The Tempest, Shakespeare's last completed play, will be presented by Coastal Carolina Theater, Friday, February 23 at 8 p.m. in Wheelwright Auditorium, with additional performances Saturday, February 24 at 8 p.m., and Sunday, February 25 at 2:30 p.m.

The Tempest is a play which deals with the Renaissance's noble dream of a perfect world. It is a gripping account of a British ship that makes its way to Bermuda in 1609, leaving a group of men in The New World, a region of delicate and temperate fruitfulness where nature provides abundantly. The play then becomes the struggle of natural man against cultivated man, art versus nature.

The cast members are Sol Steinberg as Alonso; Archie Buchan as Prospero; Chad Ayers as Ferdinand; Dargan Baldwin as Francisco and a mariner; Michael Brady as Trinculo and a mariner; Brendan Frost as a boatswain; Divina L. Perez as Ariel; Jennifer Kallmeyer as Ceres; Eleanor Buchan as Juno and a mariner; Jeff Woodward as Stephano and a mariner; Lou Nordeen as Sebastian; David Russell as Antonio; Edward Jersek as Gonzalo; Sean Pierce as Caliban; Kitty Gundling as Miranda; and Linda Dunn as Iris.

Dr. David Millard is stage director of the production. Dr. John Durrell is director of text; Sandi Shackelford is director of voice; and Charles Whetzel is director of the set.

Former Chicago Bears Superstar To Speak At Coastal

Gale Sayers, former Chicago Bears superstar, will speak at Coastal, Thursday, February 22, at 7 p.m. in Kimbel Gymnasium. The lecture is part of the Black History Month program and is co-sponsored by the athletic department, Afro-Am Society and the alcohol and drug program. The lecture is free and open to the public.

By the age of twenty-one, Sayers was on his way to becoming an important national sports hero in the National Football League. His six-year career with the Chicago Bears included six touchdowns in one game, twenty-two touchdowns in one season, and lifetime leader in kickoff returns, averaging thirty-one yards per return.

His autobiography, *I Am Third*, describes his courageous

career as leader, pathmaker and servant. He also is the author of an instructional book on the fundamentals of offensive football for players of all ages. The movie "Brian's Song" describes his relationship with a courageous football teammate who struggled with and died of cancer.

Graduate And Continuing Education To Host National Conference On Aging

Graduate and Continuing Education will host "Longevity in America: Beyond the Linear Life Plan," a national conference on aging, Tuesday, March 27 and Wednesday, March 28.

The conference offers professionals who work in the field of aging and related gerontological issues, the opportunity to share information that has evolved from study, research and first-hand experience. The conference will focus on the implications and impact longevity in America will have on the next century.

Dr. K. Warner Schaie, internationally known lecturer, author and director of cognitive research involving the elderly, will be a featured speaker at the conference. Schaie is currently Evan Pugh Professor of Human Development and Psychology and director of the Gerontology Center at Pennsylvania State University. Schaie has been the recipient of millions of dollars in grant money for research in the area of aging.

Dr. Sherry Willis, also with the University of Pennsylvania, as professor of human development and psychology, will speak at the event. Willis's expertise is in research and teaching in adult development and aging.

Coastal Students Travel To New York City

Approximately forty-four Coastal students who are members of the National Association of Accountants Student Affiliate group and the Business Club recently received a taste of "big city life" by spending four days in New York City.

The trip included visits to many New York business sites, including the New York Stock Exchange; the New York Commodities Exchange; the World Trade Center; the accounting firm AICPA (American Institute of Certified Public Accountants); Macy's; Citibank; and Price Waterhouse.

While touring the AICPA, students received a synopsis of the function of each division of the firm. One of the highlights of the tour was a visit to its library, where tax codes dating back to 1940 are recorded.

At Macy's, the public relations department explained job opportunities and various aspects of each of the major retailing operations within the company. Representatives also discussed the significance of its annual Macy's Day Parade.

The tour of Citibank consisted of a visit to its bond and currency trading floors. Citibank representatives explained how currency is traded and discussed bond issuances, trading bonds, how bond packages are put together, and how they securitize various types of loans. The head of the South Carolina Securities discussed treasury operations.

Students also had the opportunity to enjoy New York City's culture by sightseeing, attending the Broadway production of *Cats*, and dining in Chinatown.

