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

English Department Receives Cutting Edge Research Grant

The Department of English, in conjunction with the USC Aiken Department of English, has been awarded a \$58,312 research grant for a project entitled "CLEAR" (College Level Essay Analysis and Rating), from the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education, through the Cutting Edge Research Grants to Senior Colleges for 1989-90 program.

The purpose of the project is to investigate and establish procedures and programs designed to foster and then measure student achievement in writing.

Dr. Paul Rice, assistant professor of English, and Dr. Susan Webb, assistant professor of sociology, are investigators for the project, along with Dr. Steve Gardner and Dr. Susan Bell of USC Aiken.

According to Webb, who chairs an institutional effectiveness committee at Coastal, there are three basic goals to be met in the CLEAR project.

"The goals are to refine the placement process for assigning students to freshman composition classes; to provide information that faculty can use in planning courses and teaching; and to assess the "value-added" to students' writing abilities by their college classes," she said.

Webb says the research process involves a number of tasks.

"We are working with the State Department of Education and with English professors to identify the components of college-level writing and using this information to develop analytical rating scales which will pinpoint the strengths and weaknesses in student essays. Then, we are training readers to rate student writing and evaluating ways to make their ratings consistent and useful to professors."

Webb says the information about student achievement will then be submitted to the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education, which they have requested as part of their focus on the effectiveness of state colleges.

According to Rice, it is important that two of USC's senior campuses are collaborating on the project.

"USC Coastal Carolina College and USC Aiken are working together in a consortial way to produce a system of evaluation and placement which we hope might become a standard for the state," said Rice. "We are especially interested in the input the State Department of Education has in the project because it will be the basis of improved teamwork between teachers of composition in the public schools and those at Coastal. It also will provide a continuity of expectation for those students entering Coastal from the South Carolina public school system."

Collin Nominated For CASE Professor Of The Year Award

Dr. Richard Collin, professor of political science at Coastal, recently was presented a certificate of honor from the Council for Advancement and Support of Education, as Coastal's nominee in the 1989 Professor of the Year Program.

The CASE Professor of the Year Program was established in 1981 to annually honor one outstanding undergraduate professor for contributions in the lives and careers of students. Collin was nominated for the award through letters written by current and former Coastal students, colleagues, the Chancellor, and academic deans at Coastal.

Collin has been a writer and analyst of contemporary political affairs for more than twenty-five years. His graduate studies at Harvard University were interrupted when he was called to active duty from the United States Army, and he spent two years in the Pentagon as a briefing officer, serving under the Army's Deputy Chief of Staff for Intelligence. Becoming a civilian official for the Defense Intelligence Agency (DIA), Collin was stationed in Rome for five years, serving as Chief of the Intelligence Collection Branch of the DIA station in Italy.

Collin completed his graduate work at Oxford University,

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receiving his doctorate in 1983. In 1984, Collin joined the Department of Government at Coastal. In the 1987-88 academic year, he was elected Distinguished Professor of the Year by the student body. In 1989, he was promoted to full professor.

As a scholar, Collin has been interested in studying the roots of political violence. Over the past years, he has interviewed Palestinian guerillas, Red Brigades militants, and most recently, in August, 1989, a former leader of the Irish Republican Army.

"We are proud to have Dr. Richard Collin as part of our faculty at USC Coastal Carolina College," said Chancellor Eaglin. "He brings a rich and unique personal background to the business of teaching political science. The nomination of Collin for the CASE 1989 Professor of the Year Award is a deserving honor for a teacher of his caliber."

Admissions Office Sponsors "Straight Talk" Series

The Admissions Office will sponsor a "Straight Talk" program about undergraduate admission, scholarships and financial aid for prospective students and their families, Thursday, October 26, at 7 p.m. in GCEC-005. The program is free and open to the public.

College representatives will discuss step-by-step application procedures, admission requirements and deadline dates. Several options will be explained for those who do not meet admission criteria, including Guided Studies, special summer programs and summer courses. The Honors Program, for students whose test scores and previous grades predict outstanding college-level achievement, also will be discussed.

Representatives from the Offices of Financial Aid, Scholarships and Admissions, will explain scholarship sources, state and federal grants, work study employment, college loans, and other forms of assistance. Criteria for each form of assistance and the procedures for applying for financial aid and scholarships will be discussed.

Charleston Pianist To Perform At Coastal

Pianist Douglas Ashley, a faculty member of the College of Charleston, will perform in concert, Sunday, October 29, at 4 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The program is free and open to the public.

Ashley graduated from Northwestern University with honors, where he also received his Ph.D. He has the piano certificate from the Conservatory of Vienna, where he studied with Viola Thern. A two-year scholarship from the Austrian government enabled him to participate in several master classes of Paul Badura-Skoda.

Active as a performer, teacher, composer, and editor, Ashley has spent summers in Italy as artist-in-residence with the Rome Festival Orchestra. He recently has been added to the list of artist teachers available for master class funding by the National Piano Foundation.

The Washington Post describes Ashley as "An excellent Charleston pianist...authoritative playing."

Ashley's performance at Coastal will include works by Mozart, Bach and Chopin.

