William Proxmire, one of the most respected members of the United States Senate for more than thirty years, will speak at USC Coastal Carolina College, Tuesday, October 17, at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, as part of the Kimbel Distinguished Lecture Series. The lecture is free and open to the public; however, tickets are required. They are available on a first-come, first-served basis at Wheelwright box office.

Coastal To Host International Studies Conference

Two Ohio State professors will be featured presenters in a conference on "How to Internationalize the General Studies Core Curriculum," at Coastal, Monday, October 23 and Tuesday, October 24. Conference lectures and workshops will be held in the Graduate and Continuing Education building, room 003.

The two-day conference is an activity of the International Studies Consortium, established earlier this year. Coastal Carolina College coordinates the program, and networks with nine other South Carolina Colleges. Program funds are provided by a three-year grant from the Center for International Education, United States Department of Education.

Dr. Chadwick Alger, Mershon professor of political science and public policy at Ohio State University, Columbus, Ohio, will discuss "Global Competition and the Need for International Awareness," Monday, October 23, from 8:30 to 9:20 a.m. The lecture is free and open to the public.

Alger received a master of arts degree from Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, Maryland. He earned his Ph.D. from Princeton University, Princeton, New Jersey.

Alger has served as a United Nations Visiting Professor at New York University and has taught at Northwestern University where he also served as director of international relations. He also has been associated with the international organizations U.N. University and UNESCO.

Alger is past president of the International Studies Association and author of numerous books in the field of international relations. He has edited and published several books and more than 100 papers on global issues and the internationalization of the campus, curricula and community.

From 10 a.m. to 12 p.m., Alger will conduct a workshop for Coastal faculty and faculty of the nine participating colleges that include Allen University, Columbia; Benedict College, Columbia; Morris College, Sumter; South Carolina State College, Orangeburg; Voorhees College, Denmark; USC Aiken,; USC Beaufort; USC Salkehatchie; and USC Union.

The workshop will be followed by a faculty question and answer session, from 2 to 4 p.m.

Dr. James E. Harf, professor of political science at Ohio State University, will continue the discussion on "Global Competition and the Need for International Awareness," Tuesday, October 24, from 8:30 to 9:45 a.m. The lecture is free and open to the public.

Harf received a master of arts degree from the University of Delaware, Newark, Delaware, and his Ph.D. from Indiana University.

Harf has received Ford, Exxon and National Science Foundation grants in the areas of national security, global issues and international studies education. He has served as a visiting professor at Duke University, Durham, North Carolina, and as an American Council of Education Fellow at Pennsylvania State University. He also is associated with the International Studies Association Education Foundation.

He is the author of The New Global Agenda, National Security Affairs, and International and Comparative Politics.

Harf will conduct a faculty workshop on international studies from 10:15 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. The workshop will be followed by a faculty question and answer session, from 2 to 4 p.m.

Brazilian Economist To Lecture At Coastal

Distinguished Brazilian economist Dr. Marcos Silva, a Fulbright scholar at the University of California - Berkeley, will present two lectures at Coastal, Monday, October 30. Free and open to the public, the presentations are sponsored by Coastal's Department of Government and International Studies; the International Studies Consortium, directed by Fred Hicks, professor of history; the School of Natural and Applied Sciences; and the Council on International Exchange of Scholars, in Washington, D.C.

The first lecture, "Brazil and its Society," will be held from 2 to 3 p.m. in the Student Center, room 104. Silva will discuss Brazilian geography, history, people, economy, and environment.

From 7 to 8 p.m. that evening, Silva will discuss "Brazil's Foreign and Internal Debt," in the Student Center, room 205.

Silva earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in economics at the University of Sao Paulo. He earned a Ph.D. in economics from the University in 1988. He was assistant professor of economics at the University from 1985 to 1988.

Silva is a researcher of FIPE (Fundacao Instituto de Pesquisas Economicas - Foundation for Economic Research), and direction and high level management deputy executive secretary of ANPEC (Associacao Nacional de Centros de Pos - Graducao em Economia - Brazilian Association of Centers of Post-Graduation in Economics.

