USC Coastal Carolina College To Offer Travel And Study Opportunity In England

USC Coastal Carolina College is offering a travel and study opportunity at Manchester College, Oxford, England, July 11 through August 1, 1990. The trip is open to undergraduate and graduate students, educators and members of the community.

Centrally located in an ancient university city, the Manchester College campus includes a renowned library, a chapel with stained-glass windows by Burn-Jones and Morris, and other historic buildings.

Participants will stay in sleeping/study rooms at the college. During the week, graduate and undergraduate students will attend classes. Everyone traveling with the group will have an opportunity to tour the city and learn about the history and culture of the area. On weekends everyone will take excursions to other points of interest in England such as Stonehenge, Salisbury, Stratford on Avon, Warwick Castle, Windsor Castle and Parliament.

Students who wish to spend an additional week (August 2 to August 9) abroad, may register for the tour through

Scotland for an additional \$400. Those who wish to travel with the group without enrolling for courses also may participate in the Scotland tour.

Five courses are available to students for graduate or undergraduate credit. Students may register for one or more of the following courses: Politics and Government of Great Britain and Ireland; The History of England II; Studies in English Literature: Advanced English Literature and Literary Landmarks; Topics in Art History: British Art and Architecture; and Special Topics: The Foundations of American and British Education: A Comparative Study.

Cost of the program is \$2,250, and includes week-day meals, room, planned excursions, round-trip air fare from Charlotte to London, ground transportation to Oxford, and tours. Tuition fees are in addition to the cost of the trip.

Enrollment is limited; therefore early registration is encouraged.

Wiseman Elected President Of South Carolina Council of Education Deans

Dr. Dennis Wiseman, dean of the School of Education and Health Professions at Coastal, was recently elected to serve a second term of office as president of the South Carolina Council of Education Deans.

The council is comprised of the heads of the education programs at the eleven state-supported colleges in the state that include Clemson University; The Citadel; College of Charleston; Francis Marion College; Lander College; South Carolina State College; USC-Aiken; USC-Columbia; USC-Spartanburg; Winthrop College; and USC Coastal Carolina College.

Joyner Lectures at Harvard

Dr. Charles Joyner, Burroughs Distinguished Professor of Southern Culture at Coastal, recently addressed a colloquium at Harvard's W.E.B. DuBois Institute for Afro-American Studies on the subject, "The World of the Plantation Slaves."

He also spoke at the Harvard Divinity School on the topic,

Musical Duo To Perform At Coastal

The Fox-Towse Duo, two young women who began performing together in London early last year, will perform a piano concert Tuesday, December 12 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium. The concert is free and open to the public.

Jama Fox first began studying piano at the age of five. She is a graduate of the North Carolina School of the Arts, where she studied with Eric Larsen, Anne Epperson and Robert McDonald. In addition to solo performances, she has frequently performed music for both four-hands and two pianos. While in school, she was chosen to play a concerto for two pianos, "Grand Pianola Music," and received praise for the performance from the composer, John Adams, who was in attendance. In 1987, Fox traveled to London for private study with Benjamin Kaplan. During her London solo performances, she appeared as a guest on Sir Harry Secombe's television program, *Highway*.

Originally from Toledo, Ohio, Mary Towse began serious study of the piano at the age of fifteen with Jerome Rose, artist-in-residence at Bowling Green State University. She continued her studies at the Eastman School of Music under Rebecca Penneys and completed her bachelor's and master's degrees in piano performance at Indiana University under James Tocco and Edward Auer. While at Indiana University, she served as an associate instructor of piano. During this time, Towse performed solo and chamber music throughout the Midwest and New York. She is a recipient of awards and scholarships from the Chautauqua Festival, Cincinnati University, Oberlin College, and Western Michigan University. Since 1988 she has resided in London where she is known as solo performer, accompanist and teacher.

Telephone Information

Direct Inward Dialing Calls

Computer Services and Communications has added four additional Direct Inward Dial (DID) lines to the telephone system. This should alleviate the problem of outside callers not being able to dial your telephone directly. Please give out your 349-xxxx number to all Conway and long distance callers. Remember, it is not long distance for callers from Myrtle Beach to use the 448-1481 number and for callers in the Georgetown area to use the 546-0234 number.

Measured Extended Area Service Calling

Measured extended area service (MEAS) makes it possible to dial directly (without dialing 1 first) to Horry and Georgetown County telephone numbers. However, MEAS calls are billed on a per minute basis, just as they have been in the past. The rates are much lower than before and the revenue that is generated for MEAS calls goes to Horry Telephone or GTE, not to AT&T. Please continue to use the 7 access code to obtain a Myrtle Beach line for Myrtle Beach, North Myrtle Beach, Garden City, Murrells Inlet and Surfside Beach calling; 8 access code to obtain a Georgetown line for Georgetown, Pawleys Island, Litchfield and Andrews telephone numbers; and the 9 access code to obtain a Conway line for Conway, Aynor, Galivants Ferry and Bucksport telephone numbers.

University Faculty/Staff Dependent's Scholarship Forms Now Available

Applications are now available for the Faculty/Staff Dependent's Scholarship, sponsored by the University of South Carolina, for any dependent child or spouse of a full-time system employee. To be eligible for consideration, the applicant must be enrolled or accepted for enrollment as a full-time undergraduate or graduate student on one of the University's nine campuses and predict or have attained a minimum 3.0 GPA. The scholarship is renewable for up to four years for students pursuing a baccalaureate degree

provided the recipient maintains a minimum 3.0 GPA. In some cases, graduate students may receive the scholarship until receipt of their graduate degree.
