by the volunteers; and to coordinate monthly statewide shorebird surveys.

According to Marsh, the information collected by the volunteer survey teams will be used to identify coastal areas that represent important winter habitat and migratory stop-over sites for species of shorebirds whose populations have declined drastically during the past decade.

Coastal Professors Receive American Fulbright Scholar Awards

Dr. Sara Sanders, assistant professor of English, and Dr. Steve Nagle, director of International Programs and associate professor of English, have been awarded Fulbright Scholarship grants for 1989-90. The professors received the grants to lecture at Adam Mickiewicz University of Poznan, in Poland, from September to July 1990.

Approximately 1,000 Americans will go abroad to lecture or conduct research during the 1989-90 academic year. Established in 1946 under congressional legislation introduced by former Senator J. William Fulbright of

Arkansas, the program is designed "to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and the people of other countries." Grants are awarded to Americans to lecture and conduct research abroad and to foreign nationals to engage in similar activities in the United States. Individuals are selected on the basis of academic and professional qualifications and their ability and willingness to share ideas and experiences with people of diverse cultures. More than 23,000 American scholars have participated in the Fulbright program since it began over 40 years ago, many of them rising to positions of leadership in government, academia, the media, and the arts.

The Fulbright program is funded and administered by the U.S. Information Agency under policy guidelines established by the Board of Foreign Scholarships, a Presidentially appointed body. Financial support for the program comes from U.S. congressional appropriations and from the governments of twenty-seven other nations.

Coastal's 1989 Whole Language Conference To Be Held

The two-day conference, "Whole Language: Empowering Teachers and Learners," will be held at Coastal, Friday, September 22, and Saturday, September 23.

The conference focuses on the educational trend of teaching children and adults by using real examples of reading, writing, and storytelling, as opposed to the "Dick and Jane" method.

The conference features Regie Routman, reading recovery teacher from Ohio, and author of Transitions: From Literature to Literacy; Bob Wortman, Arizona elementary school principal and former whole language kindergarten teacher; and Debbie Dewitt, North Myrtle Beach school teacher.

Educators from more than ten states will discuss topics such as: whole language strategies and children's literature in the writing classroom; empowerment and whole language; children as language artists; the at-home whole language environment of children; using non-sexist children's literature; reading and writing: partners in the common

experience; and teaching beginning reading through writing.

The conference will begin Friday, September 22 at 1 p.m., with concurrent sessions held through 7 p.m. On Saturday, September 23, concurrent sessions will be held 9 a.m. through 4 p.m.

Registration fee is \$95 and includes non-credit registration, reception, Saturday luncheon, and materials. Conference fee is \$125 after Tuesday, September 12. Deadline for registration is Thursday, September 21.