The economist has conducted numerous research activities in the area of innovation and macroeconomics. His most recent projects include "Cost Assessment for Immunobiological Products," "Assessment of the Economic Impact of Biotechnology in the Pulp and Paper Industry," and "The General Theory: A Post-Keynesian Interpretation."

He is the author and co-author of several publications on economics, including Economic Perspectives in Biotechnology, Hyperinflation, The Reserve of Market in the Microcomputer Industry, and How to Finance the Steel Industry in Brazil.

Cutting Edge Research Grant Received

The Department of Nursing and Health and the Department of Psychology and Sociology at Coastal, have been awarded a \$27,752 research grant for a project entitled, "Psychobiological Predictors of Cardiac Rehabilitation" from the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education, through the Cutting Edge Research Grants to Senior Colleges for 1989-90.

The purpose of the project is to identify factors in the attitude and lifestyle of heart attack victims which may be used to predict whether they will or will not successfully enroll in and complete approved cardiac rehabilitative programs.

Dr. Karen Carpenter, assistant professor of nursing, is the principal investigator for the project. Dr. William E. Hills, assistant professor of psychology, is the research associate.

According to Hills, the rehabilitative effects of exercise vary among individuals and attitudinal factors may be influential. An ultimate goal, as a result of the research, would be to design additional programs or redesign existing programs to better suit the needs of noncompliant and nonbenefitting populations.

The cardiac rehabilitation program that Coastal Carolina College and Conway Hospital jointly share will be used in the study, said Hills.

"I believe Conway Hospital's willingness to work together with us indicates that Coastal is achieving a highly credible research stature," he said.

"The working relationship between the two institutions is a natural one and everyone stands to gain from the project -- Coastal Carolina College, by continuing to fulfill its mission of providing comprehensive educational opportunities, and Conway Hospital, by its recognition as an up-to-date medical center that also is supportive of research."

Coastal students are involved in the research project, he said.

"We are excited because we are able to employ students in every aspect of the project, from data collection to analysis," said Hills. "This gives our students the chance to get handson understanding of research that is only obtained from actual participation in a project."

Mathematics Department Schedules Conference

Coastal's Mathematics Department will sponsor a conference, entitled "Shaping Math Education for the 21st Century," Friday, October 27. The morning lecture, featuring keynote speaker Dr. Kenneth Hoffman, will be held at 10 a.m., in Wheelwright Auditorium. The afternoon session will begin at 1:30 p.m., with a panel discussion in the Graduate and Continuing Education building, room 005, and will continue, beginning at 3 p.m., with five concurrent sessions which will address various stages of mathematics education. The program is free and open to the public.

The purpose of the conference is to plan and develop a prototype model for mathematics education in this region and the country, relating to the National Research Council's published report to the nation on the future of mathematics education entitled, "Everybody Counts."

Dr. Kenneth Hoffman is professor of mathematics and former head of the department of mathematics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Dr. Hoffman was consulting editor for the report, "Everybody Counts."

This is the first of two conferences to be held at Coastal, made possible by a grant awarded by the Horry County Higher Education Commission to provide the services of experts, as consultants and speakers, concerning this report. The second conference, scheduled for spring 1990, will be a continuation of the work begun during these sessions.

Horry and Georgetown County School District teachers and administrators also will be attending as the local area seeks to respond to the national concern for the improvement of mathematics education.

A luncheon is planned at a cost of \$10 per person.

Holiday In Malaga On Spain's La Costa Del Sol

Spend part of your Christmas holiday on Spain's fabulous Sun Coast. The group will leave December 26 and return January 2.

The fee for the trip is \$779 per person, based on double occupancy, and includes round trip air from New York to Malaga, with all transfers from hotel to the airport; six nights of accommodations at the first class Sunset Beach apartments, with rooms featuring a balcony facing the Mediterranean; and, baggage handling, including tips, taxes and gratuities.
