Former Chicago Bears Superstar To Speak At Coastal

Gale Sayers, former Chicago Bears superstar, will speak at Coastal, Thursday, February 22, at 7 p.m. in Kimbel Gymnasium. The lecture is part of the Black History Month program and is co-sponsored by the athletic department, Afro-Am Society and the alcohol and drug program. The lecture is free and open to the public.

By the age of twenty-one, Sayers was on his way to becoming an important national sports hero in the National Football League. His six-year career with the Chicago Bears included six touchdowns in one game, twenty-two touchdowns in one season, and lifetime leader in kickoff returns, averaging thirty-one yards per return.

His autobiography, *I Am Third*, describes his courageous career as leader, pathmaker and servant. He also is the author of an instructional book on the fundamentals of offensive football for players of all ages. The movie "Brian's Song" describes his relationship with a courageous football teammate who struggled with and died of cancer.

Computerized Recruitment System Installed In Career Placement Office

The career placement office announces the installation of kiNexus, a computerized recruitment system which will connect Coastal with a national database. A demonstration fo the system is scheduled for Friday, February 16 at 12:30 p.m., in SC-206.

Students, alumni and faculty will be able to enter their resume information on diskettes at three campus locations: the career placement office, the academic center and the School of Business computer lab. Periodically, the candidate registrations will be uploaded and sent to the national clearinghouse. Large national organizations will subscribe to the service to locate candidates for internships, co-op programs, full-time positions and consultations. Employers can sort candidate information on 30 separate criteria.

The service is a partnership of the college placement council and Information Kinetics, Inc. and is provided, free of charge to the Coastal community.

Coastal Carolina Theater To Hold Auditions For "South Pacific"

Coastal Carolina Theater will hold auditions for the production of "South Pacific," Wednesday, February 28 and Thursday, March 1 at 7 p.m., in the Little Theater located in the Graduate and Continuing Education Center. Auditions are open to the public.

First performed in New York in April of 1949, the musical by Oscar Hammerstein, Richard Rogers and Joshua Logan has become a classic of American musical theater. Set during World War II on two islands in the South Pacific, the score includes such memorable tunes as "Some Enchanted Evening," "Honey Bun," and "Younger Than Springtime."

Charles Whetzel, visiting assistant professor of theater, is director of the production.

This snack service will be offered in the space currently occupied by the campus bookstore. Information From The Office Of International Programs

What Is The International Student Exchange Program?

The founding principle of the International Student

Exchange Program (ISEP) is that a basic period of study outside a student's home country should be available and affordable to all students, regardless of what institution they attend or what their financial situation may be. This is possible because ISEP is based on a reciprocal exchange of benefits. Each participating U.S. student pays to his or her own institution (USC Coastal) an ISEP program fee based on regular tuition and room and board. This creates a place for a non-U.S. student to come here. In turn, each participating foreign student makes a similar arrangement at his or her home institution to create a place for a U.S. student.

At Coastal, through the office of international programs, our students have access to nearly 100 institutions throughout Canada, Central and South America, Western Europe, Africa, Asia and the South Pacific. You don't have to be a language major to benefit from the experience. Many universities offer courses in education, business, politics and the sciences, to name a few. To be a qualified nominee for an ISEP placement outside the United States you must be a regularly enrolled student in good academic standing at Coastal; have been enrolled at Coastal for one academic year prior to the exchange; and have a strong academic background in your major field.

Studying in another country, experiencing that country's culture and meeting its people can have a profound effect on your life. Whether you take advantage of a summer program or a semester or academic year exchange, you will come back with an enhanced awareness of the world and your place in it.

"Partnership For Service-Learning" Program

Service-learning, the union of academic study and service in the work, is a new pedagogy for higher education. In an intercultural or international setting, service-learning is practiced in new places including the Third World. In service-learning programs, students spend a summer, semester, or year continuing formal academic study and at the same time work to address human needs. The service performed may be related to the student's specific interests and skills and is carried out under the direction of an established service agency. In the best designed models, the study and service are tightly joined so that the service makes relevant and immediate the academic study, and the study informs the work.

Students teach reading to the illiterate, recreation to young people, and useful skills to the jobless; care for the young, the sick, the troubled, the handicapped, and the elderly; provide service which without their help would remain undone; study such subject as history, language, the behavioral sciences, economics and the arts while living and working in the culture; measure theory and practice; learn to understand those different from themselves; develop useful skills; uncover their own gifts; and realize the personal rewards of public service.

"Descriptive Relativity" Undergraduate Seminar Continues

The undergraduate seminar "Descriptive Relativity," which began Wednesday, February 7, from 3 to 4 p.m. in the SCI-122, will continue throughout the semester on Wednesday evenings.

The seminar is a series of talks aimed at a broad undergraduate audience. The series attempts to explain some of the basic ideas in relativity theory. Steve Harris, visiting assistant professor of mathematics at Coastal, will

discuss the notion of spacetime diagrams and use them to explain the breakdown of simultaneity and what is meant by a black hole.

Initially, there will be very little in the area of mathematics; the descriptions will be qualitative. Eventually, more sophisticated concepts will be employed, requiring a familiarity with multivariable calculus.
