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Senator Proxmire To Be Fall Lecturer For Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series

William Proxmire, one of the most respected members of the United States Senate for more than thirty years, will speak at USC Coastal Carolina College, Tuesday, October 17, at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, as part of the Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series. The lecture is free and open to the public; however, tickets are required. They are available on a first-come, first-served basis at Wheelwright box office, ext. 2502.

Proxmire's political career began in 1950, when he was elected to the Wisconsin State Assembly. He was elected to the United States Senate in 1957 in a special election to fill the seat left vacant after the death of Senator Joseph McCarthy. He was reelected the following year to his first full six-year term and again in 1964, 1970, 1976, and 1982.

Senator Proxmire holds the longest unbroken record in the history of the Senate in answering roll call votes. There have been over 9,400 roll call votes since April, 1966. The average senator has missed more than 950 of these votes, but Proxmire has not missed one.

Proxmire received his undergraduate degree from Yale in 1938, and a master's degree in business administration, cum laude, from the Harvard Graduate School of Business in 1940. He received a second master's degree from Harvard in public administration.

The senator is the author of five books: *Can Small Business Survive? Report From the Wasteland*; *America's Military-Industrial Complex*; *Uncle Sam, Last of the Big Time Spenders*; *You Can Do It!*; and *The Fleecing of America*.

According to the National Taxpayers' Union, Senator Proxmire held the best record in the Senate during each of the last four years for holding down spending. The Union also states that in the eighteen years since it began keeping records, Proxmire has the best overall record in the Senate.

"Athletics and Academics: An Uneasy Alliance," moderated by Columbia University Journalism Professor Fred W. Friendly, highlights a panel of 15 college coaches, sports journalists, college presidents, and other academic professionals discussing the ethical dilemmas that face college athletics and its impact on education. The session is part of Friendly's ongoing series, *The Other Side of the News*.

The conference will explore multicultural issues on campus, integration of computers and curriculum, faculty development strategies, improving the quality of teaching, and campus teaching centers.

Three educators will be featured speakers at the conference.

Dr. Lloyd H. Bell of the University of Pittsburgh has been an administrator at a major urban university for the past twenty years. He has been active in programs to help faculty become more aware of issues in college teaching as they relate to minority students.

Dr. Robert Ruddell of the University of California at Berkeley, is a renowned contributor in the fields of reading, language arts and teacher education. His latest project involves researching the personal characteristics and the teaching/learning dynamics of individuals who have won the Outstanding Teacher Awards at the University of California at Berkeley.

Dr. Paul E. Stanton, professor of psychology at Coastal, has experience as a faculty member and academic dean, and has co-chaired the International Reading Association Commission on Teacher Training. He presently is involved in the development of a model for an on-campus teaching improvement center.
