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Tchaikovsky Chamber Orchestra To Perform At Coastal

The Tchaikovsky Chamber Orchestra, a thirteen member group that performs works from Bach and Vivaldi to Shostakovich and Barber, will perform at Coastal, Sunday, September 24 at 2:30 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium.

In its 1979 debut season, the orchestra gave seven performances at Carnegie Hall, appeared at Lincoln Center's Avery Fisher Hall, Philadelphia's Academy of Music, Princeton's McCarter Theater, and in Washington D.C. Each concert drew capacity audiences and consistently inspired rave reviews and standing ovations.

The success of the Tchaikovsky Chamber Orchestra has spanned three continents. A widely acclaimed South American tour in 1982 led to return trips in 1984 and 1986. The group's European debut took place in 1983, and in 1984 the orchestra returned to fill houses in Switzerland, Austria, Belgium, England, Italy, Germany, and Holland.

Maestro Lazar Gosman, a native of Russia, is the founder and music director of the Tchaikovsky Chamber Orchestra. A full-length documentary film, "Musical Passage," released in April 1984, tells the story of how Gosman came to America and founded the orchestra. The documentary provides insight into the experience of emigrants from the Soviet Union as the film follows the group on tour throughout America, culminating in its triumphant Carnegie Hall concert.

Gosman is professor of violin and chamber music at the State University of New York at Stonybrook, and music director of the St. Louis Kammerguild. He also is founder of the Leningrad Chamber Orchestra and led the group for seventeen years.

The Tchaikovsky Chamber Orchestra has been described by The Los Angeles Times as "...well equipped with silken sound and polished ensemble...spirited Mozartean delicacy and articulative precision."

The Toronto Star describes a recent performance by the orchestra as "...A special treat; there is a special poignancy in being able to hear such an ensemble." The New York Post stated in a performance review, "An almost unbelievably sweet, warm tone, rich sonority and rare ensemble, Mr. Gosman played with great richness and sensitivity and drew the same sweetness from every member of his group."

The orchestra recently made its first recording, performing works by Shostakovich and Tchaikovsky. The record was issued by the Musical Heritage Society.

Tickets for the concert are \$15, or \$8 for students with a Coastal I.D.

Center For Marine And Wetland Studies Faculty Conduct Research

Coastal's Center for Marine and Wetland Studies has been awarded a \$64,163 grant for a project entitled "Late Quaternary Evolution of the Inner Continental Shelf and Coastal Zone of South Carolina: Climatic and Relative Sea Level Changes," from the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education, through the Cutting Edge Research Grants to Senior Colleges for 1989-90.

The project incorporates sedimentologic, geophysical and paleotological studies of the coastal zone and the inner continental shelf of South Carolina. It also provides a foundation for studies of the geological history and development of the coastal zone, and climate and relative sea level changes within the zone.

Dr. Paul Gayes, director of the Center for Marine and Wetland Studies at Coastal, is a principal investigator of the project. Dr. Douglas Nelson, professor of marine science and geology at Coastal, and Dr. David Scott, associate professor for the Center of Marine Geology at Dalhousie University in Nova Scotia, Canada also are involved as researchers.

According to Gayes, Dr. Scott, who serves on the International Geologic Correlation Program - Project 274 with Gayes, is impressed with the research projects the Coastal marine science faculty are involved with, and recently visited the Coastal campus to participate in the sea level change research project.

Scott says the study of sea level change and beach erosion is an issue that scientists must study now, in order to learn how to deal with the problem in the future.

"In this area, especially, coastal erosion is a real problem," said Scott. "The sea level is rising rapidly and is going to get worse. By doing this research, we are trying to get a grip on what is happening on the coastline, so that we will be able to advise builders about some of the dangers of the rising sea

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level."

No conclusions can be determined from the research at this point, since it is in its first stages of gathering data, said Gayes.

The Center of Marine and Wetland Studies was formed to study and improve the understanding of the local marine environment and marine related issues facing the state and region. The center focuses on the assessment of coastal mineral resources, beach erosion and management, relative sea level change and environmental monitoring and management.

The "Relative Sea Level Change" project is one of many ongoing research projects Coastal faculty are conducting through the Center of Marine and Wetland Studies.

Coastal Professor Attends International Congress In Bulgaria

Dr. James J. Farsolas, associate professor of history, attended the VI Congress of the International Association of Southeast European Studies (AISEE), recently held in Sofia, Bulgaria.

Farsolas was a member of the delegation of the United States National Committee to the meeting. He presented a paper entitled "Theories and Interpretations: Greek and Romanian Historiography on the Revolutionary Movement of 1821 in the Romanian Principalities" in the section, "Modern Period: Political and Ideological Development." An extensive portion of the paper has been published in the proceedings of the Congress Resumes Des Communications Histoire, (volume 2, Sofia 1989, pp. 87-92).

More than eight hundred representatives from thirty countries (Europe, U.S., Canada, Middle East, Africa, and Australia), attended the Congress.

Papers were presented in the fields of arts, archaeology, history, ethnology, folklore, literature, linguistics, and law.

The official languages used at the Congress were English, French, Russian, German, and Bulgarian.

The Congresses of the International Association of Southeastern European Studies are held every five years and are supported by the UNESCO and various organizations of the host country. The next Congress will take place in Athens, Greece in the summer of 1994.
