Coastal Carolina Theater To Present "Bus Stop"

"Bus Stop," William Inge's comedy about bus passengers stranded in a Kansas roadside cafe during a snowstorm, will be presented by Coastal Carolina Theater Friday, October 13 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, with additional performances Saturday, October 14 at 8 p.m., and Sunday, October 15 at 2:30 p.m.

Auborn Boyd, a freshman at Coastal Carolina College, will play the lead role of Elma Duckworth, a sweet high school girl who works as a waitress in the Kansas restaurant. She is innocent and loves learning about things, but is very naive.

Jennifer Kallmeyer, a sophomore at Coastal, will portray Grace, who runs the restaurant and lives in an upstairs apartment above the restaurant. Grace is the flirtatious type, but is protective of her reputation as well as Elma's.

Nina McDuffie, a senior at Coastal, will play the character of Cherie, a pretty and sexy passenger on the bus who is a nightclub singer at the Blue Dragon Night Club in Kansas City.

Eddie Bell, a sophomore at Coastal, will portray the character Bo Decker, a tall, good-looking, naive cowboy, who has come to the city to prove his prowess at the rodeo and find a wife.

Other major cast members include E.T.E. Sprague, who will play Dr. Lyman, an alcoholic ex-college professor who has failed several marriages and jobs; Sean Pierce, the character of Carl, the bus driver who also is attracted to Grace; James Bryan, the character of Will, the local sheriff; and Vaughn Cox, the character of Virgil Blessing, a sensitive, guitar-playing ranch hand who raised Bo Decker.

Sandi Shackelford, assistant professor of theater at Coastal Carolina College is director of the play. Shackelford has a master of fine arts in acting from Southern Methodist University and has been an instructor in oral communications in the College of Applied Professional Sciences on the USC Columbia campus. She participated in the summer 1989 National Theater Acting Program in England studying Shakespearean acting. This is her first semester at Coastal.

Coastal students Debbie Rahn is producer of the play; Suzanne Banks, stage manager; and Tim Hicks, lighting and sound manager.

Graduate And Continuing Education Sponsors Faculty Development Conference '89

The two-day conference, "Issues in College Teaching," will be held at Coastal Friday, October 20 and Saturday, October 21.

The conference will explore multicultural issues on campus, integration of computers and curriculum, faculty development strategies, improving the quality of teaching, and campus teaching centers.

Three educators will be featured speakers at the conference.

Dr. Lloyd H. Bell of the University of Pittsburgh has been an administrator at a major urban university for the past twenty years. He has been active in programs to help faculty become more aware of issues in college teaching as they relate to minority students.

Dr. Robert Ruddell of the University of California at Berkeley, is a renowned contributor in the fields of reading, language arts and teacher education. His latest project involves researching the personal characteristics and the teaching/learning dynamics of individuals who have won the Outstanding Teacher Awards at the University of California at Berkeley.

Dr. Paul E. Stanton, professor of psychology at Coastal, has experience as a faculty member and academic dean, and has co-chaired the International Reading Association Commission on Teacher Training. He presently is involved in the development of a model for an on-campus teaching improvement center.

The conference begins Friday, October 20, at 12 noon. Registration will be held in the Wheelwright Auditorium lobby. Concurrent sessions will be held through 5:45 p.m., with a reception at 6 p.m. Registration will be held Saturday, October 21, at 8:30 a.m., in the Wheelwright Auditorium lobby.
