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## Coastal Accepting Applications For Spring Semester

Applications for the spring 1990 semester are now being accepted at Coastal. Registration will be held Monday, January 8 through Thursday, January 11 in the registrar's office, beginning at 9 a.m. until 5 p.m. New students should phone the admissions office for the registration schedule.

Spring semester classes begin Monday, January 15. The sixteen-week session will be held Monday, January 15 through Saturday, April 28; Spring I, an eight-week session, will be held Monday, January 15 through Tuesday, March 6; and Spring II, an eight-week session, will be held Monday, March 19 through Tuesday, May 8.

The evening course schedule is offered to meet the needs of working students who cannot attend day-time classes. Evening classes meet between 5:30 and 11 p.m.

Undergraduate evening courses are offered in computer science, history, English, biology, business administration, education, mathematics, astronomy, psychology, music, french, government and international studies, economics, philosophy, history, music, physical education, and sociology. Graduate evening courses are offered in art, biology, community and occupational programs, early childhood education, educational media arts, history, journalism, mathematics, psychology, statistics, theater, social work, nursing, health administration, and librarianship. ## El Salvador Students Experience American Culture And College Environment

When a group of 24 college students from El Salvador recently asked to play a game of soccer against the soccer team at Coastal during a United States visit, Coastal's team was more than willing.

Even though the teams weren't exactly evenly matched, there were some exciting moments, according to Dr. James

Henderson, associate professor of government and international studies and chair of the International Programs Committee at Coastal.

"During the first half of the game the score was tied zero to zero," said Henderson. "The El Salvador students really performed well, with some nice moves. By the end of the game the score was ten to zero, with the Coastal team winning, but Coastal has twice as many members on its team, and they of course, are a team that practices and competes regularly."

Henderson said the sport of soccer is universal -- many professional soccer players come from poor backgrounds, just as with the sport, boxing. Henderson says the next team the United States must conquer in world cup competition is El Salvador, therefore the El Salvador students thought it would be fun to compete against a U.S. group of students.

According to Henderson, the group of students participated in a course in aquaculture during the past ten months, through the Central American Peace Scholarship program (CAPS), funded by the U.S. Agency for the International Development (USAID). The program is administered by the University of South Carolina's Aquaculture and Marine Programs International (SCAMPI).

A major aspect of the CAPS program is the "Experience America" component. Its purpose is to promote peace and democracy through providing trainees with opportunities to become involved in community, family and professional activities in order to gain an understanding of democratic institutions and procedures, and how people in the United States address social, economic and political issues.

Surfside Beach families hosted the students during their stay, giving them an opportunity to be involved in American life. Students ranged in age from 20 to 30, and were all high school graduates who have completed two years at an agricultural technological institution.

Henderson said many Coastal faculty and staff assisted with this year's program. The list includes soccer coach Paul Banta, and assistant Nuno Piteira; the Coastal soccer team; Dr. William Hills, assistant professor of psychology; Sandi Shackelford, professor of theater; Dr. Robert Squatriglia, associate chancellor for student affairs; Geoff Parsons, international students and studies abroad advisor; and Butch Fennel, athletic trainer.

Henderson said the students learned a lot about the United States during the visit, but most were eager to return to their families in El Salvador.

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## Designated Parking Areas Strictly Enforced In 1990

The 330-car baseball field parking lot was completed during the fall semester; however, it is still used only sparingly. ## USC Coastal Carolina College To Offer Travel And Study Opportunity In England

USC Coastal Carolina College is offering a travel and study opportunity at Manchester College, Oxford, England, July 11 through August 1, 1990. The trip is open to undergraduate and graduate students, educators and members of the community.

Participants will stay in sleeping/study rooms at the college. During the week, graduate and undergraduate students will attend classes. Everyone traveling with the group will have an opportunity to tour the city and learn about the history and culture of the area. On weekends everyone will take excursions to other points of interest in England such as Stonehenge, Salisbury, Stratford on Avon, Warwick Castle, Windsor Castle and Parliament.

Students who wish to spend an additional week (August 2 to August 9) abroad, may register for the tour through Scotland for an additional \$400. Those who wish to travel with the group without enrolling for courses also may participate in the Scotland tour.

Five courses are available to students for graduate or undergraduate credit. Students may register for one or more of the following courses: Politics and Government of Great Britain and Ireland; The History of England II; Studies in English Literature: Advanced English Literature and Literary Landmarks; Topics in Art History: British Art and Architecture; and Special Topics: The Foundations of American and British Education: A Comparative Study.

Cost of the program is \$2,250, and includes week-day meals, room, planned excursions, round-trip air fare from Charlotte to London, ground transportation to Oxford, and tours. Tuition fees are in addition to the cost of the trip.

Enrollment is limited; therefore early registration is encouraged.

### Direct Inward Dialing Calls

Computer Services and Communications has added four additional Direct Inward Dial (DID) lines to the telephone system. This should alleviate the problem of outside callers not being able to dial your telephone directly. Please give out your 349-xxxx number to all Conway and long distance callers. Remember, it is not long distance for callers from Myrtle Beach to use the 448-1481 number and for callers in the Georgetown area to use the 546-0234 number.

## Measured Extended Area Service Calling

Measured extended area service (MEAS) makes it possible to dial directly (without dialing 1 first) to Horry and Georgetown County telephone numbers. However, MEAS calls are billed on a per minute basis, just as they have been in the past. The rates are much lower than before and the revenue that is generated for MEAS calls goes to Horry Telephone or GTE, not to AT&T. Please continue to use the 7 access code to obtain a Myrtle Beach line for Myrtle Beach, North Myrtle Beach, Garden City, Murrells Inlet and Surfside Beach calling; 8 access code to obtain a Georgetown line for Georgetown, Pawleys Island, Litchfield and Andrews telephone numbers; and the 9 access code to obtain a Conway line for Conway, Aynor, Galivants Ferry and Bucksport telephone numbers.

## University Faculty/Staff Dependent's Scholarship Forms Now Available

To be eligible for consideration, the applicant must be enrolled or accepted for enrollment as a full-time undergraduate or graduate student on one of the University's nine campuses and predict or have attained a minimum 3.0 GPA. The scholarship is renewable for up to four years for students pursuing a baccalaureate degree provided the recipient maintains a minimum 3.0 GPA. In some cases, graduate students may receive the scholarship until receipt of their graduate degree.
