

#### Dr. Marcos Silva To Lecture At Coastal

Distinguished Brazilian economist Dr. Marcos Silva, a Fulbright scholar at the University of California-Berkeley, will present two lectures at Coastal, Monday, October 30. Free and open to the public, the presentations are sponsored by Coastal's Department of Government and International Studies; the International Studies Consortium, directed by Fred Hicks, professor of history; the School of Natural and Applied Sciences; and the Council on International Exchange of Scholars, in Washington, D.C.

#### Pianist Michael Sitton To Perform At Coastal

Pianist Michael Sitton, assistant professor of music at Coker College, will perform in concert, Sunday, November 5 at 5 p.m. in the Little Theater located in the Graduate and Continuing Education Center. The performance is free and open to the public.

Sitton graduated summa cum laude in 1980 from Mars Hill College in North Carolina, where he earned a bachelor of music degree. He received a master of music degree at the University of Kentucky. Sitton is presently a doctoral candidate in piano performance and literature at the University of Illinois main campus.

Sitton was awarded the triennial Leschetizky Association New York Debut Prize, while studying at the University of Kentucky. He has been a recipient of the Harriet Hale Woolley Scholarship from the Foundation des Etats-Unis, which allowed him to travel to Paris. In 1983, Sitton received the Diplome de concert from the Schola Cantorum.

Sitton has performed frequently in the South and Midwest. His most recent appearances were at Liszt's Totentanz with the Hendersonville (North Carolina) Symphony; recitals in Columbia, Florence and Charlotte; and a recital at Chicago's Sherwood Conservatory. In 1981, he presented a concert in the Carnegie Recital Hall.

As a scholar and composer, Sitton has written for Clavier, The American Music Teacher and The Piano Quarterly. He has had several choral works performed and commissioned by choirs in the South, Southwest and Midwest.

Sitton's performance at Coastal will feature works by Bach, Chopin, Ravel, and Beethoven.

o Dr. Walter Stanaland, associate professor of mathematics and computer science, recently presented to the Lockwood Folly River Action Group, a 12-page report, entitled, "Qualitative Study of Navigation, Pollution and Water Flow of Lockwood Folly Bay/Inlet Area." In the report, Stanaland analyzed the existing inlet and the proposed inlet at Eastern Channel under different tidal and wind conditions.

o Pat Alexander, instructor of music, attended a conference of the International Piano Foundation, Chicago, Ill., October 13-15. Alexander recently received a scholarship to study at Columbia University, New York City, New York. As a result of this study, she was appointed as a consultant for the International Piano Foundation. Her appointment, of which there are only fifty consultants world-wide, was made by Dr. Robert Pace, professor of music at Columbia University.

o Dr. Karen Carpenter, assistant professor of nursing and health, and Sharon Guffey, instructor of nursing and health, attended a one-day workshop entitled "Multisystem Organ Failure: A pathophysiologic approach," held in Columbia, SC. The workshop focused on the etiological commonalities found in critical care patients that predispose them to multisystem organ failure. The relationship between the original trauma, systemic chemical mediators, and mediator caused organ failure was clearly delineated. Current medical and nursing research on intervention techniques as well as nursing diagnosis and expected patient outcomes were emphasized.
