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Small Business Development Center Co-Sponsors Business Recovery Seminar

Coastal's Small Business Development Center (SBDC), and the Grand Strand Chapter of the Service Corps of Retired Executives (SCORE), will present a business recovery seminar Thursday, November 16, from 1 to 5 p.m. at Chapin Memorial Library in Myrtle Beach. The seminar is free and open to local business owners whose businesses may have been affected by Hurricane Hugo.

According to Marshall Bryant, SCORE chairman, and Patrick King, SBDC manager, the seminar will aid local owners of small businesses in their urgent need for help in determining business strategies to overcome the effects of the hurricane.

Bryant and King said many businesses may not be aware of the Monday, November 20, 1989 deadline for filing physical damage claims with the Small Business Administration (SBA), and the June 22, 1990 deadline for filing economic injury claims.

The four-hour workshop will include advice on how to file with SBA for help related to economic injury caused by Hugo; how to assess the true effect of damage and the options for obtaining recovery; tips on how insurance coverages may be used to the best advantage; and financing alternatives during business recovery.

The workshop presenters will include SBDC, SCORE, and SBA Disaster Loan program representatives. An insurance specialist and panel of local representatives of financial institutions also will be on hand.

SCORE is a national volunteer agency of the SBA, where retired business and professional executives provide business counseling to small businesses.

The SBDC is located at Coastal and assists new enterprises and managers of existing businesses.

Whole Language Conference Rescheduled

The two-day conference, "Whole Language: Empowering Teachers and Learners," has been rescheduled for Friday,

December 8, and Saturday, December 9 at Coastal.

More than 650 individuals had registered to attend the September conference that was postponed due to Hurricane Hugo and most are still planning to attend. Registration is also open to others on a first-come, first-served basis.

The focus of the conference will be the educational trend of teaching children and adults by using real examples of reading, writing, and storytelling, as opposed to the "Dick and Jane" method.

The conference will feature speakers Regie Routman, reading recovery teacher from Ohio, and author of Transitions: From Literature to Literacy; Bob Wortman, Arizona elementary school principal and former whole language kindergarten teacher; and Debbie Dewitt, North Myrtle Beach school teacher.

Educators from more than ten states will discuss topics such as whole language strategies and children's literature in the writing classroom; empowerment and whole language; children as language artists; the at-home whole language environment of children; using non-sexist children's literature; reading and writing; partners in the common experience; and teaching beginning reading through writing.

The conference will begin Friday, December 8 at 1 p.m., with concurrent sessions held through 7 p.m. The conference will continue Saturday, December 9, with concurrent sessions from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Registration fee is \$95 and includes non-credit registration, reception, Saturday luncheon, and materials.

Registration fee for college credit is \$359 and includes conference fee, tuition, text, reception, Saturday luncheon, and materials.

Watkins Selected As 1989-90 Teacher-In-Residence

Charlotte Watkins, North Myrtle Beach Middle School teacher, has been selected as this year's teacher-in-residence at Coastal.

The Teacher-in-Residence program, a cooperative venture

between the Horry County School District, was established last year at the college to provide the opportunity for a master teacher within the school district to join the School of Education and Health Professions faculty at Coastal for one year.

Watkins, a teacher for fifteen years, has taught seventh and eighth grade language arts at North Myrtle Beach Middle School for four years. She earned two bachelor of arts degrees from Fairmont State College, one in elementary education and one in secondary education. She received a reading specialist degree and master of arts degree from West Virginia University.

Watkins says the Teacher-in-Residence program is an opportunity local teachers should take advantage of.

"I believe one of life's goals is continuous growth -- intellectual as well as spiritual," said Watkins. "I believe that in order to continue growing one must reach for new horizons and challenges. The Teacher-in Residence program is such a challenge."

According to Watkins, she has been able to meet her goals thus far, as a teacher of education at the college.

"Before I was selected as teacher-in-residence, I envisioned working with young adults, sharing my practical classroom experiences," said Watkins. "I have been able to interact with education majors and share a current view of today's world with them."

The teacher-in-residence must complete a school improvement project to take back to his or her regular school after the year is over. Watkins's project involves the development of a calendar of activities for at-home use, geared toward basic skills at the middle school level.

Watkins said the project would involve the participation of parents.

"One or two training sessions would be held for interested parents," said Watkins. "I believe parents would view this project as an expression of concern going beyond regular teaching. Viewing student/parent participation and a possible improvement in skills would provide a great personal reward."

Watkins says making the transition from middle school teaching to college, was not as difficult as one may think.

"The students and the faculty and staff at Coastal are all very friendly," said Watkins. "The atmosphere is very calm and inviting. It makes the new kid on the block feel comfortable."

Coastal Theater To Present "Story Theatre"

"Story Theatre," Paul Sills's stage adaptation of tales by the Brothers Grimm and Aesop's Fables, will be presented by Coastal Carolina Theater Friday, November 17 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, with additional performances Saturday, November 18 at 8 p.m., and Sunday, November 19 at 2:30 p.m.

"Story Theatre's" roots are from the same improvisational movement that spawned "Saturday Night Live" and "Second City Television." "Story Theatre" is a biting commentary on the social morals and mores of contemporary America.

The production's cast will be made up of students from Coastal Carolina College, Socastee, and Conway High Schools. A grant from the South Carolina Humanities Council provided an opportunity for high school students to participate in the play.

The players include Coastal students Kathy Wren, Jeff Woodward and Kitty Gundling; Conway High School students Mark Loomis, Scott Cribb, Susan Patel, and Janet Mahaffey; and Socastee High School students Noel Eaton and Shannon Miller. Ed Jersek of the Coastal community also is a member of the cast. Former Coastal student Donna Catton-Johnson is costume designer and Coastal student Kristen Chapman is stage manager.

Charles Whetzel, visiting professor of theater and artist-in-

residence, is the director and scene designer of the play. Whetzel received a master of arts from The University of Northern Iowa and a master of fine arts from The University of South Carolina.

He has served in director positions at the Sioux City Community Theater, Morningside College, Kirkwood Community College, and the National Research Group. He has appeared in more than 100 plays in educational, community and professional theaters, directed over 40 major productions and has designed more than 60 major productions. He spent four years as scene designer at Theatre-by-the-Grove, Professional Summer Stock Theater in Pennsylvania.

The Coastal Carolina Theater production of "Story Theatre" is funded in part by the Horry Cultural Arts Council, the South Carolina Arts Commission and the National Endowment for the Arts.