Coastal To Host International Studies Conference

Two Ohio State professors will be featured presenters in a conference on "How to Internationalize the General Studies Core Curriculum," at Coastal, Monday, October 23 and Tuesday, October 24.

Mathematics Department Schedules Conference

Coastal's Mathematics Department will sponsor a conference, entitled "Shaping Math Education for the 21st

Century, Friday, October 2/. The morning lecture, featuring keynote speaker Dr. Kenneth Hoffman, will be held at 10 a.m., in Wheelwright Auditorium. The afternoon session will begin at 1:30 p.m., with a panel discussion in the Graduate and Continuing Education building, room 005, and will continue, at 3 p.m., with five concurrent sessions which will address various stages of mathematics education. The program is free and open to the public.

The purpose of the conference is to plan and develop a prototype model for mathematics education in this region and the country, relating to the National Research Council's published report to the nation on the future of mathematics education entitled, "Everybody Counts."

Dr. Kenneth M. Hoffman, professor of mathematics and former head of the Department of Mathematics at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (M.I.T.), will be the keynote speaker at the conference.

A leading mathematician, educator and administrator, Hoffman has made significant contributions to the development of national policy affecting mathematics research and education. He received his Ph.D. from the University of California, Los Angeles.

Hoffman has been a member of the M.I.T. faculty since 1950. He served as the Executive Director of the Committee on Resources for the Mathematical Sciences of the National Research Council.

Hoffman was instrumental in the formation of the Board on Mathematical Sciences and the Mathematical Sciences Education Board. He became executive director of the Mathematical Sciences Education Board earlier this year, a position he holds concurrently with his M.I.T. professorship.

From 1984 to 1989, Hoffman headed the Office of Governmental and Public Affairs of the Joint Policy Board for Mathematics, which develops policy analyses on behalf of the national mathematics community and presents them to the executive and legislative branches of the government as well as the public. In 1986, Hoffman was awarded the Public Service Award of the Joint Policy Board for Mathematics "for his far-sighted and effective initiation...of a national mathematical sciences policy."

This is the first of two conferences to be held at Coastal, made possible by a grant awarded by the Horry County Higher Education Commission to provide the services of experts, as consultants and speakers, concerning this report. The second conference, scheduled for spring 1990, will be a continuation of the work begun during these sessions.

Horry and Georgetown County School District teachers and administrators also will be attending as the local area seeks to respond to the national concern for the improvement of mathematics education.

A luncheon is planned at a cost of \$10 per person. Registration for the luncheon is required.

Brazilian Economist To Lecture At Coastal

Distinguished Brazilian economist Dr. Marcos Silva, a

Fulbright scholar at the University of California-Berkeley, will present two lectures at Coastal, Monday, October 30. Free and open to the public, the presentations are sponsored by Coastal's Department of Government and International Studies; the International Studies Consortium, directed by Fred Hicks, professor of history; the School of Natural and Applied Sciences; and the Council on International Exchange of Scholars, in Washington, D.C.

The first lecture, "Brazil and its Society," will be held from 2 to 3 p.m. in the Student Center, room 104. Silva will discuss Brazilian geography, history, people, economy, and environment.

From 7 to 8 p.m. that evening, Silva will discuss "Brazil's Foreign and Internal Debt," in the Student Center, room 205.

Silva earned his bachelor's and master's degrees in economics at the University of Sao Paulo. He earned a Ph.D. in economics from the University in 1988. He was assistant professor of economics at the University from 1985 to 1988.

Silva is a researcher of FIPE (Fundação Instituto de Pesquisas Economicas - Foundation for Economic Research), and direction and high level management deputy executive secretary of ANPEC (Associação Nacional de Centros de Pos - Gradução em Economia - Brazilian Association of Centers of Post-Graduation in Economics.)

The economist has conducted numerous research activities in the area of innovation and macroeconomics. His most recent projects include "Cost Assessment for Immunobiological Products," "Assessment of the Economic Impact of Biotechnology in the Pulp and Paper Industry," and "The General Theory: A Post-Keynesian Interpretation."

He is the author and co-author of several publications on economics, including Economic Perspectives in Biotechnology, Hyperinflation, The Reserve of Market in the Microcomputer Industry, and How to Finance the Steel Industry in Brazil.

"USA TODAY" Search Begins For USA's Best College Students

USA TODAY has begun its search for the USA's best college students to be named to its ALL-USA Academic Team. Students selected to the first, second and third teams will be featured in a USA TODAY special section planned for mid-January. The 20 first-team members will be invited to receive their awards at a ceremony in Washington, DC.

Any full-time undergraduate is eligible for consideration. All-USA Academic Team nomination forms have been sent to deans at colleges and universities nationwide or students may nominate themselves by completing the nomination form and having a dean sign it. Students may also submit with the form up to three letters of recommendation from persons on or off campus.

Nominees will be judged for outstanding individual academic endeavor; community/campus activities and leadership roles therein; awards, honors and demonstrations of initiative; and grade point average.

Criteria for the team were developed in consultation with USA TODAY's co-sponsors: the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges, the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education and the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education.