Coastal Offers SBI Independent Study Course For Senior Undergraduate Students

The Small Business Institute (SBI), sponsored by the Small Business Administration (SBA) and Coastal, is presently being offered at the college through an independent study course, (CBAD 399). The program is open to senior undergraduate students at Coastal.

The program allows business students to gain hands-on experience in the business world, as they assist area businesses in determining causes of specific problems they may be encountering as a business. These problems are brought into the classroom and students are able to test their ability in using problem-solving tools according to the case. The student is able to integrate the various business administration disciplines he or she has studied in college and at the same time, gain valuable knowledge for future career choices.

Studies show that most small business failures are due to management deficiencies. Many new business ventures, for example, are begun by good craftsmen and technicians who lack the necessary management skills to compete in the business world. SBA has long been acutely aware of this need, but limited resources have made it impossible to reach the possible several million small businesses throughout the country which would benefit from management assistance.

There is an immediacy about the SBI program in which students find engrossing. The problems of their clients become their own problems. The resultant realistic problem-solving atmosphere provides a richly rewarding learning experience for both students and faculty.

USC Coastal To Host Conference At Allen University

The Comprehensive Enrichment Program in International Studies, coordinated by USC Coastal, will present the conference "Global Perspectives and the University and College General Studies Core Curriculum," Monday, March 5 and Tuesday, March 6, at Allen University in Columbia.

Keynote speaker will be The Honorable Godfrey L. Binaisa, former president of Uganda and personal friend of Nelson Mandela.

Binaisa was elected president of Uganda in 1979 by the National Consultation Council after Idi Amin was defeated. He was not president even a year before military officers non-violently overthrew him.

During his presidential tenure, he worked to prepare Uganda for parliamentary elections. After the coup that ousted him, he fled to London where he practiced law. In 1987, he came to the United States and now lives in Brooklyn.

Binaisa has served as a member of the International Commission of Jurists, an arbitrator for the International Arbitration Tribunal in Stockholm, Sweden, and chairman of the Salaries Review Commission for East Africa Posts and Telecommunications. He has extensive legal experience serving as international commercial consultant to various industries, governments and international organizations; barrister-at-law (England and Wales), Inns of Court, Lincoln's Inn in London; and was appointed to serve on the Queen's Counsel in London.

Coastal faculty will be the presenters of other conference sessions.

Monday sessions will include: "Terrorism and Intercommunal Violence in the Modern World," Dr. Richard Collin; "Introducing India to the General Studies Core Curriculum," Preston McKeever-Floyd and Glenda Sweet; "Education in Africa, Cameroon and Kenya," Dr. Richard Koesterer; "Integrating the Black Experience into Latin American Content Courses," Dr. James Henderson; "The Faculty Exchange Experience," Dr. Lance Bedwell and Dr. Randall Wells.

Tuesday sessions will include: "New Realities in Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union," Dr. James Farsolas; and "The USC at Oxford Program - the Experience of Traveling with Students," Dr. Robert N. Robinson.

The conference will conclude by 12 noon, Tuesday.

The Comprehensive Enrichment Program in International Studies was developed to improve undergraduate education in international studies by planning and executing a series of curricular and extra-curricular activities for students and teachers. The overall aim of the program is to increase international awareness of faculty and young men and women, providing mechanisms that will support long-term changes geared to the acquisition of international competence.

The ten participating South Carolina Colleges are: USC Coastal Carolina College, Allen University, Benedict College, Morris College, South Carolina State College, Voorhees College, USC-Aiken, USC-Beaufort, USC-Salkehatchie, and USC-Union.

Information From The Department Of Nursing And Health

Students who have been accepted into the college may challenge Mathematics of Medications (CNUR 100) by passing the final examination for that course. Licensed Practical Nursing may also challenge the Fundamentals of Nursing courses (CNUR 111 AND 111L) by passing the National League for Nursing Mobility Profile I examination. If successful, the student may receive credit for CNUR 111 AND 111L, and then enroll in Role Transition from Practical Nursing (CNUR 110 - 3 credits.)

The LPN must successfully challenge or pass the mathematics of medications course in order to challenge fundamentals of nursing.

Cost for the mobility profile is \$34.50 (test fee) and \$56 (challenge fee.) Those applying for the Mathematics of Medications challenge must pay a \$24 challenge fee. Fees must be paid at the treasurer's office, and the receipt presented to the nursing office when the test is to be taken.

LPN's must bring proof of LPN licensure on the day of testing.
